Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ– Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported offenses have picked up slightly. The Court is now remote whenever possible.

BC Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz also reported offenses have picked up, but most offenses have been low level. There was a decrease in sexual assaults. They were busy in regards to the TikTok challenge. The office is hybrid this week.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Christopher Perry agreed and mentioned youth being in school fights.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2021 programs have concluded and the last quarterly reports are being reported. The 2022 Standing Committees were presented and discussed.

The 2022 Plan Update is complete and awaiting executed documentation.

The 2022 meeting schedule was presented. A motion by Janice Conti, seconded by Liana Dinallo, *to approve 2022 meeting schedule was carried.*

The Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) site visit report was presented and discussed. A motion by Janice Conti, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, *to approve the BCDFG RSAP site visit report was carried.*
The 2023 Plan Update timeline was presented and discussed. A motion by Harry Lisa, seconded by Christopher Perry, *to approve the 2023 Plan update timeline was carried.*

Program Updates:

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – slightly lower referrals; program running as planned

BCDFG Positive Strides – two referrals

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – one referral in December.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 23 referrals in December

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations – three referrals in December.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 2 on bracelet electronic monitoring, 21 youth on the program. One youth on a probation bracelet. Smart link is being utilized (case management feature, facial recognition, status update, etc.)

Juvenile Detention Center – 9 residents, 4 from Bergen County

BCDFG – Visions – 7 juveniles

Bergen’s Place Youth Shelter – 3 residents: all male. Shelter plus - total of 8 (all in person visits for residential programs are suspended remote visits and access are available only)

Teaneck Public Schools – no report

Center for Modern Dance Education – no report

Children’s Aid and Family Services – LST completed classes on December 22, 2021. It is starting back today at Ben Franklin school. The program is prepared to go remote if needed. EPIC – Lodi Sticker Shock Event was successful. On December 10, 2021, there was a community event/movie night, 27 Bergen County youth attended.

Probation – The youth who mastered the “tie the tie” life skill received a dress shirt. In November there was a small group discussion on unconscious bias. In December there was an incentive event: a video game truck was provided for youth and adults. It was a positive way for the youth and adults to interact.

Case Expeditor – no report

Big Brothers Big Sisters – 21 Bergen County matches, the program is seeking mentors, and there are 12 youth on the waiting list

TMR Mental Health Care – The year ended year well. On January 22, 2022, a completion event will take place to reflect on what they learned and reinforce coping skills.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported on the new restorative justice grant, which is available to Paterson, Trenton, Camden, and Union. Also there is one person in programming from Bergen County.

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Francois reported there was an uptick in the caseload. Out of home placements are up. In-person hearings have resumed for VOPs and dispositions.

Superior Court of NJ– Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo announced Marcia Hartkopp will be supervising the Juvenile Unit.

BC Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported diversions are also increasing. They are seeing a lot of issues in school such as volatile behavior in youth, organized fights, etc.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Christopher Perry reported as of May 1st all youth will be eligible for the public defender's services. Stationhouse adjustments are keeping the numbers down.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the 2021 program results report. The report was reviewed and discussed at the last planning meeting. *A motion by Harry Lisa, seconded by Shelby Klein, to include the 2021 Program results report in the 2023 Plan Update data was carried.*

The 2021 BC Offenses Map and Summary was presented. *A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Shelby Klein, to include the 2021 BC Offenses Map and Summary in the 2023 Plan Update data was carried.*

Program Updates:

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – the number of boys are increasing, but the girls’ numbers are low. Bipas is up and running, but the PAVE numbers are low.

BCDFG Positive Strides – ten referrals in February.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – six referrals in February (2 community and 2 police).

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 39 referrals in February

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations – five referrals in February (1 detention and 4 police).

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 19 youth in the program 6 on bracelet electronic monitoring

Juvenile Detention Center – 6 residents, 2 from Bergen County

BCDFG – Visions – 4 juveniles

Bergen’s Place Youth Shelter – 1 male resident. Shelter plus - total of 5

Teaneck Public Schools – no report

Center for Modern Dance Education – no report

Children’s Aid and Family Services – setting up intro meeting for Rochelle Park. They are collaborating with the SRO. LST is in the third marking period for the existing classes. Robin Wanner announced the second Seeds of Change conference will be on 10/21/22 location tbd. She also reported on the various events and trainings for the EPIC program.

Probation – Pop scheduled for 3/15. It will be hybrid (in-person and virtual). There has been a big struggle with engagement, buy in, and trust.

Case Expeditor – no report

Big Brothers Big Sisters – 31 Bergen County matches, 23 in the site based program. Two new matches last month. The program is trying to transition back to in person.

TMR Mental Health Care – 8 youth current with a wait list.

START Institute – the program has not received any referrals and will not be funded moving forward.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported they are working in person fully, but meetings are still virtual. Staff needs to be fully vaccinated by 3/31. There is one Bergen County youth in a JJC program.

The BCYSC Allocation subcommittee met on Wednesday, March 16th to review the following proposals.

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance Adolescent Substance Abuse Program – To fund an increase in the food budget	\$2,873

Children’s Aid and Family Services – The new town, Rochelle Park, has received Board approval and will start next week. The remaining towns are in the fourth marking period. EPIC is continuing with their meetings and training. The Youth conference is tentatively scheduled for October 21, 2022. They are waiting on the venue.

Probation – The first POP (Parent Orientation Program) session was a success. 8 parents/guardians representing 7 youth with 3 in person and 5 via Zoom.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – in person will resume soon

TMR Mental Health Care – 10 youth and families are being served some in person and some virtual.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported the monitoring tool was modified and we should receive it next week. There are no Bergen County youth in JJC programs currently.

Harry Lisa called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, *to approve the BCYSC April 5, 2022 Membership Meeting Minutes, was carried. Liana Dinallo abstained.*

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Francois reported that Juvenile Court is busy; issues remain with long-term residential placement. The Court is seeing offenses that are more serious and there are not a lot of options for alternatives to detention for more serious offenders. Fields programs are a good option but the juveniles need to follow the rules or they cannot stay in the program, which is a huge obstacle. Judge Francois also noted the need to have all proceedings be in-person. Virtual is helpful, but it lacks formality. Fifteen new volunteers were sworn in to the Juvenile Conference Committees.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo echoed the Judges' comments, in regard to in-person proceedings. Out of home placement is a statewide issue. The Court is working hard to complete backlog cases over 90 days by June 30, 2022, if possible. No date for phase two of the Court House construction.

BC Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported they are very busy and are down a prosecutor. Rich Nunez has replaced Chris Perry, which led to a transition period. The need for the formality of in-person proceedings was also reiterated.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Rich Nunez introduced himself and is looking forward to working with everyone.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

The 2023 Plan Update and the updated 2022 monitoring tool was released. We are continuing to meet and move forward with our planning process in order to complete the plan update. Program reviews are beginning. Jamie Ziegelhofer gave a brief overview of the new monitoring tool and regulations. The

agencies are now required to have a brief presentation at the time of the monitoring. The schedule and sign-up sheet was shared. Two qualified voting members need to be present for a formal monitoring. All were encouraged to sign up. The JDAI research and reform specialist, Julie Boc, has resigned, and Erica Hein is filling in until the position is filled. The JDAI application was released, but we are unsure if Bergen will be applying for funds this year or continuing to use next year as a planning year.

Program Updates:

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – Average male group attendance is 6 male, and female group attendance is 3 female

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 17 youth in program, 6 youth on bracelet and three phone monitoring

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – April had 21 referrals serving 35 different municipalities. Three new municipalities utilized the program in April (Fairview, Saddle Brook, and Washington Township). A training will be held targeting law enforcement and educators.

BCDFG Positive Strides – 6 new referrals in April. The first group will tentatively start this month.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations – One in detention and one in community evaluations

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – Two referrals by police

Juvenile Detention Center – 14 youth in total, 8 out of county and 6 Bergen County (13 male, 1 female)

BCDFG – Visions – total 5 youth (3 male, 2 trans)

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 7 youth (5 male, 2 female)

Shelter Plus – 6 youth (2 female, 4 male)

Teaneck Public Schools – no report

Center for Modern Dance Education – no report

Children's Aid and Family Services – Stephanie Drag reported the Botvin Life Skills program has expanded into Rochelle Park's 7th grade and it has just begun. The seven habits of highly effected teens expansion this summer is working the Zone to run the program. Empowering Peers Inspiring Change group is moving along. EPIC Englewood ran a sticker shock for an alcohol awareness event in collaboration with the Englewood Health Department. Lodi EPIC has moved in person at the library. Seeds of Change conference is scheduled for Friday, October 21, 2022, in collaboration with the County Executive's Office. The theme is diversity, equity, and inclusion focusing on LGBTQ+.

Probation – Janice Conti reported the planting event is being planned for this month. They are preparing for parent orientation and painting with a purpose in June. They are looking for speakers for two topics: burn out prevention and detoxing the work environment, and how to engage and unlock the team's creativity and the next generation leadership.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – In person has resumed and everything is going well.

TMR Mental Health Care – no report

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported that on April 22nd the Attorney General visited Jamesburg and is planning to visit other correctional facilities and the fields programs. The monitoring tool has been updated and there are no Bergen County youth in JJC facilities at this time.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – no report

New Business – Shelby Klein announced that May is Mental Health Month there are a variety of activities and trainings such as youth mental health first aid training, suicide prevention training, and a narcan training. Shelby Klein said the name is xylazine and it causes skin ulcers and other medical concerns. A big concern is when mixed with other substances Narcan is not effective. It is slowly starting to appear in Camden.

A discussion was held regarding youth live streaming and recording crimes for social media. The Juvenile officers, probation as well as the Judge are seeing this trend.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported the number of cases is on the rise, currently no new appointments for Bergen County and reiterated what the Judge reported. She also reported, there was a case processing subcommittee meeting on February 16th, 2023, and requested participation from the public defender's office for the next meeting on May 11, 2023, at 2:30pm.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported a sharp uptick in cases, which was discussed in the case processing subcommittee meeting. There were approximately 60 cases with 30 ending up on the formal calendar in January. In February 16 cases made it to the formal calendar. A lot of the new complaints are repeat offenders with youth picking up new charges while other charges are pending. She would like to see more of the less serious cases resolved and is hoping to work with the public defender to do so. There was also a discussion regarding the perception that marijuana usage is not an issue among youth and also in inappropriate places such as probation and

the court. She also discussed the social media issues and would like to see advocacy to hold the social media platforms responsible to posting these types of videos and challenges that are crimes and lead to crimes.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunes echoed the same sentiments as the Judge, Liana Dinallo, and Meredith Kunz. In the year he has been in juvenile he sees a trend of increased number of cases and an increase in the seriousness of offenses. He stated he agrees with the need for residential beds of all different types. He reminded everybody he is the only Juvenile Public Defender for Bergen County. He would like to work to link more youth with services predisposition. He stated in regards to moving cases forward, he will continue the cooperation between the public defender’s office and the prosecutor’s office to make that happen.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the second RFP from the 2023 Plan Update was approved by the State, the resolution is pending with county commissioners. Four proposals came in on February 14th for the 3rd RFP.

Adiyah Washington presented the 2023 allocation report for approval.

A Third Request for Proposal (RFP) was issued for Priority Services identified in the 2021-2023 Bergen County Comprehensive Youth Services Plan. A total of \$106,754 was available for the period January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023. Four (4) agencies submitted four (4) proposal totaling \$315,487.00

The YSC Allocations Committee, all of whom were devoid of conflict of interest, met on February 16, 2023, February 23, 2023, February 27, 2023, and March 2, 2023. They thoroughly reviewed and scored the proposal based on the weighted criteria included in the RFP.

The recommended allocation plan includes:

- Two (2) proposals scored above 90.
 - The following two (2) proposals are recommended for funding as follows:
 - TMR Mental Health Care PC, Mindset for success – learning to work program \$79,847
 - County of Bergen Division of Family Guidance, Culinary Arts for Teens program \$26,907
- Two (2) proposals scored below 90 and are not recommended for funding at this time:
 - YWCA Northern NJ - Summer/After School Program for Bergen Youth
 - D. S. Education Alliance, LLC

- Reduce the salary dollars allocated to the currently vacant staff position by \$8,347. Reallocate this amount to the three active grant funded staff. The reallocated amount would cover some of the cost of the 2023 contractual salary increases.

Budget Categories: Specific Assistance to Clients and Miscellaneous:

- Reallocate \$400 from Specific Assistance to Miscellaneous to offset the rising cost of supplying a meal to the ASAP clients participating in group programming.

The above reallocations do not impact the total ASAP approved budget of \$167,353.

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the work has begun on the 2024-2026 Comprehensive Plan and Application. Data is starting to be collected and focus groups are being scheduled. Planning workgroups will be scheduled in a few months. If anybody has any requests or would like to be part of a different workgroup they can reach out to Jamie Ziegelhofer. The survey monkey account is now active and the survey is going to start soon. Any feedback is appreciated. A few other counties provided their survey formats and focus group questions and we will try to incorporate them as appropriate. Also, we may do a focus group in April with the JOA. The updated regulations that govern the YSC are still pending. Once the regulations are posted the bylaws will need to be updated in accordance with the changes. The BCYSC conference will be meeting soon to start the planning process. If anybody is still interested in joining that subcommittee they can contact Jamie Ziegelhofer. The ACYSCA is looking to partner with the NJJDA for conference in September. There will be more information given when plans are finalized such as topics and speakers. The State will be offering another grant writing seminar in April. Details will be emailed when available. Program reviews and site visits will begin next month. We will need members to attend and the schedule will be sent out once finalized.

Teaneck Public Schools – Javalda Powell reported Benjamin Franklin Middle School is hosting an Empowerment Day March 24th, 2023. There will be workshops and assemblies throughout the morning. They are currently looking for workshop facilitators.

Probation –parent orientation program was held on February 28, 2023. It was successful. The next life skills topic are vision boards and the program is currently in need of old magazines for the project. The site visit will potentially be on April 4th during the vision board project.

Big Brothers Big Sisters –Bigs in blue and BMW programs are running great. There was 1 new Match in January and none in February.

TMR Mental Health Care – 10 youth are in the program, they will be connecting with probation to present the program to the probation officers. The program is seeing a lot of younger youth.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported 5 youth completed their OSHA Certification at Mercer College, 2 Youth received their diploma, 2 youth received their drivers permit, there are no Bergen County youth in State placements. There will be a tour of the Juvenile Detention Center on March 29th.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – No report

New Business – A discussion was held regarding the CMO and youth in the juvenile justice system and the many contributing factors of what is being seen among the youth such as repeat offenses, long waits for placement, etc. Jamie Ziegelhofer will discuss reigniting the MDT with Liana moving forward in hopes of resolving some of the issues discussed.

Announcements – Rosemarie Lobretto Announces she has retired as the Executive Director of Family Support after 20 Years. Karen Stack will represent FSO going forward. She will remain as a member of the BCYSC.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – No Report

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported a small slowdown in numbers, but a rise in sexual offense cases especially among younger youth that cannot result in charges. A common thread in the cases are the youth are young with access to pornography. They are acting out with siblings and peers. The younger cases usually have DCP&P involvement and receive services through the division. We do not want to charge youth in order for them to receive necessary services. Another issue is releasing youth that are from out of county or out of state especially when scoring for a bracelet as well as having parents of youth (in County or out) refusing to take custody of their children. Meredith and Kristen are working together to solve these problems. Anne Giacobbe said she would be open to a discussion. Jamie Ziegelhofer also offered to have a discussion regarding ATD in other counties so we can come to a solution. There was also a discussion and agreement to explore existing services and needs regarding services for the younger youth committing sex offenses.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunes echoed the same sentiments as Meredith Kunz and added his concerns are a few prosecutors are moving forward with Megan's Law as a response on sexual cases. Many of these cases are not a Megan's Law case and the kids need help and services. The court is very busy now. There is an extreme need for the kids to be embedded in services prior to hearing the case. He stated in his opinion there is a rise in probation violations and there should be more programs pre and post disposition.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported 2023 Plan Update everything was approved by the State and the resolution is pending with the county commissioners for April 19th. Once approved, the new programs will be

able to move forward: BCDFG Culinary Arts, TMR Mindset for success, and YWCA Junior Jumpstart. It is the end of the 1st quarter so we are going to begin to receive the quarterly fiscal and narrative reports. We are also starting monitoring. We are doing it like last year with formal monitorings, which will require two voting members and site visits. We will be conducting youth and staff interviews and file reviews on site when possible. April 10th is the first virtual formal monitoring of BCDFG ATD. We will need two voting members to attend. Please email Jamie if you are able to attend and an email will follow. BCDFG UTR was changed from May 4th to May 12th at 1:00pm and BBBS will be May 18th at 10:00am. The list will be emailed after the meeting. The formal monitorings consist of a PowerPoint presentation, questions and answers and a quick overview of the tool. The 2024-2026 Comprehensive Plan and Application is due out this month. We are waiting for the Notice of Available Funds (NOAF) to be leased by the state and once that is out, we can start our planning meetings, focus groups and surveys. Jamie is planning on a focus group with our Juvenile Officers Association. We were able to identify a need for two different programs in previous year. In the meantime, we have been collecting data. Jamie reached out to my counterparts in other counties and collected youth and stakeholder surveys. We are working to improve and release our surveys soon, possibly the end of the month. We are still waiting for the updated regulations. Once we receive them, we will review them and make the necessary changes to the bylaws. Jamie met with Liana Dinallo to discuss reconvening the MDT. We discussed possible have co-conveners and she also reached out to BCDFG to discuss a partnership. The 2023 BCYSC Conference will have a planning meeting soon. Superior Court of NJ – Judge Francois reported Judge Catuogno is the new assignment Judge. There are only six Judges in the family division. Judge Mecca will be the new presiding Judge for family when Judge Melchionne retires. Caseloads continue to rise as well as the seriousness of the offenses.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – No Report

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported they still have a very large caseload with very serious offenses. April was a slower month with 22 formal complaints, a large number were able to be stationhoused, 10 were transferred out of county, and only 8 were added to the docket. The new policy at the Garden State Plaza requiring juveniles to have chaperones is going well. However, it is a new policy and they will be monitoring it. They are still working on protocol regarding incidents when parents refuse to pick up children after being released.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunes reported they currently have big calendar and long days, but very productive. He spoke about a new process in place on getting electronic discovery.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2023 Plan Update is fully approved and the three new programs will be launching soon. We have been very busy with the site visits and formal monitorings. We still need members for the remaining reviews.

Adiyah Washington presented the following: The BCYSC Allocations Committee met on Friday, April 28th and reviewed the completed site visit summaries and the following budget modifications, which are being recommended for approval:

ATD budget modification:

A. Personnel:

Current 2023 budget has \$10,821 allocated to salary

Proposed revised budget would allocate \$11,395 to Rachel's salary to cover contractual cost of living increase. (The current ATD budget is based on a rate of 26.0124 per hour (\$10,821 per year). In 2023, Rachel's rate is 27.3918 (\$11,394 per year). The 5.3% or \$573 increase is explained by the cumulative contractual COLA increase covering 2021, 2022 and 2023 which went into effect 1/1/2023.)

B. Consultant

Current 2023 budget allocates \$3,000 and proposed revised budget would allocate \$5,250. The increased funding would cover the costs of:

8 hours of music education per month (\$30/hr)

4 hours of martial arts education per month (\$45/hr)

4-5 contingency consultant hours (@\$45/hr) for the year in the event additional consultant time is needed to support the program due to unplanned consultant absence.

C. Materials and Supplies

Current 2023 budget allocates: \$1,440 for the three cellular phones assigned to ATD. Proposed revised budget allocates \$1,650 to cover costs for upgrading to most current cellular smart phones (phones, cases).

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Francois reported the caseload has increased significantly. There has been an uptick in gun charges and the severity of the offenses.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo echoed Judge Francois's report of the increased cases and the severity of the offenses. All cases are being heard in person.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported that caseloads are back up for the month of May. She noticed a large time gap between the actual occurrence of delinquency and the charging. An email was sent to the officers to stress the importance of not waiting to charge so the juvenile understands the consequence of their actions and can be helped in a timely fashion. Meredith Kunz also discussed the possible gang affiliations among youth and the increase in gun charges and how it may be linked to some of the law changes. The department has seen a decrease of serious sex crimes and an uptick in the cyber cases. A discussion was held regarding social media and its effect on youth in particular when a situation is dangerous they will record it instead of seeking safety and help.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported Judge Francois is on vacation and will return next week. The juvenile unit will be moving possibly one floor up, but extensions will stay the same. Construction phase 2 will not begin until possibly 2026.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Meredith Kunz reported an average July with about 40 new formal complaints with 15 being transferred out of county. This is a high number of transfers. There has been a number of out of county youth committing offenses. She also observed many parents refusing to allow their children to participate in stationhouse adjustments, which then moves the case forward instead of getting it resolved at a lower level. There was a discussion regarding the reasons behind the stationhouse adjustment refusals and ways to remedy the situation. She also reported there is a group of youth that have escalated in their offending after programming and/or probation. There was also a discussion about S3911, which is a bill that proposes to establish the minimum age as 14 for juvenile delinquency. The administrator informed the commission the ACYSCA (New Jersey Association of Counties Youth Services Commission Administrators) is tracking a few pending bills that may affect our youth and she will keep the BCYSC informed as necessary.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – No Report

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2024-2026 plan and application has still not been released. The 2024 Allocation letter was received last week. The amount is the same as the 2023 increased amount and it revealed the 2024-2026 Plan and Application due date of December 15, 2023. In the meantime, the data is continuing to be collected. The 2022 offenses map is complete, but the data is being reviewed and it will be presented soon. MDT (Multi-Disciplinary Team) is being scheduled for September 28th. The bylaws subcommittee will be meeting soon to review the regulation changes and update the bylaws. The BCYSC conference date was tentatively scheduled for October 18th. However, there are many conferences scheduled for that month so we may change the date to coincide with one of the monthly meeting dates.

One cycle is at Bergen Family Center with their employment program for 9th and 10th graders, and one is at the Boys and Girls Club of Garfield, which is open to all teens, but targeting their junior counselors. Scheduling has begun for the upcoming school year in September. Tonight is National Night Out. The agency will be collecting surveys for the NJ4S grant.

The survey data will be shared with the BCYSC to be included in the plan. 170 responses were received already. Robin Wanner reported they will be in 12 communities in Bergen County tonight for National Night out. EPIC is focusing on recruitment and leveraging their access to kids.

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) – Jamie Ziegelhofer read the following statement from Rachel Kinne: “Our Bigs in Blue program will be changing for the 2023-2024 school year. The Bergen County Sheriff’s Office shared with us they do not have the bandwidth to continue in the same capacity they have been. Although wanting to continue to collaborate with us in some form, they are unable to commit to the program as we have been running it. Wanting to continue to serve the children from Roy W. Brown MS in Bergenfield, our team found a solution of implementing a High School Bigs program. We put this plan into action and had a wonderful meeting with the Superintendent of Bergenfield as well as the Principal at Bergenfield High School. Bergenfield High School students will mentor the Roy W. Brown Middle School students. This will allow us to continue to serve the middle school students while also providing leadership skills to the High School students as well. Due to the Bergen County Sheriff’s Office still wanting to be involved in some capacity, they have committed to facilitating a few program sessions, which potentially will include a K-9 demonstration, mock crime scene and self-defense course. Our site based programs are still currently paused at the moment due to summer but we will be reaching out to Bergenfield School District to discuss next month and will begin recruitment in September!”

TMR Mental Health Care – Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the Mindset for Success program started in July.

YWCA Junior Jumpstart – Ellen Mustafa reported the program began in May. The students meet every week on Sunday at 4:00 pm and hear from many different coaches. The program is full with 25 youth.

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile)/BCCJJSI Steering Committee – Judge Magali Francois stated that there had been a significant uptick in out of home placements. Non-offending juveniles placed in the shelter on a crisis petition by the parent or guardian went up significantly last year. She would like us to stay aware of the situation. She also discussed the lack of available psychiatrists.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported that they are continuing with Case Processing Subcommittee. Erica Hein gave a good presentation on 2022 school-based complaints. Liana mentioned the new law came into effect on January 1st, called VASPA (Victim's Assistance and Survivor Protection Act). It is handled in the domestic violence unit. The law was changed to include predicate acts of cyber harassment, stalking, and incorporates some forms of bullying. The new law does not require a relationship between parties. Liana introduced again the new juvenile team leader, Mariela Gabriel.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported out of State and out of County youth are still trending with theft of motor vehicles and shoplifting. He mentioned that there is an incredible need for services across the board that applies to the kids with delinquency charges as much as those without.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – No report

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2023 program results are not ready. The programs will be extended to a fifth quarter, but there will be an updated report possibly next month and a finalized report after the fifth quarter ends.

Harry Lisa called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Linda Spiegel *to approve the BCYSC January 3, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.* Martha Grant, Judge Magali Francois, Richard Nunes, and Melissa DeBartolo abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile)/BCCJJSI Steering Committee – Judge Francois discussed a recent uptick in caseload, out of home placements continue to increase, and the charges seen in Court are more serious. There is a long wait list for residential placements and parents are frustrated with what they perceive to be the lack of appropriate services. She reported many crisis petitions are escalating and DCP&P involvement. Anne Giacobbe is also seeing a lot of frustrated parents at DCP&P and discussed putting together an elevated resource list and a more creative approach to complicated needs. Dean Pastras discussed the large number of youth involved with Bergen's Promise and how he filled staff. He is hoping to collaborate with more groups now that positions are filled. Jamie Ziegelhofer gave a reminder that there is the MDT (multidisciplinary team) as a potential avenue to help specific youth. Kristen Ambrosio discussed the length of stay in the juvenile detention center (JDC) increasing and youth being brought in again due to the long wait for services.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo agreed with Judge Francois and announced the juvenile staff moved from room 159 to room 202A, with no changes on the telephone extensions. An update regarding Phase II of the construction at the Court House, the bidding is happening shortly, but has not started.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Martha Grant had no report

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunes agreed the caseload is very high and the charges are serious. The JDC has a large number of youth. The nature of the charges require waiver discussions, which lead to longer times to complete the case. He discussed the need for pre-trial services such as mentoring and felt the needs are greater.

He discussed with parents not affording transportation to get youth to Court. Jamie Ziegelhofer reminded me that the MDT has funds and could provide reimbursement for transportation services. Shekinah Williams said she should be informed at the MDT if a youth is not being provided services. A discussion was held regarding the pre-trial issues and services Rich is observing. He also reported observing school issues such as youth being suspended indefinitely and youth being transferred to alternative schools with no option to return to their previous school. This will be discussed further at MDT. He is also observing parent frustration and youth depression. Janice Conti echoed what Rich is observing. Parents and youth are being strongly encouraged to withdraw youth from school and attend online. This contributes to the feeling of helplessness and depression. There is a lack of socialization and youth want to return to school, which is very difficult and at times stigmatizing. Dean Pastras talked about collaborating for system improvement. Adiyah Washington suggested the topic of strategic collaboration to be added to the BCYSC Conference. There was a discussion regarding the long wait time for placements and the importance of streamlining the placement process and expediting placement.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2023 program results report is in the process. The fourth quarter reports are still being completed. The 2024-2026 comprehensive plan and application has been approved. The certified assurance and grant conditions are being completed. The bylaws need to be updated and approved to send it with them. The Association of the Youth Service Commission Administrators sent a letter to the state requesting a clean copy of the regulations. The state sent the clean copy and this will hopefully speed up the updating process and a subcommittee meeting will be scheduled soon.

Adiyah Washington presented a budget modification for approval. The BCYSC Allocations subcommittee met on Thursday, February 1, 2024, and is recommending the following award modifications:

Adiyah Washington presented the scores and funding recommendations for the 2024-2026 comprehensive plan and application (the full report is attached).

A Request for Proposal (RFP) was issued for Priority Services identified in the 2024-2026 Bergen County Comprehensive Youth Services Plan. A total of approximately \$903,781 is available for the period January 1, 2024 to December 31, 2024. Nine (9) agencies submitted fifteen (15) proposals totaling \$1,561,904.00.

The BCYSC Allocations Committee, all of whom were devoid of conflict of interest, met on 1/2, 1/9, 1/11, 1/16, 1/18, and 2/1. They thoroughly reviewed and scored the proposals based on the weighted criteria included in the RFP.

The recommended allocation plan includes:

They are grateful for the 5th quarter to continue to support the youth and their families. We have a pediatric emergency right now in our state for mental health concerns for kids.

They see a lot of kids coming in with self-injurious behaviors, suicidal thoughts, their abusing substances, a lot of anxiety and depression and a lot of school refusal because of things like bullying and cyber bullying.

Kristen Ambrosio introduced Tara Smith. She is the new Bergen's Place Youth Shelter Administrator and is a new member of the BCYSC.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto *to approve the BCYSC February 6, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile)/BCCJJSI Steering Committee – Judge Francois reported sharing the drug treatment court solicitation. There are grants available. The purpose of the grants are to implement new and innovated approaches and improve outcomes for youth with substance use and co-occurring mental health disorders. Jamie Ziegelhofer signed up for the webinar to receive more information and will share the notice after the meeting. Judge Francois also reported she attended a three-day inspiring summit in Cleveland. NJ has implemented much of what was presented at the summit. She came back with some ideas specifically a therapeutic animal program. A discussion was held regarding the possibility of this program with many members interested and a further discussion will take place offline.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported there are three new Judges, but it does not affect Juvenile. The Juvenile Unit moved to 202A. There were no updates on Phase II of the construction.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Martha Grant had no report.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunes reported they are very busy. He is still seeing a challenge in getting youth in programs. He reported a challenge with a particular youth in crisis going to New Bridge and being released very quickly without stabilization. He stated youth with severe mental health issues do not belong in JDC and there needs to be a better way to help them. He reported his concern over education issues. He is seeing youth giving up hope when they are sent to alternative and online schools and are not allowed a way back to their former schools. Jamie Ziegelhofer suggested discussing more specific youth at MDT.

There was also a discussion regarding youth in detention and how they are served by their current school. Dr. Montello reported being aware of the issues and working on them when feasible at the JDC.

Janice Conti furthered the discussion stating they are seeing youth post adjudication are also having education issues such as not being allowed back in school because of an offense that happened outside of school. They are missing the socialization as well as negatively affecting their education.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the fifth quarter has ended. 2023 will be closing shortly. The 2024 Contracts are pending and will be in JAMS soon. As they are completed, an email will be sent to the agencies. She reiterated MDT is meeting and it is a good venue to bring up the needs you are seeing for specific youth in order to come up with a solution. The bylaws are being updated and the subcommittee will meet once they are completed to review and/or amend them. Michele Hart-Loughlin asked how to discuss a youth. The person that can add a youth for discussion is MDT coordinator Valerie Park.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported that there might be a change coming soon for the bodiless warrants for juveniles. It may be possible for police to file a warrant without physically having custody of the juvenile. He will report more information when available. Unfortunately, there are a lot of cases currently.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – No report

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that we are close to closing out 2023. The fifth quarter reports are done and once finalized the end of the year (2023) report will be presented. 2024 plan and application is done. Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 7 youth, 5 male and 2 female, 4 from Bergen County and 3 out of County. On April 27 the youth were involved in a volunteering opportunity, *Slam Dunk the Junk in Hackensack*, 6 youth actively participated

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 18 youth in total; 8 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), 3 youth phone electronic monitoring (PEM) and 7 youth are on regular, non-electric monitor ATD

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – There were no new referrals, but 45 youth participated in the program

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) - 15 juveniles, 12 from Bergen County and 3 out of County. Jorge Sandoval reported a lot of youth from out of county youth and out of state committing offenses in Bergen. Seth Victor added that there is a legislative proposal, which he will keep all informed, that juveniles will stay in the County of the offense as opposed to going back to the County of residence. This will impact Bergen in many ways. One of which, would be a potential longer time in detention since youth will not be able to partake in ATD if they are out of county/state the way it is currently set up.

Teaneck Public Schools – No report

Children's Aid and Family Services – Stephanie Drag mentioned that the schools are entering into the 4th marking period, finishing the school year within the next few weeks. 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens in partnership with Bergen Family Center in their job training program is planned in Englewood. EPIC Lodi is now up to 16, kids including one ninth grader that started as an eighth grader.

Probation –Painting with a Purpose had two youth paint with their mothers. . The 2nd quarter parent orientation program is scheduled for the end of May. The ice cream with the Chief event will be in June. Potting a Plant will also be scheduled soon. She also wanted to mention how much she appreciates the BCYSC. The group is well connected and has key players sitting at the table. It is not like that in many of the other counties.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – Lisa Cieplechowicz reported on behalf of Rachel Kinne. BMW and the Middle School program are doing well. Some of their activities include mental health Jeopardy, a diversity quilt and Shark Tank. The programs have a few sessions left.

TMR Mental Health Care – Tasia Millicevic reported that they had good start for this year and are looking for about 50 more youth for the remainder of the year.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – No report. Kyle Sheehan reminded everybody monitoring are coming up and the importance of attending. Also, the JJC is updating JAMS and adding the monitoring tools in JAMS. Any suggestions from the agencies are welcomed.

Old Business – Rosemarie Lobretto followed up on the youth education needs having trouble being met. Janice reported two youth were discussed at MDT, which was what was suggested last meeting. MDT is a better venue to resolve those issues.

New Business - Matt Stanislao. President of the Bergen County Juvenile Officers Association, mentioned a video. The production, entitled "BREATHE" which is described as “a first-person POV short film in which high school students worry about getting in trouble for calling 911 for a friend who has overdosed. This initiative was a collaborative effort by local and county agencies throughout Bergen County NJ to promote The Good Samaritan Law and to model behaviors necessary to help save someone's life who has overdosed. Final takeaway messages include the purpose of these types of laws and reasons to resist the urge to panic or run away in this situation.”

Harry Lisa called the membership meeting to order.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto *to approve the BCYSC May 7, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried, Liana Dinallo abstained.*

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile)/BCCJJSI Steering Committee – Judge Magali Francois discussed the complexity of the cases she is seeing. The youth have severe mental health issues. She stated that there have been challenging cases with significant mental health issues and the resources for the residential placements are unavailable or nonexistent. The wait time can be a set up for failure. They are seeing a lot of traumas among the youth and acting out behavior and most programs do not allow second chances for youth who run away or have an infraction. Janice Conti also brought up the challenges facing youth on probation that are sent home with medication and then are unable to obtain the medication for various reasons. There is a lack of availability of the psychiatrists, missed appointments, and a lack of parent follow through. This also is a set up for failure. Richard Nunes voiced concern over the quality of the psychiatric evaluations received for court involved youth. Jamie Ziegelhofer discussed the difficulty in finding a psychiatrist to use with the client specific funds due to the lack of availability and the manner in which they must be paid. The need for extensive evaluations is growing. It was mentioned that psychiatric cases increased post-covid.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported they currently have a roster of 95 cases of which 24 cases, representing 14 juveniles, are over goal. She reiterated the necessity for psychiatric evaluations, because of the level of the offenses they are seeing and are increasing. She reminded all that the juvenile staff is at 202A. They are working hard to resolve cases since it is the end of the court year.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reiterated what the Judge discussed. There is a new warrant option. They can now do bodiless warrants. If the youth is not in custody, a warrant can be issued. There is a process on if it can be issued and how. He anticipates it will be used sparingly.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen –Richard Nunes also reiterated level of severity and complexity of the cases. Many youths need residential and it is not available. One issue compounds another issue. Hospitalization is needed for several kids that do not belong in detention, but instead need mental health services.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that 2023 is finalized. The numbers will be a little off due to the fifth quarter. The first quarter of 2024 is almost complete as well. The 2024 Plan paperwork and program profiles are continuing to be finalized. The program reviews have begun and scores will be presented at the next meeting. Harry Lisa will be reaching out to qualified members to help with the program reviews and site visits. MDT (Multi-Disciplinary Team) is still meeting and trying to resolve some of the issues that have been brought up at this meeting. The bylaws will be updated soon.

BCYSC Allocations reviewed a budget modification request for TMR and is presenting it for approval. The personnel line was decreased by \$8,400, reduced personnel line A from \$200,000 to \$191,600. Facility costs increased to \$10,000 and consultants/professional fees/trainings from \$2,500 to \$4,500 for trainings. Material and Supplies reduced from \$2,600 to \$2,000.

Probation – Jonathan Palaguachi is no longer in the juvenile unit due to departmental needs, but will assist with the bilingual needs of the program. All his cases have been reassigned between Steve Havens and Amanda Evans. Currently the juvenile unit is left with 4 staff members. The parent orientation program went well, taking place on May 21st for the 2nd quarter. All families participating were Spanish speakers.

Big Brothers Big Sisters - The community-based program is continuing to enroll and match the youth with mentors. The site-based programs are ending.

TMR Mental Health Care – 15 youth enrolled in the program and a few youth are waiting to start. A lot of domestic violence cases are coming in, parents separating, some school refusal and many kids self-harming. TMR can help with therapy and medication management, having the kids see a provider consistently, but currently no one can do forensic reporting.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto *to approve the BCYSC June 4, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.* Judge Magali Francois and Martha Grant abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile)/BCCJJSI Steering Committee – Judge Francois reported the juvenile calendar is busy with numerous out of county car thefts.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported the AOC is doing site visits in an effort among all counties to have uniform procedures and practices. Jessica Mulligan is now the full-time juvenile team leader. They ended the year with a small backlog.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Martha Grant had no report.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen - Richard Nunes agreed the court is very busy and all the cases on the calendar today. He also announced the new acting deputy is Eileen McFarland.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported on the site visits and formal program reviews conducted, including:

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG), Psychological Evaluation (PE): formal program review results: 94.5 total points received out of 96 points (98.4%), with a recommendation to fill a vacant position.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP): formal program review results: 122 total points received out of 123 points; (99.2%), with recommendations to fill vacant position, explore other transportation options, outings and other activities, and ways to increase parent engagement.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP): The site visit took place at the Conklin Youth Center, 125 Essex Street, Hackensack. The team started with a file review. They reviewed four open and three closed files. The files were uniform and in good order.

The team then interviewed 2 youth. One youth came late to the program. The youth answered the questions but were a little resistant. They spoke highly of the food and the cooking class. One youth was frustrated with his lack of progress. He said he wanted more help but did not know what he needed. The team then observed the group. The theme of the group was perception. The staff leads the group and encourages peer-to-peer support among them.

A motion by Shelby Klein, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, *to approve the BCDFG PE and BCDFG ASAP virtual program reviews and BCDFG ASAP site visit report was carried.* Kristen Ambrosio, Nick Montello, Tara Smith, Jorge Sandoval and Jared Lautz abstained.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Coastal & Northern New Jersey (BBBS): The site visit took place in the cafeteria of Roy W. Brown Middle School, located at 130 S. Washington Avenue in Bergenfield. Program manager Rachel Kinne greeted the monitoring team, who then interviewed three youth participants. The youth provided positive feedback, expressing that they enjoyed the interactive games, making new friends, and would recommend the program to others. They also requested a session or tour at the high school before the end of the year. The team observed an interactive "Shark Tank" activity, where the youth were divided into groups to create and pitch a product to their peers, who then voted on the best one. The youth were actively engaged, demonstrating skills like time management, teamwork, and public speaking. The staff were professional, encouraging, and positively interacting with the participants. The team was able to review the first section of the monitoring tool.

BBBS formal program monitoring reviews results: 106.5 total points received out of 107 points (99.5%) with a recommendation is to have the middle school youth visit and/or meet at the high school to get familiar with the environment.

A motion by Harry Lisa, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, *to approve the BBBS virtual program monitoring review was carried.*

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the required documentation (certified assurances and grant conditions) was submitted to the State for the 2024 - 2026 Plan and application.

The Bylaws are still being updated and will be presented possibly at next month's meeting. The 2025 Plan Update has not yet been released. The following virtual program reviews are scheduled: YWCA on Thursday, August 13th at 10:00 am; TMR Mental Health Care on August 12th at 10:00 am; BCDFG Culinary Arts is rescheduled for Friday, August 16th at 10:00 am; and Teaneck Public Schools will be reviewed in October 2024. MDT is meeting on August 8th.

Harry Lisa thanked all participants for their involvement in the program reviews

Program Updates:

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 11 youth in total, 7 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), 2 youth phone electronic monitoring (PEM), and 2 youth are on regular ATD.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 25 youth participated in the program being referred by Youth Resources, ASAP, Essex House and Empower House on a weekly basis. Ro suggested purchasing ingredients and giving it to the kids with the recipe so they could cook at home as well.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 8 youth in the program (3 female and 5 male), 5 youth just completed BIPAS cycle.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 3 referrals in July

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 0 referrals in July

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 1 referral in July

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 28 referrals in July serving a total of 59 municipalities. Twelve municipalities in July, which is an increase of 8 referrals more from this time last year.

Visions – 7 young adult residents (4 male, 2 female, 1 transgender)

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth (5 male and 2 female)

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 7 youth (3 male and 4 female), 2 from Bergen County and 5 out of county. The shelter has a capacity of 16 beds.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 6 male youth, 4 from Bergen County and 2 out of county. The numbers were reduced because of staff retention. They are continuing to recruit new staff. New Jersey Juvenile Detention Association annual training conference will be from September 11th through the 13th at The Tropicana Hotel in Atlantic City, NJ. More information can be found on their website: www.njjda.org. The basketball court is out for bidding and may be done before the winter.

Teaneck Public Schools – No report

Children's Aid and Family Services – National Night Out is today and there are 6 cancellations of the 20 so far due to weather. The 7 Habits' of Highly Effective Teens was completed. Stephanie Drag thanked those responding to the survey for the Seeds of Change conference.

Probation – During the summer, the program slows down due to vacations. Next parent orientation program is scheduled for September 24th.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – The school program is on pause for the summer but preparing up for the fall, actively developing curriculum for the school year focusing on coming up with activities that are going to be engaging and meaningful. The staff had the opportunity to go through a training geared towards strategies on how to elevate and energize the program sessions. A successful match happened at the end of July with a nine-year-old mentee from North Arlington who is so excited to meet his Big Brother.

TMR Mental Health Care – During the summer, it is slow due to vacations. Currently there are 20 kids enrolled.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported that JJC had a graduation for six residents in the entrepreneurship program, which took place twice a week for six months. Another initiative taking place is making sure that all our eligible youth will be registered to vote.

There were 117 registered voters in the JJC. There are six youth from Bergen County in the JJC currently, which is a high number.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – No report

Old Business – none

New Business – Matt Stanislao reported that the Bergen County Juvenile Officers Association is partnering with Bergen’s Promise to provide training that will connect juvenile detectives with the clinicians to demonstrate the power of behavioral health interventions and reduce the number of cases going through the court system. Additionally, John Dixon shared that Bergen’s Promise is creating a new court operations manager position.

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported Marie LaTesta, who previously served as a designee for Louis DeLisio, is no longer employed by the County and will not attend any future BCYSC meetings. She reached out to the office but has not heard back. She was a very active member and will be missed.

The next BCYSC membership meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, September 4, 2024.

Adiyah Washington called the membership meeting to order

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Liana Dinallo *to approve the amended BCYSC August 6, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile) / Bergen County Council on Juvenile Justice System Improvement (BCCJJS) Steering Committee – Judge Francois reported that while the overall case counts have dropped slightly over the summer, the severity and difficulty of the remaining cases have increased tremendously. The judge noted a rise in possession of illegal firearms, car thefts, and involvement of juveniles from other counties. In just the past few months, there have been about 6 waivers filed to move cases to adult court, which is a significant increase. Regarding placement for youth who have been offended multiple times, this continues to be an issue, as some of the residential programs have long waitlists. The demand exceeds the available resources.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo echoed Judge Francois' previous statement and noted that phase two construction upgrades is still pending.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile - Seth Victor introduced new juvenile assistant prosecutor Jamirca Nuesi. He also echoed the previous reports. He reported low-level offenses are being handled through station house adjustments rather than going to court as it should be done. They are still seeing a spike in out of county youth committing offenses. They have seen a spike in guns with Bergen County youth and youth from out of county. While car thefts have not increased, they are still high. There are a lot of heavy violent offense, guns, and robberies. The minimum age legislation is still pending. It needs to be tracked and can be concerning. A bill to change the venue to have the youth prosecuted in the county of offense is pending. This will have a huge effect on Bergen County. There are only seven detention centers and there are issues with capacity and staffing in other counties. Bergen County is fortunate to have a detention center within the County. It is a complicated issue. There is also an increase in school threats now that school is in session. The Judge said she is seeing many issues with parents enrolling issues in school especially with returning to school after an offense. The youth need to have a plan in place that does not interrupt schooling. Jamie Ziegelhofer reported there is a new Superintendent of Schools that is a member of the BCYSC. They are being contacted and will hopefully attend in the future. Kristen Ambrosio suggested SPAN and the CAPE center to aid with education issues with the youth.

Rosemarie Lobretto and Anne Giacobbe recommended contacting the Family Support Organization for some support as well. Shekinah Williams from Bergen's Promise is also following up regarding this situation. Dr. Montello offered to discuss the situation with the Judge at a later date.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen - Richard Nunes also echoed the previous reports. Mental health programming residential and things to do with youth with severe mental health needs. They are struggling with residential placements. Bergen Volunteer Center and the Empower House and Empower House program run by Family Guidance were mentioned as two possible options. Additionally, Nunes emphasized the need for strong, positive mentors. Richard announced a new Deputy Public Defender, Johnny Cardona and two new attorneys transferred from Law Guardian.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer will be emailing a flyer for juvenile detention officer candidates for open positions. The 2025 Plan update and application was received.

Adiyah Washington reported the allocation subcommittee met and discussed budget modifications as follows:

Psychological Evaluations

- Personnel reduced \$4,000
 - Program hours and amounts adjusted
- Materials and Supplies increased \$4,000

RSAP Budget changes:

- Personnel reduced \$5,300
 - Vacant position reduced
- Furniture & Equipment line increased \$1,000
- Consultant line increased \$2,000
 - Key-note speaker actual cost lower than budgeted
- Material and Supplies increased \$2,000 line to cover additional material needed for the Conference
- Miscellaneous line increased \$2,300 to cover anticipated Conference costs

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the BCDFG PE & RSAP budget modifications.*

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported on the site visits and formal program reviews conducted, including:

The Superior Court of New Jersey, Bergen Vicinage, Probation's Youth and Family Engagement Programs' site visit and virtual formal program review. The visit took place at 39 Hudson Street, Hackensack. It was an ice cream with the chief event. The chief, Amanda, was scooping the ice cream. The youth met with their probation officer then were offered an ice cream cone, bowl, or Italian ice. There were various ice cream and toppings offered. The monitoring team interviewed three youth. All had positive comments for the program and staff.

Probation formal program monitoring reviews results: 94 points received out of 96 points (97.9%) with no recommendations at this time.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Adiyah Washington, **to approve Probation's site visit and formal virtual program monitoring review was carried.** Janice Conti and Richard Nunes abstained.

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Alternatives to Detention (ATD) Program: The site visit took place at 200 North Street, Teterboro. There were 3 staff members present and 4 youth (1 arrived late). The team interviewed three youth. They answered questions and responded appropriately. The team observed a group lesson on first impressions. The youth were engaged and the staff member leading the group was interactive and encouraged participation from each youth.

The BCDFG ATD formal program monitoring reviews results: 117 points received out of 120 points (97.5%) with a recommendation to explore outside speakers and to reconsider the new location's proximity to the detention center.

The BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) formal program monitoring results: 89.7 points received out of 93 points (96.4%) with a recommendation to research and utilize the newest social media platforms when discussing technology driven SHA, explore a need for a budget line for paid programming based on data collected, county outreach, fill the vacant per diem position.

The BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) program monitoring results: 103 points received out of 105 points (98.1%) with the recommendation to review curriculum annually to stay up to date with current technology and trends of the youth.

A motion by Adiyah Washington, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, **to approve the BCDFG ATD site visit, BCDFG ADT, RSAP and UTR formal virtual program monitoring reviews, was carried.** Kristen Ambrosio, Nick Montello and Jared Lautz abstained.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS), Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits site visit: The site visit took place at the Englewood Public Library, 31 Engle St, Englewood. The monitoring team observed youth participating in 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens. Three staff members were conducting an interactive activity with 19 youth (15 girls and 4 boys). The program started with an icebreaker activity. The youth caught a ball and had to answer the question their finger landed on. The staff was energetic and engaging. The youth talked and actively participated in the activities. They discussed the difference between being reactive or proactive in certain situations, practicing self-confidence, making tough decisions, and discussing the roles they play in their lives with family and friends. The staff had refreshments prepared for the youth. The monitoring team interviewed 3 youth who were very new in the program. The youth were highly engaged, talking and actively participating throughout the activities. They suggested the program to be longer and to meet more often in the week. CAFS Empowering Peers & Inspiring Change (EPIC) Youth Groups and Seeds of Change Youth Conference site visit: The site visit took place at the Lodi Public Library, 1 Memorial Drive, Lodi. The monitoring team interviewed three youth. The youth took part in the EPIC events throughout the year such as locker slams and narcan training. All spoke highly of the program especially the food. They liked spreading positive messages and leading. The team then observed the EPIC youth participating in the 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens group. They were answering questions that eventually led to a vision board activity. All youth were actively engaged and the staff was dynamic and attentive.

The CAFS LST formal program monitoring review results: 117 points received out of 117 points (100%) with no recommendations.

The CAFS EPIC formal program monitoring results: 114 points received out of 114 points (100%) with no recommendations.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Janice Conti, **to approve the CAFS LST and EPIC site visit and formal monitoring was carried.**

Program Updates:

Big Brothers Big Sisters – Lisa Cieplechowicz reported that the community-based program has already made 12 new matches in Bergen County. The program at Lincoln Elementary and the program at Roy Brown Middle School with Bergenfield High School have both started recruiting participants, collecting applications, scheduling interviews, and preparing for program kickoffs, which are planned to take place between late October and mid-November.

Teaneck Public Schools – Nick Campestre reported they are currently conducting intakes, holding family meetings, and will be starting group sessions next week. They are aiming to meet or exceed their annual level of service target. They will be submitting the spending plan for the remaining year soon.

Children's Aid and Family Services – Stephanie Drag reported that students in the Hackensack and Englewood districts have returned to school. The 8th graders are now 9th graders and they returned to the program. The students are excited to participate in Knockout Opioid Abuse Day on October 11th, in partnership with the Lodi Police Department, and they have received the narcan training. Additionally, the Seeds of Change conference will be held at Fairleigh Dickinson University on Monday, November 25th during the school day, with a focus on the 8 dimensions of wellness.

TMR Mental Health Care – Tasia Milicevic reported 38 youth are currently enrolled in the program. The available funds will be utilized over the course of the year.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 1 new referral in September

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 9 youth in the program (4 female, 5 male); 4 youth completed BIPAS cycle; 0 in PAVE; 18 referrals for evaluations, 10 from the Court, and 8 through Probation.

YWCA – No report

Probation – Janice Conti reported POP was completed last week. The life skills are continuing with how to tie a tie and how to sew a button. She reiterated the education issues with youth on Probation as well. There seems to be an issue with aggression among youth in schools, which leads to many of the issues. Kristen Ambrosio reminded everyone that Bergen County offers a no cost, hybrid High School Equivalency (HSE) program through the county's family guidance services. This program is held in-person at the Bergen Community College campus in Lyndhurst.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported that currently there are 6 youth in their facilities and anticipating more youth once, they are done with court. There is an increase in Bergen County as well as other NJ counties.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – No report

Old Business – None

New Business – Rosemarie Lobretto asked to invite the new Superintendent of Schools to the meeting and to meet with the Judge. Jamie Ziegelhofer is sending a letter to welcome them to the BCYSC. It is important to have representation on the BCYSC. Adiyah Washington requested accommodation be sent to Harry Lisa for his service on the BCYSC.

Announcement - Kristen Ambrosio announced the 4th Annual Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Conference, will be held on Thursday, October 24th from 9:30 AM to 2:00 PM at Biagio's Terrace Grand Ballroom located at 299 Paramus Rd. in Paramus.

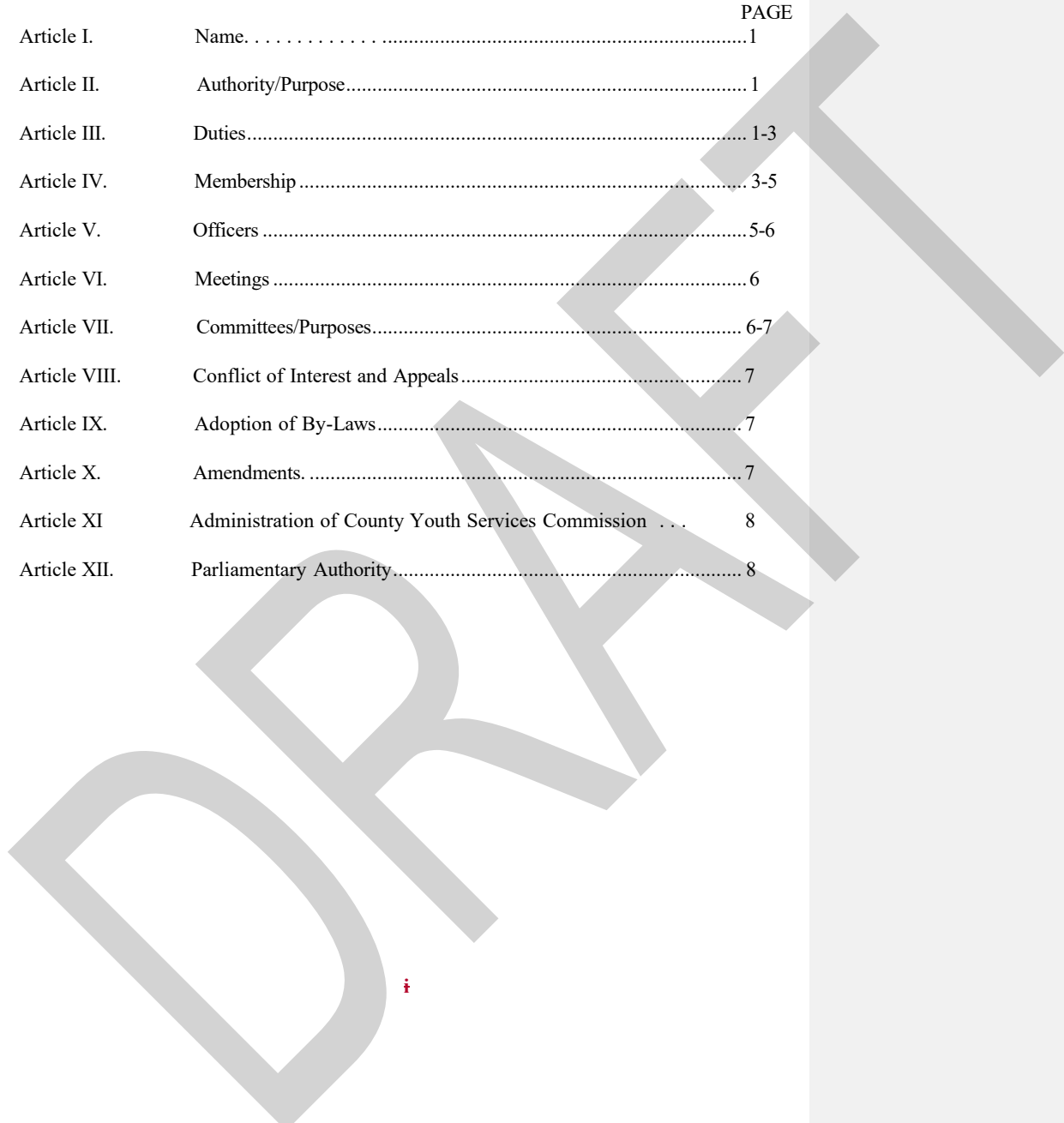

YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION BYLAWS

DRAFT

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**ARTICLE I.
NAME**

The name of this organization shall be the Bergen County Youth Services Commission, hereinafter referred to as the BCYSC.

**ARTICLE II.
AUTHORITY/PURPOSE**

Pursuant to N.J.A.C. Title 13. Law and Public Safety Chapter 90. Juvenile Justice Commission, the organizational structure, duties, etc. for county youth services commissions are detailed in Title 13. Subchapter 2. 13:90-2.1-2.10. the requirements of the Partnership/Family Court Program are detailed in Title 13. Subchapter 3. 13:90-3.1-3.13.

The BCYSC is designated by the County Executive, and reaffirmed with Freeholder Resolution, to be the entity in the County of Bergen, for the planning, implementing, monitoring and evaluation of services and programs of the Juvenile Justice System in Bergen County. The BCYSC shall also be responsible for developing recommendations for the allocation of the Partnership/Family Court Program Funds, which are Juvenile Justice Commission funding awarded to the County of Bergen.

**ARTICLE III.
DUTIES**

- 1) To prepare, and submit a comprehensive triennial plan (hereafter known as the Plan), out year updates, and annual funding applications provided for in N.J.A.C. 13:90-3.11, with respect to the totality of services and programs comprising the county's juvenile justice service system;
- 2) To make recommendations to coordinate and integrate existing sanctions and services for juveniles adjudicated or charged as delinquent and delinquency prevention programs;
- 3) To assess and prioritize the needs of youth adjudicated or charged delinquent;
- 4) To assess existing delinquency prevention programs to determine whether such programs meet the needs of youth, are effective in meeting program goals and in ensuring financial accountability;
- 5) To determine, through the collection and maintenance of data, the nature and scope of juvenile delinquency and related problems in the county and identify the geographical regions within the county where such offenses and problems are most prevalent;
- 6) To propose a system of sanctions and services for youth adjudicated or charged as delinquent, that includes identifying geographical regions within the county where

existing programs do not satisfy the needs of such youth, and developing proposals for closing gaps in the delivery of such sanctions and services;

7) To review, evaluate, and monitor through at least one site visit annually, existing sanctions and services under the jurisdiction, control, or proposed by the Bergen County Youth Services Commission, for juveniles adjudicated or charged delinquent and existing delinquency prevention programs to determine effectiveness in meeting program goals and in ensuring financial accountability;

8) To recommend to the county governing body, the approval or disapproval of contracts with providers seeking to participate in the Partnership/Family Court Program;

9) To cooperate with other State, county, and municipal agencies and other entities in the planning of ongoing efforts relating to the county's juvenile justice service system;

10) To inform the public of the scope of juvenile offenses, the needs of youth in the county and the availability of sanctions and services, and advocate for the needs of youth;

11) To serve as an advisory body of the county on issues relating to sanctions and services for juveniles adjudicated or charged as delinquent and delinquency prevention programs.

12) To coordinate the efforts of municipal and regional youth services commissions and ensure their participation in the county planning process;

13) To appoint liaisons to participate in planning and related activities with appropriate planning bodies (i.e., Human Services Advisory Council, Local Advisory Committee on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, Mental Health Board - Professional Advisory Committee, County Interagency Coordinating Council-CIACC), as invited, to maximize efficient and effective use of the Partnership/Family Court Grant Funds;

14) To determine whether a need exists, and if so, sponsor the establishment of Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDT's) to plan specific sanctions/services to individual youth:
a) As an alternative to detention of a juvenile charged as delinquent; b) As a recommendation for a disposition option of a judge of the Family Court upon an adjudication of delinquency; and c) As a component of aftercare following the commitment of a juvenile to the Juvenile Justice Commission by a judge of the Family Court;

15) To coordinate the planning of aftercare sanctions and services for juveniles returning to the community following commitment to or placement with the Juvenile Justice Commission by a judge of the Family Court;

16) To use the Commission's web-based Juvenile Automated Management System (JAMS) for purposes of periodic reporting to the Commission of programmatic, contract and contractor, fiscal, monitoring, and all other information material to juveniles served by the Partnership/Family Court Program and any other programs administered by the Juvenile Justice Commission;

17) To prepare and submit written monitoring reports and evaluations, subject to review by the Executive Director of the Juvenile Justice Commission or designee: a. Monitoring the operations of programs receiving Partnership/Family Court Program funds and/or other funds administered by the Juvenile Justice Commission for compliance with program requirements; and b. Evaluating the impact of those programs on targeted beneficiaries;

18. To encourage the involvement of youth and families in the planning of services and sanctions and program development.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Number and Composition

- a. The BCYSC shall consist of not less than 20-23 voting members under two separate Categories: Specified and Unspecified.
- b. The BCYSC shall reflect the racial, ethnic and cultural demographic composition of the county and youth in the county served by sanctions/services and delinquency prevention programs planned, implemented, monitored and evaluated by the BCYSC.
- c. Membership:

Specified Membership Category

1. Superior Court-Family Part, Presiding Judge or a Superior Court Family Part Judge who hears delinquency matters in the county, as designee
2. Superior Court-Family Part, Bergen Vicinage Family Division Manager or the Assistant Family Division Manager for the county or senior staff person, as designee
3. Vicinage Chief Probation Officer or the Vicinage Assistant Chief Probation Officer in charge of juvenile matters, as designee
4. Bergen County Executive or other elected official, or senior staff person, as designee
5. Bergen County Prosecutor or the highest-ranking assistant prosecutor handling juvenile matters, as designee
6. Regional Public Defender or the highest-ranking assistant public defender handling juvenile matters, as designee
7. NJ Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permancy, Bergen/Hudson Liaison
8. Bergen County Department of Health Services, Division of Mental Health Administrator
9. Bergen County Superintendent of Schools
10. Bergen County Technical and Special Services School Districts, Superintendent
11. Director of the Bergen County Department of Human Services
12. Bergen County Director of the Youth Shelter
13. Bergen County Administrator of the Juvenile Detention Center
14. Bergen County Juvenile Family Crisis Intervention Unit Supervisor
15. President of the Juvenile Officers Association or designee
16. Bergen County Department of Health Services, Office of Alcohol and Drug Dependency Director
17. Workforce Development Board, Executive Director, or designee

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18. A representative of the business community that serves at-risk and justice-involved youth in the county
19. A parent of an at-risk or justice-involved youth or a representative from an organization working on behalf of parents of an at-risk or justice-involved youth
20. A youth with exposure to or experience in the juvenile justice system who has not yet reached the age of 26 years
21. A representative from a nonprofit community organization located in or working on behalf of one of the most densely populated areas within the county
22. See Unspecified Membership Category
23. At its discretion and based on its needed representation, up to six additional individual members who have knowledge, experience, or interest in local youth, the local community, or the juvenile justice system

The name of designees will be submitted to the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairs, on an annual basis. If a single voting member fulfills two roles identified above, then that voting member shall only have one vote.~~

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In the event that there is a change in personnel within the Specified Membership Category, the individual who assumes the position will become an automatic member of the BCYSC.

Unspecified Membership Category

Will consist of at least two (2), but not more than ~~eleven (11)~~ eight (8) individuals in total from the ~~categories-groups~~ noted below. Each Unspecified Member shall demonstrate knowledge relevant to the county’s population involved in, or at risk of involvement in the juvenile justice system. Appointments shall be made in such a way as to fulfill the objective that membership reflect the racial, ethnic, and cultural demographic make-up of the county and the youth in the county served by the sanctions and services and the delinquency prevention programs planned, implemented, monitored, and evaluated by the BCYSC.

Unspecified Members may appoint designees to sit on the BCYSC in their absence, provided that no more than one designee for any member may be appointed and further provided that the designee is qualified by knowledge and/or experience to perform the duties of a member of the BCYSC. The name of designees will be submitted to the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairs, on an annual basis.

Appointment to the BCYSC Unspecified Membership Category shall be upon the recommendation of the BCYSC, with no term limits, with final approval by the Bergen County Executive.

Section 2. Specified and Unspecified Member Responsibilities

- a. Shall have the right to vote at BCYSC meetings.
- b. Shall comply with the Bergen County YSC Conflict(s) of Interest Policy.
- c. Shall serve, at a minimum, on one of the BCYSC Standing Committees, as well as on task forces/subcommittees, as needed.
- d. In the event that an unspecified member of the BCYSC does not attend three (3) consecutive BCYSC Membership Meetings or a total of four (4) BCYSC Membership

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Meetings during a calendar year, shall be subject to removal upon the recommendation of the BCYSC to the Bergen County Executive, unless such member has advised the BCYSC

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of extenuating circumstances causing the absences. In the event that a specified member of the BCYSC does not attend three (3) consecutive BCYSC Membership Meetings or a total of four (4) BCYSC Membership Meetings during a calendar year, a letter will be sent to remind the member of membership responsibilities as stated in N.J.A.C. Title 13. Law And Public Safety Chapter 90. Juvenile Justice Commission

Section 3. Resource Members (Ex-Officio)

The NJ Juvenile Justice Commission Court Liaison shall serve as an Ex-Officio Member, with no voting privileges, on the BCYSC. One representative from each of the following agencies may serve as an Ex-Officio Member, with no voting privileges, on the BCYSC: NJ Department of Human Services; NJ Department of Labor and Workforce Development, NJ Department of Education; NJ Department of Health; NJ Department of Community Affairs and NJ Department of Children and Families.

ARTICLE V. OFFICERS

Section 1. The Officers of the BCYSC shall be the Chairperson and one or more Co-Chairpersons, each of whom shall be a member of the BCYSC.

Section 2. The BCYSC Officers shall be elected at the first BCYSC membership meeting of the year annual meeting (January) of the BCYSC and shall serve from then until the first membership meeting of the subsequent year next annual meeting. ~~No office shall be held by the same person more than two (2) terms in succession.~~

Section 4.3. The Chairperson and/or the Co-Chairpersons shall preside over the BCYSC ~~annual and~~ monthly Membership Meetings; appoint Sub-committees and task forces with the approval of the membership; shall not be a representative of a funded agency. In order to avoid a conflict of interest or a perceived conflict of interest, the chairperson or co-chairperson cannot be the supervisor of the youth services commission administrator.

Section 4. In the event of a vacancy in any office, appointment to fill the unexpired term shall be recommended by the Chair or Co-Chairpersons, with the approval of the BCYSC Membership.

Section 5. In the event that the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairpersons are unable to attend a BCYSC ~~annual and/or~~ monthly Membership Meeting, the BCYSC members shall elect a Co-Chairperson Pro Tempore.

ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS

Section 1. The BCYSC shall meet no less frequently than six times annually, a minimum of nine (9) times per year, provided that no more than nine weeks shall elapse between

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meetings. Notice of each meeting, in writing, shall be given to all members at least one (1) week before this meeting.

Section 2. All BCYSC meetings shall be held at such times and in such locations as to encourage maximum public attendance, and be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Senator Byron M. Baer Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-6 et seq. Up to half of the youth services commission's scheduled meetings may be held by video conference call.

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Section 3. Special Meetings may be called by the Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons or called upon the written request to the Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons by three (3) BCYSC members. The purpose of such meetings shall be stated with the request and no other business shall be transacted. All members shall be notified to time, place and purpose of the meeting.

Section 4. A quorum for all BCYSC meetings shall consist of a third of the voting membership (Specified and Unspecified Categories).

~~Section 5. There shall be an annual meeting in January for the purpose of electing officers and conducting any other business that may come before the BCYSC.~~

Section 56. Minutes for each meeting shall be recorded in writing and distributed to the BCYSC, by the Youth Services Commission Administrator.

Section 6. A 2/3 majority vote is required when voting on whether to allow a county to allocate up to 1/3 of its program component of a Partnership Grant Program allocation for county-provided sanctions and services pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:90-3.11(c)7iii

Section 7. Voting shall be permitted by email prior to the meeting if a member and their designee cannot be present

ARTICLE VII. COMMITTEES/PURPOSES

Section 1. The BCYSC shall have a minimum of three (3) Standing Committees:

Allocations – prepare triennial plan allocation recommendations, review program proposals and develop recommendations for the distribution of the (Partnership/Family Court Program Funds), and conduct, at a minimum, annual program reviews on those programs which received fund for the purpose of developing recommendations for the renewal of such funds to the programs;

ByLaws/Nominating – review and develop amendments, as necessary; develop recommendations for the membership categories of Undesignated, and Slate of Officers;

Planning – 1) prepare and implement a triennial Plan, with annual updates, 2) develop a

continuum of sanctions and services for the target population, 3) develop delinquency prevention programs, 4) review minority overrepresentation in the Juvenile Justice System and develop recommendations, accordingly, 5) inform the community of the service needs and/or concerns of the target population.

Section 2. Each committee shall consist of a voting majority of the BCYSC Members. Resource Members may also participate on the committees and shall have voting privileges.

Section 3. The Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons of the BCYSC shall appoint the Chairpersons of the Standing Committees.

Section 4. Committees shall report to the full BCYSC.

⁶ Section 5. The quorum for all committees shall be a majority of the committee members.

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ARTICLE VIII.

CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND APPEALS

The BCYSC shall: 1) Adhere to a written conflict of interest policy that has been submitted to the NJ Juvenile Justice Commission with a written statement by county counsel that the policy is in compliance with applicable law; 2) Adhere to the Appeals Procedure established by the BCYSC in addressing any appeals.

ARTICLE IX. ADOPTION OF BYLAWS

These Bylaws shall take effect immediately upon adoption of a majority of the BCYSC voting members present at the time of their review, provided that copies of the Bylaws have been distributed to all voting members of the BCYSC at least one (1) week prior to the vote. The BCYSC shall also submit the approved Bylaws to the Juvenile Justice Commission for their review, to assure compliance with applicable rules. A copy of the bylaws will be kept on file with the office of County Counsel.

ARTICLE X. AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the voting members present provided the proposed amendment (s) has been presented at two (2) consecutive meetings of the BCYSC.

Section 2. Notice of proposed amendment(s) shall be given in writing to the membership at least ten (10) days prior to the BCYSC.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATION OF THE BCYSC

a) Responsibility for administering the BCYSC shall rest with the county in which it sits.

b) The day-to-day business of the BCYSC shall be the responsibility of an Administrator. The Administrator shall be an individual who on the basis of education and prior job experience has demonstrated an understanding of and ability to manage public grant programs and an understanding and knowledge of the juvenile justice system and services for at-risk youth.

c) The Executive Director of the New Jersey Juvenile Justice Commission or designee shall review and approve reimbursement of reasonable salary costs as provided in annual program management budgets submitted as part of the annual application, for the administration of programs and services funded in whole or in part through the Juvenile Justice Commission.

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d) The BCYSC Administrator shall maintain membership in, and shall regularly attend meetings of the New Jersey Association of County Youth Services Commission Administrators.

e) Bergen County shall designate such additional staff and organizational resources necessary or appropriate to administer the duties and responsibilities of the BCYSC including, but not limited to one (1) clerical staff.

f)

ARTICLE XII. PARLIAMENTARY AUTHORITY

Roberts Rules of Order, Newly Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority in all matters not covered by the New Jersey Statutes and these Bylaws.

Adiyah Washington called the membership meeting to order.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Janice Conti *to approve the BCYSC October 1, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – Family (Juvenile) / Bergen County Council on Juvenile Justice System Improvement (BCCJJS) Steering Committee – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported there is going to be a directive coming down, which removes the juvenile referee program. The Administrative Office of the Courts has requested the cessation of scheduling hearings for the juvenile referee. Stephen Murphy has a calendar until the end of the month then it will end. Judge Francois has taken on the domestic violence contempt weapons cases, with hearings scheduled for Tuesdays starting January.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor echoed what Liana Dinallo said and wondering if it might extend to other diversion options as well. The ICS and JCC will remain options. A discussion was held regarding the new directive and possible results. We are still seeing an uptick in gun possession and gun violence in Bergen County.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – No report

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates - Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2025 Plan Update and Application are still a work in progress. She reminded voting members to check their emails for some voting that will need to be done prior to the December meeting and to reply all with a vote of yes, no, or abstain. The next meeting will be in person with the BCYSC Conference. The conference is still in the planning stage and is looking for a few presenters if anybody has suggestions. All are encouraged to attend. The conference will take place at 2 Bergen County Plaza, Conference room, and will include breakfast and lunch. A flyer with full details will be provided to the membership soon. All site visits are now complete. The last virtual formal review will be on Wednesday, November 13th at 10:00am and two voting members are still needed to attend. The updated bylaws were presented for a second time. Jamie Ziegelhofer fully reviewed the bylaws with the BCYSC again. The Bylaws will be presented for a vote at the December meeting. Jamie Ziegelhofer reminded the confidence closet proposals are due on Friday, November 6th at 4:30pm. Stephanie Drag suggested creating a youth subcommittee that meets separately and reports to the BCYSC. This idea will be explored further.

Adiyah Washington reported the BCYSC Allocation Subcommittee met on Tuesday, October 22nd and are recommending to approve the following budget modifications:

YWCA

Personnel

Equity Specialist - Decrease salary from \$7143 to \$5287. Position was filled midway Quarter 2. The Equity Specialist experienced an increase in hours during summer programming while working with program participants.

Director of Equity- Increase salary from \$2000 to \$2883. Position remained vacant due to limited candidate pool to fill it, therefore CEO allocated 2.5 hours for support, coordination, and execution.

Fringes – Decrease from \$1839 to \$1199 for both positions

Materials & Supplies –

Marketing - Increase from \$2000 to \$3700. The expenses for marketing, printing, and outreach will be fully accounted for in Q4. These expenses have been incurred throughout the program for community outreach resulting in program participant recruitment. The increased expense was required to conduct adequate outreach to program participants.

You Science – Decrease from \$500 to \$488. The amount for YouScience subscription was lower than budgeted, therefore a decrease occurred.

Zoom – Increase from \$125 to \$863.46 The Zoom Subscription increase was a need for the program deliverables and have speakers present to the program participants.

Specific Assistance to Clients

Participant Meals – Decrease from \$1138 to \$1099. The lunch expenses will be accounted for in Q4. The lunches were provided to participants during the summer programming participants. The actual amount was less than budgeted, therefore a decrease in this line item.

Participant Incentives – Decrease from \$1600 to \$825; \$160 p/ incentive @ 5 participants plus applicable fees for purchase.

Program Updates:

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) – 15 students signed up to be mentees at Roy Brown Middle School, while 18 students participated at Bergenfield High School. The kickoff event was a success, with mentors and mentees engaging in icebreakers and conversation starters. The BMW mentoring program will begin next week at Lincoln Elementary with 33 students signed up.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – 20 students enrolled they are meeting twice a week for middle school and twice a week for high school. Next week they will be starting their field trips activities, which is a big part of the program.

Children’s Aid and Family Services (CAFS) – LST is entering the second marking period in Hackensack and Teaneck. The EPIC (Empowering Peers, Inspiring Change) group in Lodi continues to grow and engage 9th and 8th graders successfully. They use the library as a mutual meeting spot, but the group may be outgrowing the venue. The group has been actively involved in various initiatives, including a trunk-or-treat event, running red ribbon campaigns at the middle school, etc. They are a very engaged group, eager to participate in a wide range of activities.

Seeds of Change conference is on Monday, November 25th at Fairleigh Dickinson University. The theme is dimensions of wellness. The conference will provide breakfast and lunch for the attendees. NJ4S has collaborated to offer transportation and cover the cost of the keynote speaker, Erin Pompa, who will share her personal story about substance use, recovery, and the importance of the dimensions of wellness for overall health. There will be a panel discussion and planned activities for the youth. Seven schools from six different districts have expressed interest in attending the conference to date.

TMR Mental Health Care – The youth program is currently at full capacity with 40 youth enrolled and provided 1,113 sessions so far this year. Recently, the program underwent renovations, including updates to the playroom to create a more inviting and creative space for sessions. Additionally, the program will now offer trauma-informed yoga for some of the youth with a new yoga room.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 5 new referrals in October 22 unduplicated youth participated in the program of those youth 7 indicated interest in our food safety certification option

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 11 evaluations completed in October; 8 youth in the program (5 female, 3 male); 2 referrals for BIPAS; 1 referral in PAVE

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 2 referrals in October

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 2 referrals in October

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 2 new referrals in October

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 23 referrals serving a total of 59 municipalities. No new municipalities in October, up 13 referrals from last year.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 16 youth; 5 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), 4 youth on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), and 7 youth in non-bracelet ATD.

Visions – 8 young adult residents (3 female, 5 male)

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth (2 female, and 5 male)

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 8 youth (6 female, 2 male), 3 from Bergen, and 5 out of County.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 13 residents (1 female, 12 male), 10 from Bergen. It was announced that the basketball court is currently being built.

YWCA – No report

Probation – Last paint night for 2024 was on October 22nd. They will be creating hygiene kits for the youth, including toothbrush, toothpaste, soap, shampoo, and men's specific shampoo and wipes, etc.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported that the Youth Service Conference, held last month in Princeton, celebrated 20 years of the Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI). The two-day event featured numerous informative sessions and strong representation from Bergen County. The conference provided an excellent opportunity for networking and learning.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – The JDAI conference was last month. There were a lot of workshops and it provided a lot of information.

Old Business – A discussion was held regarding the ongoing education issues with justice involved youth.

New Business – Patrick Fletcher became the Executive County Superintendent of Schools on September 16th. Prior to the COVID-19 pandemic, Patrick Fletcher worked closely with the Division of Mental Health to secure Bergen County as the nation's pilot site for teen Mental Health First Aid, a significant accomplishment noted by Michele Hart-Loughlin.

Tamara Contreras joined the meeting for the first time representing [The Center for Prevention and Counseling in Sussex County](#) overseeing a grant from the New Jersey Department of Health that allows her to work with youth across all of northern New Jersey. In this role, Ms. Contreras has access to resources and information that could help promote positive school climates. The goal is to attend various meetings to listen to the resources available in other counties and share them with community and school partners. Additionally, there is a grant opportunity for certain schools to apply for funding to help promote positive school climates.

Announcement – none

The next BCYSC membership meeting and conference is scheduled for Tuesday, December 3, 2024 in person at 2 Bergen County Plaza in Hackensack.

YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION BYLAWS

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**ARTICLE I.
NAME**

The name of this organization shall be the Bergen County Youth Services Commission, hereinafter referred to as the BCYSC.

ARTICLE II. AUTHORITY/PURPOSE

Pursuant to N.J.A.C. Title 13. Law and Public Safety Chapter 90. Juvenile Justice Commission, the organizational structure, duties, etc. for county youth services commissions are detailed in Title 13. Subchapter 2. 13:90-2.1-2.10. the requirements of the Partnership/Family Court Program are detailed in Title 13. Subchapter 3. 13:90-3.1-3.13.

The BCYSC is designated by the County Executive, and reaffirmed with Freeholder Resolution, to be the entity in the County of Bergen, for the planning, implementing, monitoring and evaluation of services and programs of the Juvenile Justice System in Bergen County. The BCYSC shall also be responsible for developing recommendations for Juvenile Justice Commission funding awarded to the County of Bergen.

ARTICLE III. DUTIES

- 1) To prepare, and submit a comprehensive triennial plan (hereafter known as the Plan), out year updates, and annual funding applications provided for in N.J.A.C. 13:90-3.11, with respect to the totality of services and programs comprising the county's juvenile justice service system;
- 2) To make recommendations to coordinate and integrate existing sanctions and services for juveniles adjudicated or charged as delinquent and delinquency prevention programs;
- 3) To assess and prioritize the needs of youth adjudicated or charged delinquent;
- 4) To assess existing delinquency prevention programs to determine whether such programs meet the needs of youth, are effective in meeting program goals and in ensuring financial accountability;
- 5) To determine, through the collection and maintenance of data, the nature and scope of juvenile delinquency and related problems in the county and identify the geographical regions within the county where such offenses and problems are most prevalent;
- 6) To propose a system of sanctions and services for youth adjudicated or charged as delinquent, that includes identifying geographical regions within the county where

existing programs do not satisfy the needs of such youth, and developing proposals for closing gaps in the delivery of such sanctions and services;

- 7) To review, evaluate, and monitor through at least one site visit annually, existing

sanctions and services under the jurisdiction, control, or proposed by the Bergen County Youth Services Commission, for juveniles adjudicated or charged delinquent and existing delinquency prevention programs to determine effectiveness in meeting program goals and in ensuring financial accountability;

8) To recommend to the county governing body, the approval or disapproval of contracts with providers seeking to participate in the Partnership/Family Court Program;

9) To cooperate with other State, county, and municipal agencies and other entities in the planning of ongoing efforts relating to the county's juvenile justice service system;

10) To inform the public of the scope of juvenile offenses, the needs of youth in the county and the availability of sanctions and services, and advocate for the needs of youth;

11) To serve as an advisory body of the county on issues relating to sanctions and services for juveniles adjudicated or charged as delinquent and delinquency prevention programs.

12) To coordinate the efforts of municipal and regional youth services commissions and ensure their participation in the county planning process;

13) To appoint liaisons to participate in planning and related activities with appropriate planning bodies (i.e., Human Services Advisory Council, Local Advisory Committee on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, Mental Health Board - Professional Advisory Committee, County Interagency Coordinating Council-CIACC), as invited, to maximize efficient and effective use of the Partnership/Family Court Grant Funds;

14) To determine whether a need exists, and if so, sponsor the establishment of Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDT's) to plan specific sanctions/services to individual youth:

a) As an alternative to detention of a juvenile charged as delinquent; b) As a recommendation for a disposition option of a judge of the Family Court upon an adjudication of delinquency; and c) As a component of aftercare following the commitment of a juvenile to the Juvenile Justice Commission by a judge of the Family Court;

15) To coordinate the planning of aftercare sanctions and services for juveniles returning to the community following commitment to or placement with the Juvenile Justice Commission by a judge of the Family Court;

16) To use the Commission's web-based Juvenile Automated Management System (JAMS) for purposes of periodic reporting to the Commission of programmatic, contract and contractor, fiscal, monitoring, and all other information material to juveniles served by the Partnership/Family Court Program and any other programs administered by the Juvenile Justice Commission;

17) To prepare and submit written monitoring reports and evaluations, subject to review by the Executive Director of the Juvenile Justice Commission or designee: a. Monitoring the

operations of programs receiving Partnership/Family Court Program funds and/or other funds administered by the Juvenile Justice Commission for compliance with program requirements; and b. Evaluating the impact of those programs on targeted beneficiaries;

18. To encourage the involvement of youth and families in the planning of services and sanctions and program development.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Number and Composition

a. The BCYSC shall consist of not less than 23 voting members under two separate Categories: Specified and Unspecified.

b. The BCYSC shall reflect the racial, ethnic and cultural demographic composition of the county and youth in the county served by sanctions/services and delinquency prevention programs planned, implemented, monitored and evaluated by the BCYSC.

c. Membership:

Specified Membership Category

- 1. Superior Court-Family Part, Presiding Judge or a Superior Court Family Part Judge who hears delinquency matters in the county, as designee**
- 2. Superior Court-Family Part, Bergen Vicinage Family Division Manager or the Assistant Family Division Manager for the county or senior staff person, as designee**
- 3. Vicinage Chief Probation Officer or the Vicinage Assistant Chief Probation Officer in charge of juvenile matters, as designee**
- 4. Bergen County Executive or other elected official, or senior staff person, as designee**
- 5. Bergen County Prosecutor or the highest-ranking assistant prosecutor handling juvenile matters, as designee**
- 6. Regional Public Defender or the highest-ranking assistant public defender handling juvenile matters, as designee**
- 7. NJ Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permanency, Bergen/Hudson Liaison**
- 8. Bergen County Department of Health Services, Division of Mental Health Administrator**
- 9. Bergen County Superintendent of Schools**
- 10. Bergen County Technical and Special Services School Districts, Superintendent**
- 11. Director of the Bergen County Department of Human Services**
- 12. Bergen County Director of the Youth Shelter**
- 13. Bergen County Administrator of the Juvenile Detention Center**
- 14. Bergen County Juvenile Family Crisis Intervention Unit Supervisor**
- 15. President of the Juvenile Officers Association or designee**
- 16. Bergen County Department of Health Services, Office of Alcohol and Drug Dependency Director**

17. Workforce Development Board, Executive Director, or designee

18. A representative of the business community that serves at-risk and justice-involved youth in the county

19. **A parent of an at-risk or justice-involved youth or a representative from an organization working on behalf of parents of an at-risk or justice-involved youth**
20. **A youth with exposure to or experience in the juvenile justice system who has not yet reached the age of 26 years**
21. **A representative from a nonprofit community organization located in or working on behalf of one of the most densely populated areas within the county**
22. **See Unspecified Membership Category**
23. **At its discretion and based on its needed representation, up to six additional individual members who have knowledge, experience, or interest in local youth, the local community, or the juvenile justice system**

Specified Members may appoint designees, provided that the designee is qualified by knowledge and/or experience to perform the duties of a member of the BCYSC. The name of designees will be submitted to the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairs, on an annual basis. If a single voting member fulfills two roles identified above, then that voting member shall only have one vote. In the event that there is a change in personnel within the Specified Membership Category, the individual who assumes the position will become an automatic member of the BCYSC.

Unspecified Membership Category

Will consist of at least two (2), but not more than eight (8) individuals in total from the groups noted below. Each Unspecified Member shall demonstrate knowledge relevant to the county's population involved in, or at risk of involvement in the juvenile justice system. Appointments shall be made in such a way as to fulfill the objective that membership reflect the racial, ethnic, and cultural demographic make-up of the county and the youth in the county served by the sanctions and services and the delinquency prevention programs planned, implemented, monitored, and evaluated by the BCYSC.

- i. Education Sector;
- ii. Mental Health, Family Counseling, Child Advocacy, Domestic Violence, and/or victims' rights groups;
- iii. Clergy;
- iv. Family Law practitioners, as identified by the Bergen County Bar Association;
- v. The Supreme Court Committee on Diversity, Inclusion, and Community Engagement of the Administrative Office of the Courts;
- vi. Civic Organizations;
- vii. Other interested persons who deal with children.

Unspecified Members may appoint designees to sit on the BCYSC in their absence, provided that no more than one designee for any member may be appointed and further provided that the designee is qualified by knowledge and/or experience to perform the duties of a member of the BCYSC. The name of designees will be submitted to the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairs, on an annual basis.

Appointment to the BCYSC Unspecified Membership Category shall be upon the recommendation of the BCYSC, with no term limits, with final approval by the Bergen County Executive.

Section 2. Specified and Unspecified Member Responsibilities

- a. Shall have the right to vote at BCYSC meetings.
- b. Shall comply with the Bergen County YSC Conflict(s) of Interest Policy.
- c. Shall serve, at a minimum, on one of the BCYSC Standing Committees, as well as on task forces/subcommittees, as needed.
- d. In the event that an unspecified member of the BCYSC does not attend three (3) consecutive BCYSC Membership Meetings or a total of four (4) BCYSC Membership Meetings during a calendar year, shall be subject to removal upon the recommendation of the BCYSC to the Bergen County Executive, unless such member has advised the BCYSC of extenuating circumstances causing the absences. In the event that a specified member of the BCYSC does not attend three (3) consecutive BCYSC Membership Meetings or a total of four (4) BCYSC Membership Meetings during a calendar year, a letter will be sent to remind the member of membership responsibilities as stated in N.J.A.C. Title 13. Law And Public Safety Chapter 90. Juvenile Justice Commission

Section 3. Resource Members (Ex-Officio)

The NJ Juvenile Justice Commission Court Liaison shall serve as an Ex-Officio Member, with no voting privileges, on the BCYSC. One representative from each of the following agencies may serve as an Ex-Officio Member, with no voting privileges, on the BCYSC: NJ Department of Human Services; NJ Department of Labor and Workforce Development, NJ Department of Education; NJ Department of Health; NJ Department of Community Affairs and NJ Department of Children and Families.

**ARTICLE V.
OFFICERS**

Section 1. The Officers of the BCYSC shall be the Chairperson and one or more Co-Chairpersons, each of whom shall be a member of the BCYSC.

Section 2. The BCYSC Officers shall be elected at the first BCYSC membership meeting of the year and shall serve from then until the first membership meeting of the subsequent year.

Section 3. The Chairperson and/or the Co-Chairpersons shall preside over the BCYSC monthly Membership Meetings; appoint Sub-committees and task forces with the approval of the membership; shall not be a representative of a funded agency. In order to avoid a conflict of interest or a perceived conflict of interest, the chairperson or co-chairperson cannot be the supervisor of the youth services commission administrator.

Section 4. In the event of a vacancy in any office, appointment to fill the unexpired term shall be recommended by the Chair or Co-Chairpersons, with the approval of the BCYSC Membership.

Section 5. In the event that the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairpersons are unable to attend a BCYSC monthly Membership Meeting, the BCYSC members shall elect a Co-Chairperson Pro Tempore.

ARTICLE VI. MEETINGS

Section 1. The BCYSC shall meet no less frequently than six times annually, provided that no more than nine weeks shall elapse between meetings. Notice of each meeting, in writing, shall be given to all members at least one (1) week before this meeting.

Section 2. All BCYSC meetings shall be held at such times and in such locations as to encourage maximum public attendance, and be conducted in accordance with the provisions of the Senator Byron M. Baer Open Public Meetings Act, N.J.S.A. 10:4-6 et seq. Up to half of the youth services commission's scheduled meetings may be held by video conference call.

Section 3. Special Meetings may be called by the Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons or called upon the written request to the Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons by three (3) BCYSC members. The purpose of such meetings shall be stated with the request and no other business shall be transacted. All members shall be notified to time, place and purpose of the meeting.

Section 4. A quorum for all BCYSC meetings shall consist of a third of the voting membership (Specified and Unspecified Categories).

Section 5. Minutes for each meeting shall be recorded in writing and distributed to the BCYSC, by the Youth Services Commission Administrator.

Section 6. A 2/3 majority vote is required when voting on whether to allow a county to allocate up to 1/3 of its program component of a Partnership Grant Program allocation for county-provided sanctions and services pursuant to N.J.A.C. 13:90-3.11(c)7iii

Section 7. Voting shall be permitted by email prior to the meeting if a member and their designee cannot be present

ARTICLE VII. COMMITTEES/PURPOSES

Section 1. The BCYSC shall have a minimum of three (3) Standing Committees:

Allocations— prepare triennial plan allocation recommendations, review program proposals and develop recommendations for the distribution of the (Partnership/Family Court

which received fund for the purpose of developing recommendations for the renewal of such funds to the programs;

ByLaws/Nominating – review and develop amendments, as necessary; develop recommendations for the membership categories of Undesignated, and Slate of Officers;

Planning – 1) prepare and implement a triennial Plan, with annual updates, 2) develop a continuum of sanctions and services for the target population, 3) develop delinquency prevention programs, 4) review minority overrepresentation in the Juvenile Justice System and develop recommendations, accordingly, 5) inform the community of the service needs and/or concerns of the target population.

Section 2. Each committee shall consist of a voting majority of the BCYSC Members. Resource Members may also participate on the committees and shall have voting privileges.

Section 3. The Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons of the BCYSC shall appoint the Chairpersons of the Standing Committees.

Section 4. Committees shall report to the full BCYSC.

Section 5. The quorum for all committees shall be a majority of the committee members.

ARTICLE VIII. CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND APPEALS

The BCYSC shall: 1) Adhere to a written conflict of interest policy that has been submitted to the NJ Juvenile Justice Commission with a written statement by county counsel that the policy is in compliance with applicable law; 2) Adhere to the Appeals Procedure established by the BCYSC in addressing any appeals.

ARTICLE IX. ADOPTION OF BYLAWS

These Bylaws shall take effect immediately upon adoption of a majority of the BCYSC voting members present at the time of their review, provided that copies of the Bylaws have been distributed to all voting members of the BCYSC at least one (1) week prior to the vote. The BCYSC shall also submit the approved Bylaws to the Juvenile Justice Commission for their review, to assure compliance with applicable rules. A copy of the bylaws will be kept on file with the office of County Counsel.

ARTICLE X. AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the voting members present provided the proposed amendment (s) has been presented at two (2) consecutive

meetings of the BCYSC.

Section 2. Notice of proposed amendment(s) shall be given in writing to the membership at least ten (10) days prior to the BCYSC.

ARTICLE XI ADMINISTRATION OF THE BCYSC

- a) Responsibility for administering the BCYSC shall rest with the county in which it sits.
- b) The day-to-day business of the BCYSC shall be the responsibility of an Administrator. The Administrator shall be an individual who on the basis of education and prior job experience has demonstrated an understanding of and ability to manage public grant programs and an understanding and knowledge of the juvenile justice system and services for at-risk youth.
- c) The Executive Director of the New Jersey Juvenile Justice Commission or designee shall review and approve reimbursement of reasonable salary costs as provided in annual program management budgets submitted as part of the annual application, for the administration of programs and services funded in whole or in part through the Juvenile Justice Commission.
- d) The BCYSC Administrator shall maintain membership in, and shall regularly attend meetings of the New Jersey Association of County Youth Services Commission Administrators.
- e) Bergen County shall designate such additional staff and organizational resources necessary or appropriate to administer the duties and responsibilities of the BCYSC including, but not limited to one (1) clerical staff.

Adiyah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Kristen Ambrosio, *to approve the BCYSC November 6, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes, was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported that the Superior Court is status quo. The seriousness of the offenses has continued to significantly increase. The Superior Court observed a rise in the number of waiver motions being filed in anticipation.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported on one of the biggest change with the juvenile system statewide. Previously, a youth had to be in custody before a motion to detain could be filed, differing from the adult system where warrants could be issued first and the individual arrested later. Now, the process has been updated to allow warrants to be issued for youth not currently in custody. However, the judge must still find probable cause before issuing the warrant. As with any change, there will be issues to work out.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Rich Nunes reported that the office is very busy. The influx of more serious cases has considerably heightened the workload. The seriousness of the offenses lead to large discovery and a long length of time for each case. The two newly appointed public defenders are being acclimated.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2025 plan update is not complete, but significant progress was made. Everything is done except for the monitoring section and the existing services section and analysis questions grid requires updating. The document will be completed by the end of the year and circulate for an email vote, then formally reaffirm the vote at the January meeting.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor *to approve the 2025 Plan Update and*

Application as presented, was carried.

Regarding the 2024 to 2026 funding an email was sent with a budget modification proposal, which was then approved via email vote, but a vote is needed to reaffirm.

New Program Profile #16 Confidence Closets will address positive youth development to students, increase positive school climate, improve social behaviors, conduct problems, and academic performance as well as build school connectedness. A large number of youth receiving NJ SNAP as well as reduced/free lunch supports the need.

\$101,133.49

Jamie Ziegelhofer briefly explained the purpose of the confidence closets, which is to provide hygiene products and things of that nature to youth. Each applicant was recommended for a funding amount of

\$5000 to \$7000. The County has notified the recipients to update them on the process, so they can utilize the funds before the end of the year. The Confidence Closets program was modeled after a successful initiative in Ocean County.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor *to reaffirm the budget modification vote, was carried.*

Adiyah Washington presented the 2025 BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD), which uses the 1/3 set aside funds. The budget will remain the same from 2024 with two exceptions, the decrease of the conference and the addition of the life skills this resulted in a decrease of \$7177. The 2025 ATD budget is now \$108,291.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor *to approve the 2025 ATD budget as presented, was carried.*

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported on the site visits and formal program reviews conducted, including:

TMR Mental Health Care The monitoring team visited on June 25, 2025 the TMR at one of the two agency’s locations: 835 Main Street, Hackensack, NJ. The space was well maintained. The monitoring team interviewed 2 parents of 2 youth. They stated they were happy with their children’s progress and how convenient and accessible the sessions with virtual and in person options. They spoke of the struggle of finding services with their minimal insurance coverage. The parents suggested increasing sessions and the length of treatment (ongoing). Three staff members were interviewed. They talked about how the agency always puts the clients first. They would like to see a broader reach in services to help youth receive treatment earlier. Everyone had positive feedback. All the youth under insured or uninsured have access to the necessary level of care with access to medication monitoring, therapy and activities.

TMR formal program review results: 111.3 total points received out of 114 points (97.7%), with no formal recommendations.

YWCA The site visit took on place at 214 State Street, Hackensack NJ 07601. The monitoring team observed the program. Twelve youth and four staff members were present.

A speaker was giving a presentation virtually. The presentations covered various topics, including self-

care, self-confidence, mindfulness, positive relationships, communication skills, college financial aid, applications, networking, and social media etiquette. The monitoring team interviewed three youth who had been in the program for a couple of weeks. They found the program very useful. They found the workshops helpful, and the interactive activities provided guidance on the college process, resumes, scholarship applications, networking, and information and exposure about various careers. The youth felt more confident and better prepared. Some parents were also actively involved in the program. The youth were very pleased with the program and staff and would like to see more creative vocations such as art, writing, film, etc. not just in business areas. The youth also would like to go on trips to various colleges. One of the staff members was interviewed and a file review was completed.

YWCA formal program review results: 101 total points received out of 108 points (93.5%), with no formal recommendations.

Teaneck Public School (TPS): The program review took place at Teaneck Public School, 100 Elizabeth Avenue, Teaneck. The monitoring team completed the file review. They then observed the group, which consisted of an interactive check-in activity led by the school counselor, Nick Campestre. There were 9 youth present (5 females, 4 males), a second staff member and an intern. The atmosphere was warm, with all the youth actively engaged and comfortable sharing their feelings, reflecting on the previous day, and discussing plans for the next day. Trust and rapport were evident in their interactions. Additionally, Melissa, the guest speaker from YWCA's Healing Space, gave a presentation on "Digital Safety" and social media challenges, emphasizing the importance of making good decisions and staying safe online. Throughout the visit, refreshments like donuts were served for the students. After the activity, the team interviewed three students and two staff members. The students spoke highly of the staff and the support, advice, and learning opportunities provided through the program. The staff noted strong collaboration with guidance counselors to identify youths who could most benefit.

TPS formal program review results: 114 total points received out of 114 points (100%), with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto *to approve the TMR, YWCA, TPS site visits and formal program reviews, was carried.*

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Culinary Arts: The site visit took place at the Conklin Youth Resource Center, 125 Essex Street, Hackensack. The director of the program, John Zellars, greeted the team. There were 9 youth present, 2 female and 7 male, one youth arrived late. The chef, Emily MacVicar was teaching the youth a 30-minute healthy meal, which the youth enjoyed at the end of the class. Leftovers are sent home with the youth. Gloves and aprons were provided. The kitchen was clean and organized. The chef was interviewed and the suggested a new set of pots and pans would be a good improvement. The goal of the program was to teach youth teamwork, safe food handling, and kitchen skills for future possible careers in the culinary field. Some teens were often on their cell phones, not participating in the activity, and not all of them were involved in the whole cooking process. The program tries to track attendance via surveys, but they are often inaccurate and/or not completed. There was no formal curriculum for the program. Youth from other BCDFG programs attend cooking as an activity.

BCDFG Culinary Arts formal program review results: 74.5 total points received out of 105 points (71.0 %), with formal recommendations - the program needs to have a formal file for each youth, the program needs to have a curriculum which would support youth in taking the ServSafe certification and other food service vocational skills, the program should take outside referrals, explore the possibility of field

trips to see restaurants/kitchens, explore vocational possibilities for youth in the program, explore partnering/consulting with the technical school or college, explore the possibility of a family component and/or activity

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Positive Strides: The monitoring team observed a group session. Two youth and two staff were interviewed. The room is still in need of appropriate decorating. The youth liked hearing from their peers and thought that was a big help. The youth stated there could be more food. There is a vacant position needs to be filled. The staff needs a laptop for the program and said they could use more engagement tools and icebreakers.

BCDFG Positive Strides formal program review: 111 total points received out of 120 points (92.1 %), with formal recommendations to fill the vacant position, to explore the possibility of purchasing a laptop for the program, and engagement tools and icebreakers

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto *to approve the BCDFG Culinary Arts and Positive Strides site visits and formal program reviews, was carried.*

The proposed BCYSC 2025 meeting schedule was presented (attached below).

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Liana Dinallo *to approve the proposed 2025 meeting schedule, was carried.*

The third reading of the updated BCYSC Bylaws was presented (attached below).

Program Updates:

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 11 court ordered evaluations in November, 2 of which were conducted at the juvenile detention center, 2 of which were conducted at the Bergen's Place youth Shelter, (4 female, 5 male); 4 referrals for BIPAS; 1 referral in PAVE

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 8 referrals in November, 3 completed in detention and 5 completed in the community

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 2 referrals in November

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 1 new referral, 7 groups were held in November. The following programs participated both the Youth Resource Center, our ASAP programs are in Powerhouse for Young Women, Essex House for Young Men and the VISIONS program and a total of 34 youth participated in the program this past month.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 13 new referrals, serving 60 municipalities to date, 9 municipalities referred to us this past month. Received the first-time referral from Hasbrouck Heights.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 1 new referral in November

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 17 youth; 6 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), 2 youth on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), and 9 youth in non-bracelet ATD.

Visions – 8 young adult residents (4 female, 4 male), completed on reunification family in November

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 3 youth (2 female, 1 male), 1 from Bergen, and 2 out of County.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 13 male residents, 10 from Bergen, 3 out of County. It was announced that the basketball court is currently being built and hopefully by the spring it will be finalized. Detention statewide is in a significant crisis, as mental health.

Children's Aid and Family Services – The Seeds of Change conference was held on November 2nd at the FDU campus. Three schools signed up, with 30 students participating and leaving with action plans tailored to their community's needs.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – The two programs are up and running at Roy Brown Middle School, middle school students are mentored by Bergenfield High School students and Lincoln Elementary School, students are being mentored by BMW employees. The program sessions have recently been focusing on the importance of practicing gratitude.

Macy's in Paramus is hosting a special event for 20 students, breakfast and holiday shopping. The students in the program filled ten of those spots.

Probation – No report

Teaneck Public Schools – The program currently has 20 students enrolled, 11 from high school and 9 from middle school. Throughout the year, the students participate in various activities such as field trips, indoor rock climbing, mini golf, and an etiquette program at Maggiano's restaurant. Additionally, the program organizes an end-of-the-year activity at Dave and Buster's.

TMR Mental Health Care – TMR now partners with Medicaid. The youth program is currently at capacity, but they are accepting applications for next year. They are seeing issues such as disordered eating, self-harm, and suicidal ideation. The severity of these problems has been much more intense this year. The program tries to keep as many kids in our program as possible, rather than referring them out. However, the setting is not equipped for crisis intervention, which is a challenge. Initially, we had designed our program for brief, 12–16-week therapy, but the kids' symptoms have been so severe that we cannot discharge them as quickly as planned. Fortunately, the grant funding has allowed us to support the kids for longer periods, which has been very helpful. Overall, it has been a positive year, despite the increased intensity of the issues.

YWCA – The Junior Jumpstart program is launching a second cohort this Saturday, with a second session scheduled for next Saturday. YWCA is at capacity, with 20 kids signed up for both sessions. Additionally, there is a waitlist of 10 students hoping to join the program.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – Kyle Sheehan mentioned that it is truly remarkable how much great work is being done, but we need to get the word out more. There are many kids in the community who could benefit from these programs. It is so important that everybody attend the

program reviews learn about the programs and share your ideas and insights. Everybody should be very proud of the impactful work happening here.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – No report

Old Business – Rosemarie Lobretto mentioned that the New Jersey Children's System of Care has closed intake for certain placement levels for youth, including those with justice involvement, due to staffing shortages in their programs. Rosemarie Lobretto shared this concerning development. The state lacks the staff to run these programs, effectively locking up a system that was created 22 years ago to improve placements. Shelisa Foster from Bergen's Promise further reported receiving a letter from the state about this issue, which extends to children and families with developmental challenges due to a lack of available beds. Jamie suggested the possibility of advocating with potential partnerships with the Children's Interagency Coordinating Council (CIACC). This will be explored further. The COVID-19 pandemic has significantly exacerbated this crisis, as many have left the profession, resulting in a diminished workforce. Consequently, facilities are unable to hire enough staff to accommodate and follow licensing requirements, leaving the system overwhelmed by the increasing number of children with severe behavioral health issues.

New Business – None

Announcements – Adiyah Washington highlighted that the day of this meeting marks the United Nations International Day of Persons with Disabilities and Giving Tuesday an opportunity time to foster learning, collaboration, and inspiration as we work together towards a future where all youth in Bergen County have the support and opportunities they deserve.

The next BCYSC membership meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, January 7, 2025 virtually.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Jorge Sandoval, *to adjourn the BCYSC Membership Meeting, was carried.*

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**ARTICLE I.
NAME**

The name of this organization shall be the Bergen County Youth Services Commission, hereinafter referred to as the BCYSC.

**ARTICLE II.
AUTHORITY/PURPOSE**

Pursuant to N.J.A.C. Title 13. Law and Public Safety Chapter 90. Juvenile Justice Commission, the organizational structure, duties, etc. for county youth services commissions are detailed in Title 13. Subchapter 2. 13:90-2.1-2.10. the requirements of the Partnership/Family Court Program are detailed in Title 13. Subchapter 3. 13:90-3.1-3.13.

The BCYSC is designated by the County Executive, and reaffirmed with Freeholder Resolution, to be the entity in the County of Bergen, for the planning, implementing, monitoring and evaluation of services and programs of the Juvenile Justice System in Bergen County. The BCYSC shall also be responsible for developing recommendations for Juvenile Justice Commission funding awarded to the County of Bergen.

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**ARTICLE III.
DUTIES**

- 1) To prepare, and submit a comprehensive triennial plan (hereafter known as the Plan), out year updates, and annual funding applications provided for in N.J.A.C. 13:90-3.11, with respect to the totality of services and programs comprising the county's juvenile justice service system;
- 2) To make recommendations to coordinate and integrate existing sanctions and services for juveniles adjudicated or charged as delinquent and delinquency prevention programs;
- 3) To assess and prioritize the needs of youth adjudicated or charged delinquent;
- 4) To assess existing delinquency prevention programs to determine whether such programs meet the needs of youth, are effective in meeting program goals and in ensuring financial accountability;
- 5) To determine, through the collection and maintenance of data, the nature and scope of juvenile delinquency and related problems in the county and identify the geographical regions within the county where such offenses and problems are most prevalent;
- 6) To propose a system of sanctions and services for youth adjudicated or charged as delinquent, that includes identifying geographical regions within the county where

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existing programs do not satisfy the needs of such youth, and developing proposals for closing gaps in the delivery of such sanctions and services;

7) To review, evaluate, and monitor through at least one site visit annually, existing sanctions and services under the jurisdiction, control, or proposed by the Bergen County Youth Services Commission, for juveniles adjudicated or charged delinquent and existing delinquency prevention programs to determine effectiveness in meeting program goals and in ensuring financial accountability;

8) To recommend to the county governing body, the approval or disapproval of contracts with providers seeking to participate in the Partnership/Family Court Program;

9) To cooperate with other State, county, and municipal agencies and other entities in the planning of ongoing efforts relating to the county's juvenile justice service system;

10) To inform the public of the scope of juvenile offenses, the needs of youth in the county and the availability of sanctions and services, and advocate for the needs of youth;

11) To serve as an advisory body of the county on issues relating to sanctions and services for juveniles adjudicated or charged as delinquent and delinquency prevention programs.

12) To coordinate the efforts of municipal and regional youth services commissions and ensure their participation in the county planning process;

13) To appoint liaisons to participate in planning and related activities with appropriate planning bodies (i.e., Human Services Advisory Council, Local Advisory Committee on Alcohol and Drug Abuse, Mental Health Board - Professional Advisory Committee, County Interagency Coordinating Council-CIACC), as invited, to maximize efficient and effective use of the Partnership/Family Court Grant Funds;

14) To determine whether a need exists, and if so, sponsor the establishment of Multi-Disciplinary Teams (MDT's) to plan specific sanctions/services to individual youth:
a) As an alternative to detention of a juvenile charged as delinquent; b) As a recommendation for a disposition option of a judge of the Family Court upon an adjudication of delinquency; and c) As a component of aftercare following the commitment of a juvenile to the Juvenile Justice Commission by a judge of the Family Court;

15) To coordinate the planning of aftercare sanctions and services for juveniles returning to the community following commitment to or placement with the Juvenile Justice Commission by a judge of the Family Court;

16) To use the Commission's web-based Juvenile Automated Management System (JAMS) for purposes of periodic reporting to the Commission of programmatic, contract and contractor, fiscal, monitoring, and all other information material to juveniles served by the Partnership/Family Court Program and any other programs administered by the Juvenile Justice Commission;

17) To prepare and submit written monitoring reports and evaluations, subject to review by the Executive Director of the Juvenile Justice Commission or designee: a. Monitoring the operations of programs receiving Partnership/Family Court Program funds and/or other funds administered by the Juvenile Justice Commission for compliance with program requirements; and b. Evaluating the impact of those programs on targeted beneficiaries:

18. To encourage the involvement of youth and families in the planning of services and sanctions and program development.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. Number and Composition

- a. The BCYSC shall consist of not less than 23 voting members under two separate Categories: Specified and Unspecified.
- b. The BCYSC shall reflect the racial, ethnic and cultural demographic composition of the county and youth in the county served by sanctions/services and delinquency prevention programs planned, implemented, monitored and evaluated by the BCYSC.
- c. Membership:

3. Vicinage Chief Probation Officer or the Vicinage Assistant Chief Probation Officer in charge of juvenile matters, as designee
4. Bergen County Executive or other elected official, or senior staff person, as designee
5. Bergen County Prosecutor or the highest-ranking assistant prosecutor handling juvenile matters, as designee
6. Regional Public Defender or the highest-ranking assistant public defender handling juvenile matters, as designee
7. NJ Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permanency, Bergen/Hudson Liaison
8. Bergen County Department of Health Services, Division of Mental Health Administrator
9. Bergen County Superintendent of Schools
10. Bergen County Technical and Special Services School Districts, Superintendent
11. Director of the Bergen County Department of Human Services
12. Bergen County Director of the Youth Shelter
13. Bergen County Administrator of the Juvenile Detention Center
14. Bergen County Juvenile Family Crisis Intervention Unit Supervisor
15. President of the Juvenile Officers Association or designee
16. Bergen County Department of Health Services, Office of Alcohol and Drug Dependency Director
17. Workforce Development Board, Executive Director, or designee

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- 18. [A representative of the business community that serves at-risk and justice-involved youth in the county](#)

Specified Members may appoint designees, provided that the designee is qualified by knowledge and/or experience to perform the duties of a member of the BCYSC. The name of designees will be submitted to the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairs, on an annual basis. [If a single voting member fulfills two roles identified above, then that voting member shall only have one vote.](#) In the event that there is a change in personnel within the Specified Membership Category, the individual who assumes the position will become an automatic member of the BCYSC.

Unspecified Membership Category

Will consist of at least two (2), but not more than [eight \(8\)](#) individuals in total from the [groups](#) noted below. Each Unspecified Member shall demonstrate knowledge relevant to the county's population involved in, or at risk of involvement in the juvenile justice system. Appointments shall be made in such a way as to fulfill the objective that membership reflect the racial, ethnic, and cultural demographic make-up of the county and the youth in the county served by the sanctions and services and the delinquency prevention programs planned, implemented, monitored, and evaluated by the BCYSC.

Unspecified Members may appoint designees to sit on the BCYSC in their absence, provided that no more than one designee for any member may be appointed and further provided that the designee is qualified by knowledge and/or experience to perform the

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duties of a member of the BCYSC. The name of designees will be submitted to the BCYSC Chair or Co-Chairs, on an annual basis.

Appointment to the BCYSC Unspecified Membership Category shall be upon the recommendation of the BCYSC, with no term limits, with final approval by the Bergen County Executive.

Section 2. Specified and Unspecified Member Responsibilities

- a. Shall have the right to vote at BCYSC meetings.
- b. Shall comply with the Bergen County YSC Conflict(s) of Interest Policy.
- c. Shall serve, at a minimum, on one of the BCYSC Standing Committees, as well as on task forces/subcommittees, as needed.
- d. In the event that an unspecified member of the BCYSC does not attend three (3) consecutive BCYSC Membership Meetings or a total of four (4) BCYSC Membership Meetings during a calendar year, shall be subject to removal upon the recommendation of the BCYSC to the Bergen County Executive, unless such member has advised the BCYSC of extenuating circumstances causing the absences. In the event that a specified member of the BCYSC does not attend three (3) consecutive BCYSC Membership Meetings or a total of four (4) BCYSC Membership Meetings during a calendar year, a letter will be sent to remind the member of membership responsibilities as stated in N.J.A.C. Title 13. Law And Public Safety Chapter 90. Juvenile Justice Commission

ARTICLE VII. COMMITTEES/PURPOSES

Section 1. The BCYSC shall have a minimum of three (3) Standing Committees:

Allocations– prepare triennial plan allocation recommendations, review program proposals and develop recommendations for the distribution of the (Partnership/Family Court Program Funds), and conduct, at a minimum, annual program reviews on those programs which received fund for the purpose of developing recommendations for the renewal of such funds to the programs;

ByLaws/Nominating – review and develop amendments, as necessary; develop recommendations for the membership categories of Undesignated, and Slate of Officers;

Planning – 1) prepare and implement a triennial Plan, with annual updates, 2) develop a continuum of sanctions and services for the target population, 3) develop delinquency prevention programs, 4) review minority overrepresentation in the Juvenile Justice System and develop recommendations, accordingly, 5) inform the community of the service needs and/or concerns of the target population.

Section 2. Each committee shall consist of a voting majority of the BCYSC Members. Resource Members may also participate on the committees and shall have voting privileges.

Section 3. The Chairperson or Co-Chairpersons of the BCYSC shall appoint the Chairpersons of the Standing Committees.

Section 4. Committees shall report to the full BCYSC.

Section 5. The quorum for all committees shall be a majority of the committee members.

ARTICLE VIII CONFLICT OF INTEREST AND APPEALS

The BCYSC shall: 1) Adhere to a written conflict of interest policy that has been submitted to the NJ Juvenile Justice Commission with a written statement by county counsel that the policy is in compliance with applicable law; 2) Adhere to the Appeals Procedure established by the BCYSC in addressing any appeals.

ARTICLE IX ADOPTION OF BYLAWS

These Bylaws shall take effect immediately upon adoption of a majority of the BCYSC voting members present at the time of their review, provided that copies of the Bylaws have been distributed to all voting members of the BCYSC at least one (1) week prior to the vote. The BCYSC shall also submit the approved Bylaws to the Juvenile Justice Commission for their review, to assure compliance with applicable rules. A copy of the bylaws will be kept on file with the office of County Counsel.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These Bylaws may be amended by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the voting members present provided the proposed amendment (s) has been presented at two (2) consecutive meetings of the BCYSC.

Section 2. Notice of proposed amendment(s) shall be given in writing to the membership at least ten (10) days prior to the BCYSC.

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BERGEN COUNTY YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION (BCYSC)

Membership Meeting (Virtual)

January 7, 2025

Attendance report below.

Adiyah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order.

Seth Victor had a correction for the minute under membership April Petersen was replaced by Johnny Cardona Esq. A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by, Adiyah Washington *to approve the BCYSC December 6, 2024, Membership Meeting Minutes as amended was carried.* Honorable Magali Francois and Janice Conti abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Francois reported that the referee role has been largely eliminated. She will now hear all cases referred to Superior Court. A discussion was held regarding any effects that may occur.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – No report

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported low volume of cases in December.

He continued the discussion of the possible effects of the hearing officer. Jorge Sandoval asked about two pending bills, [S3190](#) and [A4358](#), which would require juveniles to appear before the court in the county where the delinquency complaint occurred. It recently came out of the judiciary committee with full support and looks to be moving forward. There is a concern of the impact on processing, resources, ATD, court ordered evaluations, family visitation, transportation, etc. There is no good cause provision. The BCYSC decided to meet as a subcommittee to discuss their concerns and to advocate for the youth’s best interest. Seth Victor also discussed the outcome of the lawsuit Atlantic County made against the JJC regarding whose responsibility it was to find detention placements for detained youth. The Court found in favor of the County and the JJC is the party responsible.

NJ Office of the Public Defender–Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunez estimated that about 30% of detention cases are individuals from another county. A majority of them will have issues regarding release and if Alternatives in Detention does not become a shared service between counties, the length of stay in detention will be increased. The two new attorneys, Alexis Dowling and Crystal Bailey, are settling in well and being kept busy. Rich Nunez has requested a meeting regarding youth detained over the weekend not having counsel representation. Judge Francois reminded everybody the youth are heard over the weekend by the emergent duty judge.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Marcia Hartkopp presented the nominations for 2025 Slate of Officers, Adiyah Washington for Chair and Seth Victor for Co-Chair. A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Kristen Ambrosio *to approve the 2025 Slate of Officers was carried.* Judge Francois abstained.

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the fourth quarter reports are still coming in and once the reports are done the 2024 program results report will be presented. The confidence closets were discussed. Some schools and agencies were not able to spend the money before the deadline. Stephanie Trusty from Englewood school district thanked the BCYSC for the grant opportunity and reported they were able to spend the

funds in time. Javalda Powell from Teaneck also thanked the commission and was able to spend the funds prior to the deadline.

The BCYSC standing committees were presented. Shelby Klein was omitted from the qualified members for the program reviews and will be added. A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Adiyah Washington, ***to approve the BCYSC standing subcommittees as amended, was carried.***

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that 2025 plan update and application was submitted on time, but incomplete. The completed Plan Update was presented.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 10 court ordered evaluations in December (5 female, 5 male), 5 new referrals for BIPAS who completed the program and received their certificate, 1 new referral in PAVE, 1 completed the program and received their certificate.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 6 evaluations in December, 5 completed in the community, 1 completed in the juvenile detention center.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 2 referrals in December, 1 from the court and 1 from law enforcement.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 3 new referrals, 4 classes conducted, 16 unduplicated youth, 23 out of the 24 total attendees rated the class as good or awesome, 23 out of 24 demonstrated increased knowledge and 14 youth are interested in learning more about food safety.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 10 municipalities served during the month of December and 61 municipalities to date. First time referrals from Woodridge. The program is up by 11 from last year. There was a total of 246 referrals for the year, making this our busiest year.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 2 referrals in December

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 16 youth, 4 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), 3 youth on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), and 9 youth in non-bracelet ATD.

Visions – 8 residents (3 female, 4 male, 1 transgender)

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth in December (2 female, 5 male)

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 8 youth (5 female, 3 male), 3 from Bergen, and 5 out of County.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 13 residents (1 female, 12 male), 10 from Bergen, 3 out of County.

The concrete has been poured on the basketball court. Once the weather permits, the court's lines will be placed so the court can be used.

Children's Aid and Family Services – Stephanie Drag reported that as soon as schools reopened, they are right back into the second marking period. The Epic group is gearing up for their annual event, previously called "Kick Butts Day" but now known as "Takedown Tobacco Day. The Epic group held a Christmas party in December to celebrate their accomplishments from 2024. The students enjoyed the festivities and even made holiday cards to distribute to older adults in the community, demonstrating their commitment to being strong leaders. The Epic Youth group members are 9th graders, which is encouraging, as the transition from 8th to 9th grade has historically presented challenges, leading to student attrition. Overall, the Epic group continues to grow and thrive, with their various initiatives and activities contributing to their positive impact on the community.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – No report

Probation – Janice Conti reported that in 2025, no program was yet completed, but at the end of the year, the hygiene kits were assembled and ready to be distributed as needed.

Teaneck Public Schools – Nick Campestre stated that the first cycle of the program was completed during the second week of last December. The new cycle will start this semester. All 17 students said they would recommend the program to another student. The feedback highlighted that the program taught participants new skills, facilitated socialization with new people, helped improve their communication skills through talking with others, and provided opportunities to learn life lessons and go on trips.

TMR Mental Health Care – Tasia Milicevic reported the programs goals were met at the conclusion of 2024. Currently, there are 5 youth in the program and are accepting applications to fill the remaining spots.

YWCA – Johana Cruz reported they completed the second cohort program in December. A few of the students returned from the previous cohort, but most of the youth were new. The YWCA was able to provide essay coaching as well as SAT and ACT prep. College admissions staff also met with each student, helping them identify 4-5 colleges to apply to before upcoming deadlines. By the end of the program, participants had created a roadmap, and many had completed their essays by the end of the program. It was very successful.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – No report

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – No report

Old Business – Adiyah Washington thanked everyone for attending the BCYSC conference. The speakers were very engaging and interesting.

New Business – Stephanie Trusty from Englewood school district inquired about other grants opportunities and resources. Jamie advised her to continue attending the BCYSC meetings and to sign up for Bergen Bids, the county website where RFPs are posted. She will be added to the grant opportunities email list. Tasia Milicevic suggested a grant from Bergen's Promise. Shelisa Foster from Bergen's Promise will share the information.

Attendance report below.

Adiyilah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by, Janice Conti *to approve the BCYSC January 7, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes as amended was carried.* Linda Spiegel, Melissa DeBartolo, Shelby Klein, Judge Magali Francois and Liana Dinallo abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Francois reported that the immigration protocol concerning juveniles remains unchanged. The Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) will maintain the existing protocol that was established several years ago. If the Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) appears at the courthouse, the sheriff's department is notified, who then notifies the assignment Judge. The Judge recently received a request from the defense counsel of a juvenile with a parent seeking permission to appear via Zoom due to the parents' concern about attending court in person due to their immigration status. As the request was submitted on the same day, the Judge granted it, but moving forward all parties are required to appear in court physically in accordance with established protocols.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo had no report, but shared updates on the progress of the repairs of room 159 and the eventual return of the juvenile court to that floor along with the status of Phase II construction.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported that there have been no spike in cases now that they no longer have the informal calendar. The bills previously discussed are being watched. Jamie Ziegelhofer mentioned that the members met and discussed these pending bills, S3190 and A4358, which would require juveniles to appear before the court in the county where the delinquency complaint occurred. The group discussed possible negative impacts from the bills and decided to compose a letter of advocacy, which will be distributed soon for the members to send it to their legislators.

Adiyilah reminded members Seth Victor is now the co-chair of the BCYSC and thanked Seth Victor for taking on the role. 25:39

NJ Office of the Public Defender–Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunez indicated he has anecdotally observed an increase in minor cases from the previous report, including school assaults, weapon possession cases, and fights. Seth Victor stated a few cases have been sent to the formal calendar now that the informal calendar is no longer an option.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the modification of the 2025 Plan update and application and allocation recommendations that was previously voted on via email. Client specific funds and MDT convener stipend needed to be separated into two program profiles. The modification was previously emailed to members to vote on and needs to be reaffirmed.

The 2024 Program results report is pending the completion of the fourth quarter reports. The 2025 Plan update corrections were submitted and once the minutes from this meeting are sent, we should have everything in and receive our award package.

The Northern Region YSC meeting is Friday. There will be discussion about moving forward with the Northern Region Conference.

Program Updates:

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 10 court ordered evaluations in January (3 female, 7 male), 4 new referrals for BIPAS, 1 new referral in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 1 new referral in January.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 4 new referrals in January.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – No new referrals in January; 5 classes conducted, 13 unduplicated youth, 10 youth interested in attending the food safety program.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 26 referrals in the month of January, serving 61 municipalities to date and 13 municipalities in this month still remain up three referrals from last year.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 1 new referral in January.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 13 youth, 6 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), 2 youth on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), and 5 youth non-bracelet monitoring.

Visions – 8 residents (4 female, 4 male).

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth in January (2 female, 5 male).

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 9 youth (4 female, 5 male), 3 from Bergen County, and 6 out of County. Tara Smith shared a brief update of activities.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 13 residents; 10 from Bergen County (8 male, 2 female), 3 from out of county. As soon as the weather improves, the basketball court will be painted. Rosemarie Lobretto asked about the female residents. Jorge Sandoval explained that girls and boys attend school together and mix during programs and organized, structured activities, but in the housing area, they are separate.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS) – Stephanie Drag reported CAFS finished the second marking period and is preparing for the third marking period of LST. It is going to be very busy since all four schools will have classes during that period. The EPIC Youth group created an executive board to help lead their initiative. The youth are also getting ready for the Youth Tobacco Summit Day, a statewide event happening in June 2025, where they will connect with other young people focused on prevention efforts.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – No report

Probation – Janice Conti provided an update regarding staffing changes. Tracy Kurtzman retired, and Christina Valentine will be overseeing the youth cases with sexually abusive behaviors.

Teaneck Public Schools – Nick Campestre reported that the school is recruiting students and getting ready to get started with the group activities for the new year.

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission (JJC) – No report

NJ Juvenile Justice Commission/JDAI – No report

Old Business – None

New Business – Officer Matt Stanislaw from the Juvenile Officers Association mentioned that several officers have pointed out that vaping is becoming a real issue in classrooms. He asked about the single referral that was reported for vaping and wanted to know what the process is for getting a young person into program. He also wanted to know about the program.

Kristen Ambrosio indicated that BCDFG is actively reaching out and accepting referrals from community providers, primarily schools and law enforcement. The school can call the program and they will put a plan together for the youth. Typically, once the referral is received, a plan is created, which includes a clinical intake, five to seven sessions, and a parent session for the youth. It is a psychoeducational prevention program.

Shelby Klein noted that numerous municipalities possess alliance funds, and schools frequently conduct assemblies focused on vaping. Additionally, through the Bergen County Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services and their prevention funds, BCDFG plans to introduce substance and vaping education into some school programs, starting small, aiming to implement a 10-week curriculum on vaping issues in schools.

Announcements – Shelby Klein announced that the Stigma Free Symposium and Breakfast is on May 2, 2025, along with its Annual Sticker Contest for youth with a gift card prize. Further details, including a registration link, will follow.

The BCYSC March membership meeting is cancelled, and next meeting will be on Tuesday, April 1, 2025.

Adiyilah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order at 8:49am.

The minutes were reviewed. Seth Victor requested a correction in the minutes to remove Whitney Flanagan from the attendance list. A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by, Rosemarie Lobretto *to approve the BCYSC February 4, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes as amended was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – No report

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported on some observed trends. There has been an increase in violent crimes with the use of knives among youth. S3190/A Third, second, and first degree would stay in the county of offense and fourth and disorderly person would go back to the home county. This has had a large affect in Bergen County. We are keeping a close eye on it. There are a few other bills being tracked as well. There is a bill to lower the minimum waiver bill back to 14. A few bills have been presented in response to the increased car thefts. A5369. Juvenile charged with a motor vehicle theft with a prior motor vehicle theft will be eligible to be waived. S4207 adds adjudication option that allows juveniles to be placed on a 60 day home detention disposition. Overall the numbers are steady with only a small increase due to the hearing officer no longer hearing cases.

NJ Office of the Public Defender-Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunez reported the level of cases being received are more serious and require even more attention and more motions being filed. This leads to longer case times. The numbers are steady. There are more disorderly person’s offenses coming to court now then previously.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the ATD Budget Modification. The BCYSC Allocations subcommittee met and is recommending the modification for approval as follows:

1. Personnel increased by \$292 to cover COLA increases
2. Consultant line decreased by \$1,500, speaker conference was removed no speakers/consultants scheduled
3. Material & Supplies increased by \$702; expecting food and other supply prices to continue to rise
4. Specific Assistance was decreased by \$1,000; HIPPA translation line no longer needed as they bought translator devices last year
5. Miscellaneous increased by \$1,506, ATD will need to add additional phones for the BI smartphone program

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the budget modification was carried.*

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the 2025 allocation grid and the 2024 program results report. The importance of planning and communication was stressed for example if you have a staffing vacancy then you know you will be under budget and request a plan for the funds or allow the BCYSC to plan to properly utilize the funds. Adiyah Washington also reminded agencies if they need additional funds they can reach out as well.

The 2025 Plan update and application was approved via email by the JJC and we are waiting for the certified assurances and grant conditions. The BCYSC received a corrective action plan from BCDFG Culinary Arts and will be following up.

Matt Stanislao reported receiving a lot of calls regarding younger youth (approximately 8-9 years old). Many of the programs can receive as young as 8 if the need and program curriculum allows.

Jamie Ziegelhofer also reported she met with the NJSCI. They had questions regarding the grants, grant process, etc. The meeting went well. They were impressed with the oversight and work done.

Soluna Presentation – Robin Cohen, Director of Integrations & Partnerships. Soluna offers teens and young adults interactive tools, peer support, and 1:1 coaching and counseling to care for their mental wellbeing, available anytime from their own device. Funded by the New Jersey Department of Children and Families, Soluna is free to youth in Bergen, Gloucester, Union, and Middlesex counties. Soluna helps schools supplement behavioral health services with preventative care for students ages 13-18, available in English and Spanish. <https://solunaapp.com/families>. BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 1 new referral in in March

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 3 new referrals in March. 32 participants in the program, 9 groups of culinary held for multiple programs.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 18 referrals in the month of March serving 62 municipalities to date and 9 municipalities in this month.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 6 new referrals in March.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 18 youth, 10 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM), (3 female, 7 male); 1 youth on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), 7 youth non-bracelet monitoring.

Visions – 10 residents out to the 12 beds (4 female, 5 male, 1 transgender male).

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth in March (2 female, 5 male).

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 12 youth, 9 youth from Bergen County. The average length of stay is 368 days, which has dramatically increased

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter –5 youth (1 female, 4 male). 4 youth from Bergen County. There was a discussion about the activities the youth are participating in and would like to participate in like “Dunk the Junk”.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS) –LST finished the third marking period and is preparing for the fourth marking period. They are also in the process of planning the 7 habits program in the summer in collaboration with the Bergen Family Center and their employment program. Details regarding the EPIC program and the Seeds of Change Conference will be released shortly, the target is Red Ribbon Week. The date should be released to schools before the academic year ends, they try to change the college campus every year in order to give the youth exposure to multiple colleges. They may be partnering with Felician this year. It was highlighted the Epic Youth, in the wake of a death of a high school student in a car accident, decided to do something for their peers. They promo satchels with stone to use for positive coping and a positive message and made them available in the guidance office. They supported the community with positive coping skills in the face of trauma and tragedy, which impacts substance use.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – approximately 50 youth total in BMW program and the Bergenfield Middle School/High School program. There was a discussion about the activities the youth are participating in such as a "build your own roller coaster" activity, which fostered problem-solving skills, teamwork, and an interest in STEM. Additionally, the community-based program currently has approximately 32 active matches with 11 youths on the waiting list (2 females and 9 males) aged between 7 and 15. Last month, a baking event took place at La Promenade in Tenafly, where 9 youths and their mentors collaborated to learn how to make various items, including cookies and pizzas.

Probation –the parent orientation program is scheduled for the evening of April 1st.

Teaneck Public Schools –currently, the program has 20 students enrolled; 13 group sessions and 17 completed intakes, allowing the program to effectively engage both middle and high school groups.

TMR Mental Health Care – No report

YWCA – the program putting together the building blocks for the two-week college boot camp, and in the process of securing an ACT/SAT coach and two different college admission counselors to come to the program and teach them how to make their college applications stick out.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported the Juvenile Justice Commission is now named the Youth Justice Commission. He also announced the importance and value of attending the upcoming program reviews. There were mentioned 2 grants opportunities, \$250,000 each for higher risk offenders for alternative to detention and more information will follow.

Membership Meeting (Virtual)

June 3, 2025

Attendance report below.

Dr. Adiyah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order at 8:48am

Georgina DeRosa introduced herself and provided her contact information, as she temporarily replaced Anne Giacobbe (DCP&P). She is the County Services Specialist State of NJ, Department of Children and Families, Division of Child Protection and Permanency, Bergen-Hudson Area Office. 1 Harmon Meadow Blvd. Secaucus, NJ 07094. The minutes were reviewed. Jamie mentioned the following changes on the minutes: the acronym DFG was replaced with DCP&P following Anne Giacobbe's name and the duplicate of four paragraphs were removed. A motion by Dr. Adiyah Washington, seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the BCYSC April 1, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes as amended was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported the nature of offenses coming in are still high level. There is an effort to resolve as many cases as possible before the end of the month, as the court's annual calendar runs from July 1st, 2024, to June 30th, 2025. The Administrative office of the courts is looking into the number of waiver motions possibly because there has been an increase in the high-level offenses. There was a recent application from the Family Division managers across the state to reinvigorate the CJJSI.

Bergen County Prosecutor's Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor agreed with Liana Dinallo's report in regard to the high number of high-level offenses leading to high number of waiver cases. The status of the previously reported Bills have not changed. Dr. Adiyah Washington asked for suggestions for the members and community to aid in the current situation. Seth Victor suggested keeping children off/limiting social media because it can harm their mental and emotional well-being. Janice Conti reported a high level on non-engagement from parents and youth. There is a lot of resistance to prosocial activities. Detective Matt Stanislao talked about cell phones robbing youth of their curiosity and replacing it with hyperstimulation. Camp, musical instruments, outdoor play can help. He suggested if you give a child a phone prior to 13-16 make sure it does not have a forward-facing lens (not a smart phone). There was a discussion regarding phones and social media. He said Dr. Jonathan Hyatt recommends having parents talk to their kids friend group and make a pact for all youth to stay off social media. The members raised serious concerns about the impact of social media on youth mental and emotional health. Suggestions included keeping children off social media entirely and incorporating educational workshops and seminars into school-based settings like PTA and PTO meetings. Emphasis was placed on the need for parents to engage more actively with their children through positive activities, and to be equipped with tools and strategies for monitoring device use, managing access, and staying informed about privacy and app safety. Many acknowledge the challenges parents face in setting limits, especially when confronted with strong emotional reactions or behavioral threats from their children. Key resources were shared: [NetSmartz](#) (tech-use agreements, safety tips, and app awareness), [TeenSpeak](#) youth communication training and resources. These include guidance on screen time, detecting hidden apps, and establishing tech-use agreements. Presentations from law enforcement and child protection professionals further underscored the urgency of education and community action, prompting a call to prioritize this issue in future planning. The BCYSC agreed that

this serious and important issue be included in the plan update with any additional information. Dr. Washington asked members to gather information to include in the plan.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the paperwork is in the process of being completed. The status will be reported at the next meeting. The 2026 Plan Update and application was received, data is being collected, and we will meet soon to complete it. Two site visits were conducted at Big Brothers Big Sisters and Teaneck Public Schools before the end of the school year. The summary reports will be presented at the next meeting. Virtual formal monitoring for Probation is scheduled for Wednesday, June 18 at 9:30 AM. A sign-up sheet will be sent to all qualified voting members—volunteers are needed. Some budget modifications are pending final updates. Once available, the allocations team will review and present recommendations at the next meeting, if necessary. The first quarter reports are in progress and should be closed out soon. The second quarter is at the end of this month, after which the level of service and spending will be reviewed for potential adjustments. The Multidisciplinary Team (MDT) is being reorganized. There is a \$500 stipend for the role of MDT convenor, which is still needed. Suggestions are welcome. The MDT helps assess and accelerate complex youth cases involving detention, ATD, or probation.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 10 evaluations in May (2 female and 5 male), 2 new referrals for BIPAS, 4 persons received their certificate of completion; No new referrals in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 7 new referrals in May

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 4 new referrals in May

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 4 new referrals in in May, 6 classes (Theme - Valuing Diversity); 24 unduplicated youths; 22 demonstrated increased knowledge; 20 clients want to learn more about Food Safety

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 20 referrals in May, serving 63 total municipalities, 13 this month, down by 6 referrals to May.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 1 new referral for the Suspension Alternatives Program (SAP) in May

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – (6 Male, 1 Female) in May, 6 youth, (0 female, 6 male) on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM); 6 youth (1 female, 5 male on phone electronic monitoring (PEM).

Visions – 10 residents (5 female, 4 male, 1 transgender) in May

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth in May (2 female, 5 male). May 27 the Annual Dinner with program participants held at CYC to discuss issues, progress, moving options and processing next steps for a permanent voucher. 6 of 7 participants attended the Dinner with Case manager and Administrator.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 6 youth (2 female, 4 male) 4 youth from Bergen, 2 youth out of Bergen County. On June 18, 2025, the culinary program class started, and a successful leadership

event was held last month, called Slam Dunk, the junk and the kids participated, cleaning up a local park.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 19 youth residents, 15 youth are from and out Bergen County. To be noted that 9 out of 15 are adults. Kristen Ambrosio also reiterated what Liana Dinallo discussed earlier reporting 4 youth are waived and 4 youth are being considered for waivers.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS) – Stephanie Drag reported:

Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits - as the school year concludes, the LST programs wrapped up on May 30th. They will collaborate with the employment program at Bergen Family Center in Englewood throughout the summer, focusing on the 7 Habits program.

Empowering Peers & Inspiring Change (EPIC) /Seeds of Change (SOC): is gearing up for the summer transition. They are developing a training session for adults centered on youth and youth culture. The SOC youth Conference is scheduled for Friday, October 24th at Felician in Lodi. This conference will feature expert speakers who will share insights on Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. Information is being distributed to schools for registration, and teens and adult stakeholders are invited to participate in a survey to help shape the theme for the upcoming year. A toolkit containing details about the conference and the survey has been provided.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – No report

Superior Court SCBV / Probation – Janice Conti stated that during the parent orientation program held on the evening of April 1st, 2025, there were 3 parents in attendance, while on May 20, 2025, only 1 parent participated. There were no attendees at the Painting with a Purpose session that took place on April 29, 2025.

Teaneck Public Schools – Nick Campestre reported: The program completed our Spring cycle in May. During the 3rd quarter we completed 24 group sessions (12 HS, 12 MS). Students completed an end of the year feedback/evaluation form and identified learning the following skills: anger management, emotional regulation, social skills, and making decisions. The FORUM SBYSP operates in the summer and provides wrap-round services for students. The PASS Middle School program provides staff an ability to identify students that may need more support in the High School, helping with the transition from Middle School.

TMR Mental Health Care – No report

YWCA – Johana Cruz reported: The Junior Jumpstart boot camp for college preparation is set to occur during the final two weeks of July. The YWCA is currently coordinating with Bergen County Community College to select a date that will allow students to tour the campus and explore various options available to them. Additionally, there will be in-person SAT preparation, along with arrangements for all meals, including lunch and snacks for the students.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan had no report.

BERGEN COUNTY YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION (BCYSC)

Membership Meeting (Virtual)
August 5, 2025

Attendance report below.

Seth Victor called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Kristen Ambrosio, *to approve the BCYSC June 3, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes as amended was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported in regard to court stats, the year did not end well. There are a lot of complicated cases/offenses. There are still about 5 or 6 waivers pending. The CJJSI case processing subcommittee continues to meet and encourages more participation.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor discussed the current waiver trends and the time-consuming process of the Court and evaluating the youth. After meeting with juvenile chiefs across the state they recognized the growing need for mental health services. In particular the need for facilities/beds for involuntary committals. He also reported juvenile officers’ frustration regarding youth on motorized bicycles, scooters, etc., and the disregard to the law. Youth are not wearing helmets and causing nuisances to drivers.

NJ Office of the Public Defender–Juvenile/Bergen – Alexis Dowling agreed with the waiver discussion. She discussed another issue is the limited youth evaluators, which lead to delays. One improvement is the Court has allowed psychiatric nurse practitioners to evaluate the youth.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the 2025 Plan Update is complete and we are waiting for the return of the executed paperwork. The 2026 Plan Update is progressing. The BCYSC Allocations subcommittee met and more meetings will be scheduled as well as planning subcommittee meetings. The program reviews/site visits are being completed. Reports and scores will be presented next month. The remaining program reviews/site visits will be done in September and October. The 2026 Plan update and allocations will be presented at the September or October meeting. There will be an RFP for a more comprehensive ATD program. It may be released at the end of August, and the YSC may be the entity that is needed to apply. Ro Lobretto asked about funding cuts. The 2026 budget has already been approved for the current amounts. Kristen Schwenderman reminded members that the funding is from the State and not federal so it should not be affected by the federal cuts. The MDT is restructuring and met in June. Meetings were held separately with Liana Dinallo and Melissa DeBartolo in regard to the MDT and where the new convener can sit. A meeting with all the players will be scheduled to brainstorm and solve some of the ongoing issues.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported the YJC is working with the Statewide Parent Advocacy Network (SPAN) to help the parents of the youth.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation – Janice Conti introduced Terri Santana, the assistant Chief, who will be attending until Janice’s position is filled. The new person could possibly attend the October or November meeting.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 2 evaluations in July (2 female and 5 male), 2 new referrals for BIPAS, No new referrals in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 4 new referrals in July

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – no new referrals in July

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 12 new referrals in July

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 18 referrals in July, serving 9 municipalities

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 4 new referrals in July

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 15 youth, 4 non-bracelet monitoring, 4 phone monitoring, 7 bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM)

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 14 youth residents, 11 from Bergen County

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 5 youth (2 female, 3 male). No Bergen County youth. The program has several positions open <https://bergencountynj.gov/employment/youth-group-worker-division-of-family-guidance/>

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS) – Stephanie Drag reported:

EPIC/Seeds of Change: *The Seeds of Change Youth Conference* is on Friday, October 24th at Felician University in Lodi and is part of Red Ribbon Week. County youth members have been present for the Seeds of Change steering committee. Members participated in providing input about and voting for the conference theme, giveaways, speaker, etc. There are 9 schools that filled out interest forms and will be followed up with in September for formal registration (Roy W. Brown/Bergenfield, Wood-Ridge Jr./Sr High School, Saddle Brook High School, North Arlington High School, Bergen Arts and Science Charter High School, Dwight Morrow High School/Englewood, Immaculate Heart Academy/Washington Twp., New Milford High School, and Bogota High School). The theme for the event is mental health and coping skills (better title to follow). *EPIC* in Lodi is planning to have giveaways of encouragement for the new school year for the incoming 8th graders at Thomas Jefferson Middle School (TJMS) and it will double as recruitment. A planning meeting is in the works for this month. Most of the summer has been spent on the youth preparing a “youth culture” training for staff. We sent out the Red Ribbon Week website to the TJMS counselor regarding what items they would want for red ribbon week. Other fall events we are planning to table at Back to School Night at TJMS and Lodi High School (if the high school has one).

Botvin LifeSkills Training and 7 Habits: From May 14 – August 6, we are running cycle of 7 Habits of Highly Effective Teens with the youth from the Bergen Family Center Youth Apprenticeship Program. There are 24 youth enrolled in the program. The second cycle of 7 Habits is being planned with youth from Bogota. For the Botvin LST program, we are reviewing our lessons based upon feedback received from the teachers and students in addition to the pre/post surveys. We are reaching out to any district that may require board approval for the program to be implemented. Finally, we will be reaching out to the schools for their health schedules soon.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – The program reported, “For our school programs with Lincoln Elementary and Roy W. Brown Middle School, we are in the process of finalizing the program calendars for the school year and working on the curriculum. We currently have 32 active matches in our Community-Based program, with another one potentially happening this month, for a 12-year-old female from River Edge. There are 15 Bergen youth currently on our waiting list to be matched, 12 of whom are males, ranging in ages from 7-16. Events: FIFA world cup match tickets were donated to us last month, which many matches being able to attend, including some from Bergen County. Our annual Back to School drive is underway, during which we will be giving away backpacks filled with school supplies. RSVPs are being collected now from interested families, with the distribution of backpacks happening towards the end of August. Special News: One of our Bergen County mentees who recently graduated won a \$5,000 scholarship through the Big Brothers Big Sisters of America: Deloitte Youth Equity & Empowerment Scholarship.

TMR Mental Health Care – The program reported currently 8 youth enrolled and 24 in total so far this year. Next week they are hosting two workshops, Monday and Wednesday, one for the youth who are transitioning to college geared toward mental health and how to adjust and the second session is for the parents.

Bergen County Special Services School District – Mitch Badiner reported openings at Gateway and Venture as well as SAP program.

Teaneck Public Schools – No report

YWCA – Johana Cruz reported the Junior Jumpstart college prep boot camp concluded. It was very successful. They were able to have a few field trips and were very excited to receive the gift card at the end of the program.

Old Business – No report

New Business – Georgina DeRosa reported about three new evidence based prevention programs coming for the NJ Department of Community Affairs (DCF) and can be referred by Child Protection & Permanency (CP&P), mobile response or CMO: Brief Strategic Family Therapy for youth 6-17 for youth who are at risk of out of home placement; Intercept Program for youth up to age 17 for youth who have experienced trauma or neglect having significant emotional and/or behavioral issues; Positive Parenting Program (PPP) for youth up to age 12 who have behavioral, emotional, and/or developmental issues; it addresses parents on appropriate discipline strategies and can be self-referred. Jo Ponticello reported that CAFS was awarded the Brief Strategic Family Therapy program and discussed the program further.

BERGEN COUNTY YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION (BCYSC)
Membership Meeting (Virtual)
September 3, 2025

Attendance report below.

Seth Victor called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Adiyah Washington, seconded by Kristen Ambrosio, *to approve the BCYSC August 5, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.* Linda Spiegel and Jorge Sandoval abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported the ongoing issues with waivers, more serious offenses and cases taking longer to resolve. As previously reported, the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) plans to begin visiting vicinages with high volumes of waiver cases to ensure consistency across the state. There has been no further information and no visits to date. Seth Victor asked how the cases are being moved (not counting waivers). Liana discussed the backlog percentage, some of the numbers from the court and the difficulties encountered. The goal for resolving a case is 90 days, which is very difficult to achieve.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported that approximately 9 juveniles are pending waiver, 3 also have adult cases, creating coordination challenges across dockets. Fewer new cases were reported over the summer, likely due to school not being in session. He discussed the ongoing issues with youth causing disruptions with e-bikes. Many municipalities are having issues, and some are passing ordinances to try to address them. Seth Victor has received increased inquiries from police departments regarding enforcement of E-bike violations involving minors. Some municipalities are considering ordinances to hold parents accountable, though legal clarity is still needed. Jamie Ziegelhofer noted that some counties previously had bicycle safety committees with law enforcement leading, but it is unclear whether those committees are still active.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) -Juvenile/Bergen – Alexis Dowling reported the ability to share evidence electronically, which can potentially improve case movement.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates –

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that the 2025 Plan Update is approved, and we are waiting for the executed documentation. The second quarter was finalized, and the Six Month Program Results report was presented. The level of service, outcomes and the fiscal spending will be further discussed at the upcoming allocations meetings to help determine priorities and actions for the rest of this year and into 2026.

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented some of the site visits and formal program review scores.

Big Brothers Big Sisters of Coastal & Northern New Jersey (BBBS): The site visit took place in the cafeteria of Roy W. Brown Middle School, located at 130 S. Washington Avenue in Bergenfield. Present were four staff members: Shannon Orefice, Director of Programs; Jolie Berkowitz, Case Manager; Samantha Medina-Sullivan, MSW Intern and yoga instructor; and Lisa Cieplechowicz, Program Manager. They welcomed the monitoring team and addressed all inquiries. The team interviewed three young participants who expressed satisfaction with the staff and activities, highlighting the engaging and creative games, the opportunity to make new friends, and their willingness to recommend the program to others. They also provided suggestions for improvement,

such as increasing staff numbers, incorporating feedback from the children, and utilizing different spaces for activities beyond the cafeteria. During the visit, a mindfulness activity was conducted with 16 youth (11 girls and 5 boys), facilitated by four staff members, followed by an interactive yoga session led by the intern. The participants were divided into four groups to practice various yoga poses, fostering teamwork, flexibility and creativity. The youth actively engaged in the activities, showcasing skills in time management, teamwork, and public speaking, while the staff maintained a supportive and professional demeanor, effectively interacting with everyone in a positive manner.

BBBS formal program review results: 112.3 total points received out of 114 points (98.5%), with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Adiyah Washington, ***to approve the BBBS site visit and program review scores, was carried.*** All in favor.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS): The program review was conducted at Teaneck High School. The file review was conducted. Three open and three closed files were complete and well-organized. During the review, the team observed a check-in activity where seven youth (three females and four males) rated their emotions on a scale of 1 to 10. The session, facilitated by school counselor Nick Campestre along with staff members Javalda Powell and Jessica Murphy, fostered a safe environment for sharing feelings confidentially. Later in the day, a guest speaker was scheduled to present at a photography session for the youth. Staff and Youth interviews were conducted. The students expressed high regard for the staff, appreciating the support, guidance, and learning opportunities provided by the program, as well as the food, which included pizza and snacks. The staff highlighted their effective collaboration with guidance counselors to identify youth who would benefit most from the program. Various activities were offered, focusing on behavioral, cultural, and social learning, including rock climbing and effective communication, all aimed at building strong relationships. TPS is in partnership with Soluna, and ensures that the youths have a voice, with specific cohorts designed for girls to create a more comfortable space for sharing personal experiences. The staff also identified some needs, expressing a desire to organize more trips for the youth (ideally 2-6 trips, such as visits to Broadway, although museum trips may be challenging due to school schedules). They would like the program to be longer and to have more staffing. Additionally, obtaining gift cards as incentives continues to be challenging.

TPS formal program review results: 114 total points received out of 114 points (100%), with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded Seth Victor, ***to approve the TPS site visit and formal program review scores, was carried.*** All in favor.

BCDFG RSAP formal program review results: 89 total points received out of 90 points (98.9%), with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded Seth Victor, ***to approve the BCDFG RSAP formal program review scores, was carried.*** Kristen Ambrosio, Jorge Sandoval, and Tara Smith abstained.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) formal program review results: 91.5 total points received out of 93 points (98.4%), with no formal recommendations. One issue that was discussed was the program could use more staff to keep up with the number of evaluations and the short turnaround time.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded Seth Victor, ***to approve the BCDFG PE formal program review scores, was carried.*** Kristen Ambrosio, Jorge Sandoval, and Tara Smith abstained.

Superior Court of NJ, Bergen Vicinage, Probation Youth and Family Engagement Programs formal program review results: 71.6 total points received out of 72 points (99.4%), with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded Seth Victor, *to approve the Superior Court of NJ, Bergen Vicinage, Probation Youth and Family Engagement Programs formal program review scores, was carried.*

The 2026 Plan Update is being completed and due by October 2025. The goal is to have it completed before the next meeting for approval. A planning and/or allocations meeting will be scheduled soon to review both the 2026 Plan Update and Application and 2026 funding allocations.

MDT – Meetings were held on June 25th, August 7th, and August 21st, with another meeting scheduled soon. Meetings are continuing while the structure is still being formalized. No expenses have been incurred yet. The court is now accepting psychiatric evaluations from nurse practitioners, which is great news. That was something discussed previously and will make things easier when we need to get evaluations done in the future.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan mentioned that the 2026 plan update and application is due on October 10, 2025, at 3pm.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation – No report

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 10 evaluations in August (2 female and 5 male), 1 male completed the program this month. No new referrals for BIPAS, 1 graduation. No new referrals in PAVE in August.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 3 new referrals in August.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 2 new referrals in August.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 2 new referrals in August. The theme was “Easy Summer”. There were 3 classes with 13 unduplicated youth. All 13 students rated the class as "good" or "awesome," and every participant showed increased knowledge by the end. Additionally, 4 students expressed interest in learning more about food safety. A “Serv Safe” training session is planned for this fall.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 9 referrals in August for 7 municipalities, serving 63 municipalities in total.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 1 new referral in August.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 12 youth, 5 non-bracelet monitoring, 3 phone monitoring, 4 bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM)

Visions – 11 residents (6 female, 4 male, 1 transgender youth)

Shelter Plus Care – 7 youth (2 female, 5 male)

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 17 youth, all male, 13 from Bergen County. One juvenile has been in detention for almost five years, and several others are 18, 19, and 20. Approximately 65% of the population consists of individuals who are already 18 or older. All but two youth have been in detention for more than 90 days.

He noted ongoing challenges, particularly with youth experiencing mental health crises. There are limited community resources available to support them in crisis and the absence of a forensic CCIS unit in the state means that when youth are in crisis, they are sent to the hospital but must return to detention due to their legal status. This creates a revolving door situation for those with mental health needs, as they cycle between hospital visits and detention without access to long-term care programs. On a positive note, 6 youth graduated from high school this year, and graduation ceremonies were held to celebrate their achievements. However, this presents a new challenge, as these graduates are no longer eligible to attend school, which is a core part of the daily programming. Staff is working with Bergen County Special Services to develop a new program tailored to these graduates. He concluded by thanking everyone for their support and shared that the NBA-size basketball court is now fully completed and operational. The youth are enjoying it.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter –4 youth (1 female, 3 male), 1 from Bergen County youth. Staff are prepared and anticipating an increase in referrals over the next week or two, coinciding with the start of the school year.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS) – Stephanie Drag reported:

EPIC / Seeds of Change

The EPIC program currently has 20 active high school members, with recruitment efforts underway to include middle school students. Planning for upcoming events and activities is progressing, with strong student input guiding the agenda. The Seeds of Change conference will focus on mental health and healthy coping skills, and the keynote speaker has been narrowed down to two candidates. Formal registration will begin shortly, targeting schools that showed interest in the spring.

The event is scheduled for October 24 at Felician University, Lodi Campus. Spending appears low at this stage due to a large portion of the budget being allocated to the conference, which will be spent in Q3 and Q4.

LST / 7 Habits

This summer, one cycle of the 7 Habits program was implemented in Englewood in partnership with Bergen Family Center, with 24 participants. Two scheduling challenges have emerged: Janis Dismus Middle School in Englewood received a grant to expand the program independently, supporting long-term sustainability. Hackensack Schools may not proceed due to administrative changes and confusion about the program's grade level, which CAFS is working to clarify. Outreach has also been initiated to Fort Lee Schools to explore renewed interest. Spending is slightly below 50%, consistent with the program's seasonal delivery, which sees similar activity levels from October to December as from January to June.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – Lisa Cieplechowicz reported: The agency recently completed its Back-to-School Drive, collecting approximately 400 backpacks filled with school supplies from various companies and donors. These were distributed across the ten counties served, including families in Bergen County. In the Community-Based Mentoring Program, two new matches were made in Bergen County last month: a 12-year-old girl from River Edge and a 16-year-old girl from Hackensack. With these additions, there are now over 30 active matches in Bergen County, consisting of 11 females, 20 males, and one youth who identifies as nonbinary. Fourteen children remain on the waiting list to be matched, including 12 males and 2 females, ranging in age from 9 to 16.

For the Site-Based Programs, including the BMW initiative at Lincoln Elementary and the Roy Brown Middle School program, recruitment is now underway. Staff will begin visiting schools to speak directly with students and encourage participation for the upcoming year.

BERGEN COUNTY YOUTH SERVICES COMMISSION (BCYSC)

Membership Meeting (Virtual)
October 8, 2025

Attendance report below.

Seth Victor called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Adiyah Washington, seconded by Kristen Ambrosio, ***to approve the BCYSC September 3, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.*** Judge Magali Francois, Amanda Marcino, Norah Peck, and Richard Nunes abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Magali Francois reported a very difficult caseload with a lot of violence and gun charges and issues finding appropriate treatment for youth with complicated mental health needs. There are also a large number of waivers pending.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – No report

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor echoed Judge Francois’s report and stressed the lack of resources in New Jersey for youth in custody with mental health needs. There are discussions across the county. School is in session, and they are receiving threats and incidents on a regular basis.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – Rich Nunes reported currently receiving more serious offenses consistently. Access to services are an increasing issue and the office is working on connecting youth with the resources that are available. He also sees a lot of education issues.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the 2026 Plan Update and Application and reviewed what was completed and what still needs to be completed.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor, ***to approve and submit the 2026 Plan Update and Application as presented was carried.*** Judge Magali Francois abstained.

The Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) Alternatives to Detention (ATD) program 2026 budget representing the 1/3 set aside was presented with a slight increase of \$1,601 for personnel costs, bringing the total from \$108,291 to \$109,892.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor, ***to approve the 2026 BCDFG ATD program budget as presented was carried.*** Melissa DeBartolo, Amanda Marcino, Judge Francois, Jessica Mulligan, Tara Smith, Kristen Ambrosio, Jorge Sandoval, and Jared Lautz abstained.

A roll call vote to approve: Richard Nunes – yes; Seth Victor – yes; Melissa H. DeBartolo – abstain; Shelby Klein – yes; Amanda Marcino – abstain; Rosemarie Lobretto – yes; Georgina DeRosa – yes; Judge Magali Francois – abstain; Jessica Mulligan – abstain; Tara Smith – abstain; Kristen Ambrosio – abstain; Jorge Sandoval – abstain; Jared Lautz – abstain; Adiyah Washington – yes; Norah Peck – yes; (7 yes, 8 abstain).

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the BCYSC Program Review Formal Monitoring scores for BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP), BCDFG ATD, and YWCA:
BCDFG ASAP formal program review results: 123 total points received out of 120.7 points (98.1%).
Recommendation: to explore the possibility of hiring more staff (1 male and 1 female).

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the BCDFG ASAP formal program review scores, was carried.* Melissa DeBartolo, Amanda Marcino, Judge Francois, Jessica Mulligan, Tara Smith, Kristen Ambrosio, Jorge Sandoval, and Jared Lautz abstained.

BCDFG ATD formal program review results: 119.3 total points received out of 120 points (99.4%), with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Shelby Klein, seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the BCDFG ATD program review scores, was carried.* Melissa DeBartolo, Amanda Marcino, Judge Magali Francois, Jessica Mulligan, Tara Smith, Kristen Ambrosio, Jorge Sandoval, and Jared Lautz abstained.

YWCA formal program review results: 105 total points received out of 111 points (94.6%).
Recommendation: to better organize and include all required documentation in the youth files; Submit quarterly reports in a more timely fashion.

A motion by Shelby Klein, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, *to approve the YWCA program review scores, was carried.* Judge Magali Francois abstained.

BCYSC Allocations subcommittee has been meeting and will continue to meet to discuss the 2025 budget modification, 2026 funding allocation recommendations, and the remaining program reviews and site visits. If completed, all will be presented at the next membership meeting. The November meeting was listed as “to be determined” but is now scheduled for Tuesday, October 28, 2025, at 8:45 AM.

Bergen County Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG), Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) Virtual Formal Monitoring is scheduled for Tuesday, October 14, 2025, at 11:00 AM.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS), Empowering Peers & Inspiring Change (EPIC) and Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits Virtual Formal Monitoring scheduled on Monday, October 20, 2025, at 10:00 AM.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS), EPIC - Youth Groups and Seeds of Change Youth Conference In person Site Visit is scheduled for Friday, October 24, 2025.

BCDFG Positive Strives (PS) and Culinary Arts for Teens (CA) will be scheduled soon.

MDT (Multi-Disciplinary Team) continues to meet with no expenditure requests for client specific funds.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported that Gerri Sheppard has joined the Bergen team as the new Juvenile Detention Alternatives Initiative (JDAI) Specialist. Erica Hein will continue to support her through the end of the year. The position is now filled full-time.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation – Amanda Marcino announced Ilir Miftari has been named Juvenile Supervisor, replacing Janice Conti. He will oversee both juvenile and adult sex offender units. New staff are in training, and for the first time in years, the office is nearly fully staffed. More updates are expected next month. Amanda Evans returned from leave and was promoted to Senior Officer. They are working on her replacement. Steve Havens is also transitioning out, with a new hire coming in. More changes are ahead for the juvenile unit. The final paint night of 2025 is scheduled for Tuesday, October 14, from 6:30 PM to 9:00 PM. Three youth have confirmed their attendance.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 6 evaluations in September (1 female and 8 male), 1 new referral for BIPAS. No new referrals in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 6 new referrals in September.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 2 new referrals in September.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 3 new referrals in September.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 20 new referrals September.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 4 new referrals in September. A new group just started.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 14 youth, 6 male non-electronic monitoring, 4 male on phone electronic monitoring, 3 male and 1 female bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM)

Visions – 6 female, 5 male, 1 transgender youth.

Shelter Plus– 7 of the 7 beds are occupied 8 youth (2 female, 5 male). Kristen Ambrosio announced that the program has been awarded two federal grants, which will continue to support both the shelter and Vision's Transitional Living Program for an additional three years. This funding renewal provides critical stability for ongoing services.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 20 juveniles, 14 from Bergen County and 6 out of County. Over 70% have reached the age of 18 and are considered adults. As noted by the Judge and prosecutor, these youth have more complex cases and are staying longer. Limited access to emergency mental health treatment and other services is impacting detention. Many of these youth have nowhere else to go and remain in detention longer. Advocacy for community-based services or solutions to these long-term cases may help reduce the time these youth spend in detention.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 8 youth (5 female, 3 male), 3 from Bergen County and 5 out of the County. The shelter has a capacity of 16 beds. One of the two Basic Center Program grants was awarded for Bergen's Place Youth Shelter. Tara Smith shared a brief update of activities: community cleanup planned with youth participation and pizza incentive; pumpkin painting contest is returning in two weeks.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS)

EPIC/Seeds of Change: EPIC has started the back-to-school season, tabling at Back-to-School Night to recruit new members. The Seeds of Change Conference is scheduled for Friday, October 24 at Felician University, Lodi Campus. Out of 13 interested schools, 9 have confirmed attendance: Wood-Ridge, North Arlington, New Milford, Bogota, Immaculate Heart, Saddle Brook, Ramsey, and Park Ridge. The students selected the theme "*Glow Through What You Go Through*", focusing on mental health and healthy coping strategies. The keynote speech, "*The Backpack of Life: Navigating High School with Resilience & Success*", will be followed by PreVenture curriculum activities, helping students identify their personality types and effective coping skills.

LST/7 Habits: The 7 Habits program is currently running at the Bogota Library, with 8 students participating. For LST, cycles are underway at Hackensack Middle School. Teaneck will begin in Marking Period 2 (November). Fort Lee has agreed to join the program, replacing Englewood, which now runs the program independently. Recruitment of Fort Lee has slightly delayed the start of the first marking period. Stephanie Drag introduced Julia Zabłudovsky who will attend the BCYSC meetings from NJ4S Bergen.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – Recruitment for school-based programs is actively underway, with strong student interest. The Roy W. Brown Middle School/Bergenfield High School program currently has 22 middle school students enrolled. The Lincoln Elementary School/BMW program has 25 elementary students confirmed to participate. In the Community-Based program, six new matches have been made so far this year, with expectations for additional matches before year-end. At present, there are 14 youth on the waiting list to be matched—12 males and 2 females—ranging in age from 7 to 16.

TMR Mental Health Care – In quarter 3, there were 10 youth enrolled in the program at the time. TMR provided 160 psychotherapy / med management sessions in Q3 / 5 evaluations.

Bergen County Special Services School District – No report

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – 21 youth are enrolled in the after-school counseling program, including 11 high school students, 10 middle school students. Intakes and family meetings are ongoing. Group sessions start October 14th and move forward with the program.

YWCA – the YWCA team, in collaboration with Parent Matterz, is making strong progress in preparing for the upcoming fall programming. Planning efforts are well underway and include creating participant registration forms coordinating catering and refreshments designing pre- and post-program surveys to assess impact and conducting outreach to secure engaging and relevant speakers. The program is scheduled for November 6 and November 7, 2025, from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM and will take place at the Hackensack Office, Conference Room 103. YWCA will launch registration and begin targeted outreach throughout Bergen County to encourage community participation.

Old Business – None

New Business – Georgina DeRosa from the Department of Children and Families, Child Protection and Permanency, announced that Sandra Cruz-Medrano has been officially appointed as Team Lead, replacing Anne Giacobbe. Sandra will attend further the BCYSC meetings, and Georgina will provide support as needed.

Norah Peck announced that she will attend the meetings as a designee for Patrick Fletcher.

Announcements – Jamie Zigelhofer: Northern Region YSC conference will not be held this year; instead, the BCYSC meeting and conference will take place on Tuesday, December 2, 2025, in person at Two Bergen County Plaza, Hackensack. The Save-the-Date notice is pending approval and will be emailed when available. Three presenters are being vetted, and attendees will enjoy breakfast, lunch, and YSC promotional items.

The next BCYSC membership meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 28, 2025.

Membership Meeting (Virtual)
October 28, 2025

Attendance report below.

Adiyah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Shelby Kelin, *to approve the BCYSC October 8, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes, was carried.* Judge Magali Francois and Linda Spiegel abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported that the Juvenile Unit is scheduled to return to Room 159 at the Court House. Construction in the space has been completed, and the move is planned for this Friday.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported that trends in delinquency remain consistent with those discussed at the previous meeting, particularly with youth having returned to school. There has been a noticeable increase in threats of violence, including bomb threats at schools; however, this activity is considered typical and not significantly higher than in the same period last year. Overall, there are no major changes from last month or earlier this month.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – No report

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates – BCYSC Allocations Subcommittee reviewed 2025 spending, 2024 spending patterns staffing vacancies, and other relevant factors and is proposing the follow modifications to the 2025 award:

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that the 2024 award is still in the process of being closed out. The 2025 budget modification will be submitted soon. The Allocations Committee continues to discuss 2026 funding and recommendations will be voted on via email and reaffirmed at the December meeting. The remaining program reviews and site visit summaries will also be reviewed by Allocations and emailed for a vote and reaffirmed at the December meeting. MDT meetings continue biweekly on Thursdays, coordinated by Kyle and Jamie. Thanks were extended to all BCYSC Allocations members for their flexibility and hard work.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – No report

Superior Court SCBV / Probation – Amanda Marcino announced staffing changes within the Juvenile Supervision Unit. Ilir Miftari has been appointed as the new supervisor. Keyshawn Morrison joined as a probation officer last week, and Isabella Gonzalez will transition from adult supervision to juvenile next week. Steve Havens will be moving to another unit. The updated team includes Ilir Miftari, Kristen Valentine, Isabella Gonzalez, and Keyshawn Morrison. Painting with a Purpose was held on October 14th, which was Ilir's first youth engagement activity. Four youth participated in creating Halloween-themed artwork. The event was well received. One participant proudly displayed their painting at home, reflecting the program's positive impact.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 5 court order evaluations in October (2 female and 9 male), 2 new referrals for BIPAS. One new referral in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 5 new referrals in October.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 3 new referrals in October.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 10 new referrals in October.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 23 new referrals in October.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 4 new referrals in October

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 12 youth, 4 youth on non-electronic monitoring, 2 youth on phone electronic monitoring, 6 youth on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM).

Visions – 11 residents (6 female, 5 male) in October.

Shelter Plus – 7 residents (2 female, 5 male) in October.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 17 juveniles, 13 from Bergen County and 4 out of County. No significant changes were reported, aside from ongoing support from the Prosecutor's Office, which has been appreciated. Special thanks were extended to Seth Victor for his continued assistance and contributions.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – The current census is 7 youth (5 females, 2 males) Of these, 3 are from Bergen County and 4 are from out of county. Last weekend, the shelter held a successful community clean-up event in Hackensack, with 5 of the 7 youth participating. Staff are planning several holiday outings. The group recently attended a movie with prior guardian approval. Upcoming activities include candy, caramel apples, and games for the youth.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS)

EPIC/Seeds of Change: The annual program review for EPIC/Seeds of Change was completed on October 20. The Seeds of Change Conference took place on Friday, October 24, at Felician University's Lodi Campus, with 60 youth in attendance. Unfortunately, participants from Ramsey were unable to attend due to transportation challenges. This year marked the inaugural participation of Immaculate Heart Academy. Both students and staff expressed enthusiasm about the experience and indicated strong interest in attending all future conferences. Their feedback highlighted the high quality of the keynote speaker. As part of the annual review process, youth were interviewed during the conference. EPIC is scheduled to hold a meeting on October 28, during which nominations for board positions will be taken. Additionally, EPIC youth will participate in the Lodi community's Trunk or Treat event on October 30.

LST/7 Habits: The annual review for the LST/7 Habits program was also conducted on October 20, 2025. On October 23, the review team observed LST session at Hackensack Middle School and conducted interviews with three students from the class. The 7 Habits program continues at the Bogota Public Library. LST cycles are ongoing in Hackensack and will start in mid-November in Hackensack and Teaneck. Implementation in Fort Lee is scheduled to begin after the new year. The time it took to recruit Fort Lee has put us behind schedule this year

Jamie Ziegelhofer shared that the CAFS EPIC/Seeds of Change (SOC) conference was well attended, with youth actively presenting their Action Plans. Attendees responded positively to both the venue and the speaker. Jamie, Matt Stanislao, and Laura Sirbu participated in the SOC event at Felician University. Additionally, Jamie, Kyle, and Laura visited Hackensack Middle School to observe the CAFS LST program, which received strong support from both students and staff. The teacher expressed enthusiasm for expanding the program to other communities.

Big Brothers Big Sisters – The Roy Brown Middle School and Bergenfield High School program is launching on Wednesday, October 29, with 25 middle school students and 28 high school mentors confirmed. The BMW program is scheduled to begin next month with 25 students confirmed. For the Community-Based program, six new matches have been made so far this year. There are currently 14 youth on the waiting list, including 2 female and 12 male, ranging in age from 7 to 16. There is continued optimism for additional matches before the end of the year.

TMR Mental Health Care – Attended the World of Resources Fair and appreciated connecting with local partners in person. Plans to share collected materials with youth and looks forward to the upcoming conference. Rosemarie Lobretto shared that Bergen County resources can be accessed online through the World of Resources. Shelby Klein added that many materials from the fair are included in

the county's CIACC booklet and offered to provide extra copies. Nick Campestre and Rhona Vega requested copies of the resource guide.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – Currently there are 20 students enrolled in the program, 10 middle school and 10 high school, meeting twice weekly in separate groups. Recent activities included guest speakers from Healing Space discussing healthy relationships and preventing relationship violence. Upcoming sessions will focus on digital safety, particularly issues related to AI, as well as building resiliency skills. A yoga instructor will also lead sessions to support mindfulness and emotional regulation. Both groups are highly engaged, and staff are enthusiastic about the months ahead.

YWCA – Since the last BCYSC meeting, Eventbrite registration has launched for the Fall 2025 cohort, scheduled for November 6 and 7 at the Hackensack office. As of now, 13 out of 20 students are registered: 7 girls and 6 boys, leaving 7 spots still available.

Old Business – Jamie Ziegelhofer attended the mandatory NOAF (Notice of Available Funds) state meeting on detention alternative funding. The county is now eligible to apply. Further group discussion will follow.

New Business – Amanda Marcino introduced Ilir Miftari, the new Juvenile Supervisor in Superior Court, Probation. Matt Stanislao warned about rising youth gambling through platforms like Kalshi. Though initially money-free, these apps can lead to real financial losses and false police reports. In schools, they cause classroom disruptions and addictive behaviors. The Juvenile Officers Association is tracking the trend and urging early intervention. Jamie Ziegelhofer added that this issue should be considered in future planning, with efforts to collect data and develop targeted interventions. Matt referenced a resource featuring a film and overview of the Pediatrics Institute of 2025's research on youth anxiety and behavioral challenges. Cultural influences and social implications are also discussed. In short, the material suggests that overparenting and overprotection contribute to childhood anxiety ("Free-Range Parenting: A Mom's Guide to Raising Independent Kids" - <https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=tbOKfN-PeMI>). Tasia Milicevic from TMR recommended *The Anxious Generation: How the Great Rewiring of Childhood is Causing an Epidemic of Mental Illness*, a book by Jonathan Haidt published in 2024.

Announcements – Shelby Klein announced that her office offers no-cost mental health and naloxone training trainings to agencies and community organizations. Those interested in scheduling a training can contact her at sklein@bergencountynj.gov.

The next BCYSC membership meeting and annual conference will be held in person on Tuesday, December 2nd at Two Bergen County Plaza, Hackensack. Resource tables will be available at the conference. Anyone who would like to share materials is encouraged to prepare and drop them off for display. A save-the-date flyer will be sent out.

Attendance report below.

Dr. Adiyah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order and announced the start of the third in-person BCYSC Conference.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the BCYSC October 28, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes, was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Magali Francois reported a rise in repeat offenses and an increase in the severity of juvenile charges. Family engagement after disposition remains limited, and service involvement often ends before youth return to court. Mental health needs among youth and families continue to grow, with many cases involving both juvenile and child-welfare systems. A major concern is the statewide shortage of appropriate treatment placements, especially for youth with significant mental health needs or competency issues. Some youth require levels of care that do not currently exist in New Jersey, leading to delays and repeated program disruptions. Cases have become more complex, with more serious offenses and limited placement options. The judge emphasized the need for continued collaboration and system-wide discussion to address these challenges.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported that the Juvenile Unit has successfully relocated from 202 A back to its original Room 159. Jodi Dimitri has been hired to assist Jessica in overseeing the unit; she will be formally introduced at the next meeting.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported that diversion programs continue to perform well, redirecting many low-level cases each month. As a result, the court’s remaining caseload now consists largely of higher-risk matters involving significant supervision and mental health needs. A major challenge is the lack of appropriate treatment placements, particularly for youth found incompetent to stand trial, which creates delays in case progression. Also noted was an increase in more serious offenses and safety-related incidents in schools. Although overall case numbers have declined, the complexity and severity of cases have grown, often requiring waiver consideration for older youth. Mr. Victor emphasized the need for expanded treatment resources and legislative updates rather than additional detention capacity.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – Richard Nunes reported that the office continues to provide thorough legal representation for youth, which may lengthen case processing but is essential to due process. Staff are also working with partners such as Bergen’s Promise and statewide education liaisons to address service needs, educational barriers, and school reentry issues, with additional meetings planned. There remains a strong need for mentors, and efforts to secure them are ongoing. The office has seen an increase in filings. Placement remains a significant challenge, especially for youth needing mental health or substance-use treatment.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that the 2026 plan is almost done. The program review for BCDFG Positive Strides is scheduled for Thursday, December 4, and the program reviews (approval of scores and site visit summaries) are aimed to be ready and finalized for the January meeting. Funding recommendations for 2026 will also be presented in January. The Multi-Disciplinary Team continues to meet every other Thursday and has resumed its regular schedule following the Thanksgiving holiday.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan reported a recent increase in Jamesburg commitments. He emphasized that despite the negative stigma often associated with these placements, the facility offers robust residential and rehabilitative opportunities. Support services include mental health care, substance abuse counseling, and anger management training. In addition to clinical support, youth can access educational and vocational programs, allowing them to attend school and maintain employment. Over the course of a two-to-three-year stay, many participants gain professional experience that leads to management roles and financial stability. The primary objective is to ensure youth exit the facility with greater skills and personal development than when they arrived.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation – no report

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 1 court order evaluations in November (1 female and 9 male), 1 new referral for BIPAS. No new referral in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 1 new referral in November.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – No new referrals in November.

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 1 new referral in November. Theme, Healthy Alternative: 5 classes, 20 unduplicated youths (26 total attendees), 1 first timers / new referrals, 26/26 [100%] rated class as “Good” or “Awesome”, 26/26 [100%] demonstrated increased knowledge, 11 clients want to learn more about Food Safety.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 15 new referrals in November. Serving 63 total of municipalities, 9 municipalities in month, up by 2 referrals than last year.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 2 new referrals in November.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 11 youth, 3 youth (0 female, 3 male) on non-electronic monitoring, 1 youth (1 female, 0 male) on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), 7 youth (0 female, 7 male) on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM) in November.

Visions – 10 residents in November with an email update, 11 residents (6 female, 4 male, 1 transgender).

Shelter Plus – 7 residents (2 female, 5 male) in November.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – The JDC currently houses 17 residents, including 4 from outside the county. Concerns were raised regarding the prolonged resolution of court cases, with several residents now over the age of 18. Additionally, there is a noted shortage of mental health resources available for residents experiencing crises or requiring residential placement.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 4 youth, with 3 youth from Bergen County and 1 from out of County. The residents recently enjoyed a home-style Thanksgiving feast and a trip to the Garden State Plaza arcade. The youth remain upbeat and well-behaved while engaging in holiday festivities, including a tree-decorating contest at Van Saun County Park and the "Winter Wonderland" event. Overall, the residents are doing well and enjoying the seasonal programming.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS):

EPIC/Seeds of Change: EPIC currently has 22 active members. To promote peer leadership, the group hosted an appreciation event in collaboration with the community service club and the National Honor Society. A holiday party is planned for December 11. The Seeds of Change conference had a fantastic turnout, involving 60 youth from seven different schools.

LST/7 Habits: The 7 Habits program in Bogota is concluding, with 7 youth having participated. LifeSkills Training is currently underway in Teaneck, with Hackensack scheduled to begin at the end of December and Fort Lee in January. (updates provided via email).

Big Brothers Big Sisters – no report

TMR Mental Health Care – The program is progressing well with five to six youth currently enrolled and termination planning underway for year-end. This year, the program did not reach its target of 65 youth because incoming participants presented with severe mental health symptoms—including anxiety, depression, and trauma—that required extended care. Staff noted an increase in vaping and cannabis use, though alcohol use has declined; youth requiring intensive treatment are referred to specialized providers. Additionally, persistent sadness was reported more frequently by girls, and LGBTQ+ youth experienced disproportionately higher levels of mental health concerns.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – 19 students enrolled. The program meets twice weekly with middle schoolers to focus on resiliency, anger management, healthy relationships, and internet safety. Recent highlights include a rock-climbing trip that built peer confidence and a table etiquette program where students practiced social skills over a formal meal. Students are also preparing care packages and letters for Never Alone Again to support families affected by domestic violence. Regarding safety, staff noted a rise in high-acuity incidents, including students carrying knives, and emphasized that robust prevention and early intervention are critical to stopping these behaviors before they escalate.

YWCA – The summer camp and Junior Jumpstart programming have concluded for the season. The fall cohort wrapped up two weeks ago with a successful turnout of 40 students who received hands-on assistance with the college application process. The program featured state representatives who discussed the financial realities of community college, technical schools, and four-year universities. Additionally, students participated in SAT preparation and workshops led by guest speakers focused on strategies for academic success. The participants were highly engaged and expressed great satisfaction with the resources and gifts provided at the conclusion of the program. Daniela Pinto, Senior Director of Youth Development at YWCA Northern New Jersey, joining today's conference.

Bergen 's Promise – Currently approximately 1,700 youth are being serviced within Bergen County, with roughly 4% currently under the supervision of Youth Justice. Staff and leadership, including Director John Dixon, reported a significant challenge regarding the increasing severity of charges and the complex mental health needs of these youth. There is currently a critical shortage of residential programs equipped to meet these specific requirements. The department is actively navigating these service gaps and is seeking recommendations for out-of-county services or specialized programs that can support high-acuity cases in need of intensive intervention.

Old Business – none

New Business – Jamie Ziegelhofer reminded everyone that the detention-alternatives RFP is underway, and the team is continuing to assess options for Bergen County.

Announcements – Kristen Ambrosio introduced Jennifer Loaiza as the new BCDFG Program Administrator, who will support the administrative team in overseeing the division's 27 programs, soon to be 28.

A motion by Seth Victor seconded by Jorge Sandoval, *to adjourn the BCYSC Membership Meeting, was carried.*

A motion by Shelby Klein and seconded by Martha Grant *to authorize Liana Dinallo as chair pro tempore to start the meeting, was carried.*

Liana Dinallo called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Shelby Klein seconded by Matt Stanislaw, *to approve BCYSC December 2, 2025, Membership Meeting Minutes, was carried.* Judge Francois, Alexis Dowling, Norah Peck, abstained.

Liana Dinallo presented the 2026 slate of officers. A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Shelby Klein, *to approve the BCYSC 2026 slate of officers, was carried.* Judge Francois, Alexis Dowling, Norah Peck, abstained.

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the 2026 allocations recommendations previously voted on via email to be reaffirmed:

The YSC Allocations Committee, all of whom were devoid of conflict of interest, met on October 6, 2025, October 27, 2025, November 5, 2025, and December 18, 2025. They thoroughly reviewed and discussed the current and previous plan data, quarterly reports, program reviews and all relevant documentation.

The committee is recommending funding for the following programs with no changes:

- Teaneck Public School / PASS Partnership - \$66,410
- Big Brothers Big Sisters / One to One Youth Mentoring - \$53,781
- Children's Aid and Family Services /LST - \$118,300
- TMR Mental Health / Treat Me Right - \$213,600
- Children's Aid and Family Services /EPIC - \$20,392.00
- BC Division of Family Guidance / Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) - \$98,334
- BC Division of Family Guidance / Positive Strides (PS) - \$27,790
- BC Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) / Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) - \$27,967
- BC Division of Family Guidance / Psychological Evaluations (PE) - \$82,100

The committee is recommending funding for the following programs with the below changes:

- BC Division of Family Guidance (BCDFG) / Culinary Arts – no longer funded
- MDT – no longer funded
- YWCA of Northern New Jersey / Junior Jump Start Program - \$40,600 (increase \$2,000 for 2 laptops)
- BC Division of Family Guidance / Alternatives to Detention - \$109,892 (previously approved)
- BC Division of Family Guidance / Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) - \$149,908 (increase \$12,000 to pay for the new drug testing)
- Confident Closets - \$15,195 (increase)
- Client Specific Funds - \$3,000 (reduced \$4000)
- Superior Court NJ / Probation - \$7,876 (decreased \$147 staffing changes)

A motion by Shelby Klein, seconded by Rosemarie Lobretto, *to reaffirm the vote for the 2026 funding recommendations, was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Magali Francois – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo reported that as of December 31st, there are 113 total cases with 34 in backlog, reflecting a definitive increase in the number of cases and charges.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported a quiet holiday season regarding calls and new cases and noted that he will provide updates on new legislation as it becomes available.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – Alexis Dowling reported a long wait for DCP&P files to be turned over to the Judge.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee/Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer stated that the 2025 narratives and fiscal reports are being collected to finalize the year-end reports.

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the BCYSC 2026 Standing Committees.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Shelby Klein, *to approve the 2026 BCYSC Standing Committees as presented was approved.* Judge Francois abstained. File attached below.

Jamie Ziegelhofer reported the executed paperwork was received for the 2026 plan update and application. Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the timeline for the 2027–2029 Comprehensive Plan and Application, noting that the state is revamping the process. The proposed schedule includes data collection and focus groups through April, drafting the plan by September, and final submission in October, followed by the RFP and funding allocation process.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Shelby Klein, *to approve the BCYSC the timeline for the 2027–2029 three-year planning cycle, as presented was carried.* Judge Francois abstained. File attached below.

Jamie Ziegelhofer presented the remaining BCYSC program reviews for approval:

Treat Me Right (TMR): The site visit took place at 835 Main Street in Hackensack. The space was very well maintained. The team toured the facility including the new yoga room. The monitoring team interviewed a mother and her 13-year-old son enrolled in the program for five months, as well as the mother of an 11-year-old youth. Both parents expressed satisfaction with their children's social and behavioral progress, highlighting the program’s effective approach, affordability, quality of care, strong staff communication, and flexibility (ability to provide virtual and in-person sessions). They appreciated that the program is free and recommended increasing session frequency and extending treatment duration. They also suggested expanding outreach efforts and incorporating a parent component or group to enhance youth outcomes and support parents that may be struggling. The youth were comfortable

with the staff and looked forward to attending. Three staff members were interviewed. They emphasized the agency's client-first approach, highlighting strong communication, valuable guidance, and consistent support provided to youth and families. Everyone had positive feedback.

TMR formal program review results: 116.2 total points received out of 117 points (99.3%) with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Shelby Klein, *to approve the TMR formal program review scores and site visit summary was carried*. Judge Francois abstained.

Children's Aid and Family Services - Botvin's Life Skills Training (CAFS LST): The monitoring team members observed the LST session at Hackensack Middle School and conducted interviews with three students from the class. Positive feedback was received from the three students interviewed. The youth were engaged and participated. It was very interactive and used current videos relevant to the topics at hand. The teacher expressed enthusiasm for the program and talked about the need to expand it to other communities.

CAFS LST formal program review results: 108 total points received out of 108 points (100%) with no formal recommendations.

Children's Aid and Family Services - EPIC/Seeds of Change (CAFS EPIC): The monitoring team attended in person the Seeds of Change Conference, which took place at Felician University Lodi Campus. There were 60 youth in attendance. The theme was "glow through what you go through, mental wellness and coping". The youth were actively engaged and participating. The team observed the youth presenting their action plans. Members of the team walked around and talked to the youth. They enjoyed the keynote speaker. All had positive feedback and were excited to bring back their action plans to their school.

CAFS EPIC formal program review results: 108 total points received out of 108 points (100%) with no formal recommendations.

A motion by Kristen Ambrosio, seconded by Seth Victor, *to approve the CAFS LST & EPIC formal program review scores and site visit summary was carried*. Judge Francois abstained.

BCDFG UTR formal program review results: 102.7 total points received out of 105 points (97.8 %). Recommendation: to explore the possibility of addressing the emerging trend of online gambling, to develop standard intake form for non-police/school referrals. Comments: Developing a UTR resource to address the emerging trend of online gambling would benefit the SHA program, Develop standard intake form for non-police/school referrals.

BCDFG PS formal program review results: 87 total points received out of 102 points (85.3%). Recommendation: to prioritize filling the vacant staff position, program's level of service is low - more outreaches may be needed.

BCDFG ASAP: The site visit was conducted at One Bergen County Plaza (OBCP) in Hackensack. The monitoring team observed the program, interviewed two youth and one staff member. A file review was also conducted earlier in the day. All documentation was found to be well-organized and in satisfactory condition. File Review was done at Conklin, youth Center and at 5:30pm Program review/ client interview at OBCP.

BCDFG ATD: The monitoring team conducted the site visit at 200 North Street in Teterboro, NJ. The program was fully staffed at the time of the visit, with four team members present: the program supervisor, two case managers, and one part-time case worker. The team conducted interviews with three staff members. Some staff members did not use the appropriate professional terminology. The team would like the agency to instruct the staff to consistently use appropriate and professional terminology when communicating with and about the youth. During the visit, the monitoring team interviewed three youth participants, one female and two males. All youth responded to questions appropriately and spoke well of the program and staff. The team also observed a group activity focused on emotional awareness and first impressions. Each youth were actively involved, and the staff members facilitated an inclusive and interactive environment, encouraging participation from youth. Pizza was served to the youth. The monitoring team suggested adding more guest speakers from trade and vocational schools, which could give youth clearer insight into career options and hands-on job paths. The monitoring team emphasized the importance of establishing connections with local employers such as Amazon to expand job opportunities available to youth.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Shelby Klein, *to approve the BCDFG UTR and PS formal monitoring scores and BCDFG ASAP and ATD site visit summaries was carried.* Judge Francois, Melissa DeBartolo, Tara Smith, Kristen Ambrosio, Jorge Sandoval, and Jared Lautz abstained.

YWCA Junior Jump Start: The site visit was conducted at 214 State Street, Hackensack, NJ 07601. The team met Natalie Ramey and Johana Cruz. During the visit, the team interviewed 3 youth and 2 staff members, all of whom expressed that the program was highly beneficial. Workshops and interactive activities were especially helpful, offering practical guidance on the college application process, resume building, scholarship opportunities, career exploration, and networking. Youth participants reported feeling more confident and better prepared for their futures. Parents also played an active role in the program. While youth were enthusiastic about the program and staff, they expressed interest in expanding speakers from a more varied background and to include more creative fields such as art, writing, and film, beyond the current focus on business. They also voiced a desire for more college campus visits. The file review was attempted, but incomplete. The file review is scheduled for reevaluation at the formal monitoring program review. The monitoring team observed the program, with 19 youth and 3 staff members present. A virtual speaker from Vibe Magazine encouraged the youth to have fun, but to make sure they do not take senior year off. He also talked about social media, but stressed staying connected to the real world and using it as a tool only. Lunch was served for the youth.

A motion by Seth Victor, seconded by Kristen Ambrosio, *to approve the YWCA site visit summary was carried.* Judge Francois abstained.

Jamie Ziegelhofer mentioned a meeting to be held Friday with Jared Lautz, Melissa DeBartolo, and Nick Montello to discuss the request for proposal (RFP) for detention alternatives and MDT.

The Multi-Disciplinary Team continues to meet every other Thursday.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan – no report
Superior Court SCBV / Probation – no report

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 8 court order evaluations in December (1 female and 9 male), 2 new referrals for BIPAS. No new referral in PAVE. December's performance was likely impacted by the holidays and school breaks; a rebound is expected in January. Jamie Ziegelhofer pointed out that these outcomes will affect all the programs.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 6 new referrals in December.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 4 referrals in December

BCDFG Culinary Arts for Teens – 1 new referral in December. The theme was Holiday Happiness. There were nine classes with 17 unduplicated youth, 28 in total attendance. Three youth first timers.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 9 new referrals in December.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 4 referrals in December.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 17 youth, 6 youth (6 male) on non-electronic monitoring (NEM), 5 youth (2 female, 3 male) on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), 6 youth (1 female, 5 male) on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM) in December.

Visions – 11 residents in December (5 female, 5 male, 1 transgender).

Shelter Plus – 7 residents (2 female, 5 male) in December.

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 16 Juveniles, 12 from Bergen County and 4 from out of the County. Despite a slight population decrease, 60% of residents are adults. Placement delays are causing behavioral deterioration, leading to increased incidents and additional charges.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 8 youth (6 female, 2 male) with 4 youth from Bergen County and 4 from out of County. Holiday programming was successful, including gift-giving, ice skating, light tours, and home visits. However, the facility continues to face a significant challenge in securing placements for female teenagers.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS):

EPIC/Seeds of Change: In December, the program hosted a holiday party attended by 12 members and several guests. The group recently completed a formal health assessment, scoring a 3.5. This score indicates "healthy" status, reflecting strong engagement, retention, and progress toward goals.

Regarding membership, two students had positive discharges due to relocation, while two new 8th-grade students have joined. Upcoming activities include a session focused on mental health and wellness, as well as a community safety project distributing DUI awareness coasters to local establishments to discourage impaired driving.

Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits has resumed in both Teaneck middle schools. Following successful coordination meetings with school administration, the program will launch in Fort Lee tomorrow as a replacement for the Englewood site.

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) – Following a successful 2025, the program reported a high volume of activity in December, highlighted by a holiday party for over 100 participants featuring gift distributions and a visit from Santa. Currently, there are 80 active matches, consisting of 30 community-based pairs and 50 within the BMW school-based programs at Lincoln Elementary and Roy Brown Middle School. Today's BMW session will focus on New Year's goal setting and a "wishing wand" activity. Looking ahead to 2026, the program aims to maintain its momentum with a specific focus on increasing community-based matches.

TMR Mental Health Care – The program concluded 2025 with the successful discharge of 12 enrolled youth and has begun 2026 with five new enrollments. During the fourth quarter, the team

delivered 162 therapy sessions. Moving forward, staff will participate in several community family wellness events to promote program services and increase outreach for the new year.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – The program completed its 2025 cycle with strong results, graduating 18 total students including five in the final quarter. While 13 participants will continue into the new year, staff are currently conducting intakes to reach full capacity. Data collected from parents and students indicates significant growth in life skills; specifically, graduates have avoided law enforcement contact and seen a decrease in school suspensions.

YWCA – The program is currently in the planning phase for the upcoming summer and November sessions. Efforts are focused on finalizing specific dates and coordinating with consultants to secure their availability for the scheduled two-week periods.

Bergen's Promise – Bergen's Promise currently serves 1,753 youth, with three individuals currently in the shelter and seven at the detention center. A primary challenge moving into 2026 is the critical shortage of in-state and out-of-state residential placements for youth qualifying for out-of-home care. Despite extensive outreach, the program continues to struggle to find facilities that meet the specific needs of youth currently held in detention or shelter environments.

DCP&C – It was reported 1,693 open investigations and 93 children currently in placement. Graciela Reyes was announced as the new Local Office Manager for the Paramus office. The agency continues to face a critical shortage of residential and resource homes, leading to significant placement disruptions over the holidays, particularly for youth with complex behavioral needs.

In regards with youth gambling and extortion trends, Matt Stanislao and Seth Victor highlighted the rise of teen gambling on social media platforms. They noted an emerging trend where outside actors use these platforms to exploit and extort underage users. Despite becoming a major distraction in schools, this is not yet widely treated as a clinical addiction. The Juvenile Officers Association will prioritize addressing these "peer-to-peer" gambling risks in 2026.

Old Business – none

New Business – Shelby Klein provided an overview of 2026 prevention funding for mental health and addiction, emphasizing the coordination of resources across various municipal and direct prevention grants. Funded programs for the upcoming year include CAFS EPIC, Footprints for Life, and Forest Friends, the Lindsey Meyer Teen Institute's Teen Summit and Youth Task Force, and evidence-based initiatives at local Boys & Girls Clubs, such as SMART Moves in Lodi and Hackensack and Journeys in Garfield. Additionally, the county will fund Alumni in Recovery for school-based substance use prevention presentations. These funding streams represent significant opportunities for youth support and public engagement.

Attendance report below

Seth Victor called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Shelby Klein seconded by Adiyah Washington. *to approve BCYSC January 6, 2026, Membership Meeting Minutes, was carried.*

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Magali Francois – No report

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo announced that Jody Dimitri is sharing the supervision of the juvenile unit with Jessica Mulligan. Liana also confirmed that the department has officially moved back into their renovated office space.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported that the office handled approximately 380 cases from January through December of 2025. He noted things have been relatively quiet, with no significant spikes in school-related incidents or noteworthy changes to report over the last month.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – Alexis Dowling reported the loss of Dr. Poveda is slowing things down a little bit because now they need to find outside experts to complete the psychosexual evaluations and they lost the only Spanish-speaking psychologist doing evaluations.

Alexis Dowling and Seth Victor both noted an increasing complexity in recent cases, highlighting a growing need for psychological evaluations.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee / Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that the program results report is not complete because quarterly reports are still pending. The report is projected to be completed by the next meeting. Final corrections for the 2026 Plan Update are being completed this week once it will be complete. There is a potential new format for the 2027-2029 Comprehensive Plan. Currently, we are collecting data to be included in the Plan. If any members have local data, they need to send it to us so we can review it and decide if it should be included in the Plan. The MDT meetings continue bi-weekly, every other Thursday. A meeting between the County and the Court is being scheduled to discuss the future trajectory and coordination of the MDT.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan – no report

The committee discussed the lingering census in the JDC, particularly youth who have been waived to adult criminal court. Regarding waiver motions, three to four youth are currently waived to adult court, and another three to four cases have pending motions. Cases with multiple co-defendants remain complex, as contingent pleas often slow overall progress. Seth Victor and collaborating partners are working with the courts and treatment providers to ensure youth do not remain in detention longer than necessary.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation — Ilir Miftari provided an update on the psychosexual evaluation resource, proposing a potential solution to the current evaluator shortage by suggesting a provider currently utilized for the adult sex offender unit. He committed to contacting the provider to confirm

their willingness to accept juvenile cases and verify their fee structure, which is estimated to be between \$750 and \$1,000 per assessment. Seth Victor and Alexis Dowling noted that this rate is significantly more cost-effective than other quotes, which have reached as high as \$6,000. While the provider requires payment in full before releasing reports, Jamie Ziegelhofer mentioned coordinating funding through the CMO or client-specific funds. Shekinah Williams asked to be included in the discussion and stated they may be able to set up an MOU with the provider.

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 7 court-ordered evaluations in January. Group Participation: 10 youth (2 female, 8 male), 2 new referrals for BIPAS. No new referral in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 3 new referrals in January. Regarding BCDFG staffing and psychological evaluations, concerns were raised about the departure of Dr. Colombino and Dr. Poveda, who comprised the majority of the forensic unit. Reports are being completed. Dr. Delectus is currently part-time and may add hours. Two interviews have been conducted, and management is actively seeking specialized staff to fill the vacancies.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 3 new referrals in January.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 8 new referrals in January. The total number of municipalities is 63.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 5 new referrals in January.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 17 youth in January. Eight youth (0 female, 8 male) on electronic monitoring (NEM), 3 youth (1 female, 2 male) on phone electronic monitoring (PEM), 6 youth (1 female, 5 male) on bracelet electronic monitoring (BEM).

Visions – 12 residents in January (6 female, 5 male, 1 transgender male).

Shelter Plus – 7 residents in January (2 female, 5 male).

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 17 youth in January (2 female, 15 male). 11 youth from Bergen County and 6 youth out of Bergen County.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 10 residents in January (7 female, 3 male). Five from Bergen County and 5 youth out of Bergen County.

CAFS - EPIC/Seeds of Change: Planning for the annual conference is officially underway, coordinated this year by Jennifer Bake. The Youth Steering Committee is hosting a listening session on February 3rd at 4:00 PM via Zoom to gather feedback and insight and identify key issues affecting local students.

CAFS - Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits: has officially launched within the Fort Lee School District and is currently proceeding successfully, replacing Englewood. Similar programming is also underway in Teaneck, while sessions in Hackensack are scheduled to resume next week. The team is targeting October 23 or 30 (Red Ribbon Week) at Ramapo College, currently working to bypass standard booking delays to secure early approval for school district planning requirements.

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) – The agency reported a strong start to the year, currently serving over 50 youth in school programs and 30 in community-based programs. This includes a recent "double match" for two sisters from Wallington. While a waiting list of 13 youth remains, seasonal engagement continues, including an upcoming baking event at La Promenade in Tenafly. Additionally, a \$5,000 scholarship opportunity through BBBS of America and the Deloitte Foundation is available to current and former participants up to age 24; the agency is actively promoting this following the success of a Bergen County recipient last year.

TMR Mental Health Care – It was reported that there are currently 6 youth enrolled in the program. It was announced the launch of a new psychoeducational group for adolescents aged 10 to 15, which will be co-facilitated by Tasia Milicevic and a master-level intern. The program is currently in the interest-gathering phase, and a survey will be distributed to families to determine the most convenient scheduling. The program flyer will be shared with the group for referrals and aims to officially launch the sessions within the next month.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – It was reported that the department is carrying over 13 students from the previous year. The program is currently awaiting final approval from the Board of Education to secure and initiate the necessary funding to begin operations for the current cycle.

YWCA – reported that the Junior Jump Start summer program is currently in the planning phase, with sessions scheduled for the weeks of July 13th and July 20th. The agency is currently finalizing its roster of guest speakers and curriculum details. Additionally, the YWCA is offering a free candle-making activity for a group of approximately 20 to 25 young women between the ages of 13 and 16. Partner agencies are encouraged to reach out to jcruz@ywcannj.org to coordinate a group for this opportunity.

Bergen's Promise – Currently serves 1,763 youth, with a notable increase in the level of service observed over the past several weeks. Current placements include 5 youth in the shelter, 1 youth in Essex, and 6 youth at the detention center. Echoed the sentiments shared by Christine, Alexis, and Seth regarding evaluation concerns, which remain a priority following recent discussions. To address this, we will actively link with new providers and share any high-quality evaluation resources identified with the group to ensure continued support and collaboration.

Old Business – Matt Stanislaw reported Law Enforcement update addressing veiled threats, a trend of youth, intimidating, "gangster-style" language intended to incite fear without making an explicit criminal statement. He advised that these incidents should still be processed as Stationhouse Adjustments to ensure the intent is documented and addressed. Seth Victor concurred, recommending that officers conference individual cases with him to determine the appropriate intervention.

New Business – Rhona Vega, founder and CEO of Exposure and Opportunities LLC, who runs the Junior Jumpstart program at YWCA, announced the release of her new book, *A Blueprint for Parents*. The book helps parents guide youth toward positive opportunities and interests. Rhona can share more details with those interested in using it for parent engagement.

April 7, 2026

Attendance report below

Seth Victor called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Shelby Klein seconded by Seth Victor *to approve BCYSC February 3, 2026, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.* Judge Magali Francois and Linda Spiegel abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Magali Francois shared that she had recently attended the National Council of Juvenile and Family Court Judges conference in Minneapolis. She described the event as informative and emphasized that New Jersey is significantly ahead of other states in implementing juvenile detention alternatives, carefully reviewing waiver decisions, and prioritizing rehabilitative services.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Marcia Hartkopp reported no new developments but stated her agreement with Judge Francois that New Jersey continues to lead in juvenile justice best practices.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – Seth Victor reported waivers are lower with one waiver remains pending currently. He discussed the types of offenses occurring and the different trends contributing. He noted slight drops in violent crime and school firearm incidents in 2026, but overall violence is still high. Knife-related cases remain a major issue, and a yearly trend involving realistic-looking guns (gel blasters, air soft, etc.) continues to create safety challenges during warmer weather. He reported no movement on any key juvenile justice legislation. He discussed the ongoing talks with legislature and other working groups to address the continuing need for psychological services, especially with competency issues.

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – Alexis Dowling expressed concern about violence trends. She noted an alarming pattern of high-achieving students bringing knives to school because they feel threatened by peers through online gaming communities and social media. She also discussed escalating tensions in Hackensack, where students are openly expressing intentions to retaliate for recent violent events. She also asked for alternatives to the New Hope substance abuse program. The youth being sent have behavioral issues and the program cannot handle them. Many youth have been expelled from the program within a week. It is not beneficial to have a program accept referrals only to expel them from the program. Probation has also experienced the same issues with the program. They also described increasing levels of conflict among youth reporting to the probation office.

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee / Subcommittee Reports/Updates – Jamie Ziegelhofer reported that the 2025 program results are not yet finalized but should be ready by next month. She has been busy scheduling program reviews and site visits and encouraged members to sign up or reach out with questions. Planning has also begun for the next three-year plan, though the new format has not yet been fully reviewed. The 2023, 2024, and 2025 juvenile offense maps were completed and presented. A surprising trend was noted: for the first time in over a decade, Hackensack is not leading in juvenile offenses. She plans to examine whether the stationhouse adjustment program may have contributed to this change. She presented the updated offense rankings, noting significant

shifts for 2025. Englewood is now ranked first, followed by Teaneck, with Hackensack dropping to eighth place, its lowest position since she began tracking this data. Several towns newly appear in the top rankings, while others that were high in 2024 have dropped out. She invited questions about the data and proposed holding planning meetings to review the findings in more detail, with the goal of incorporating them into the upcoming three-year plan.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Shelby Klein, *to include the 2023, 2024, and 2025 County Maps and offenses summaries in the 2027-2029 Plan and Application data, was carried.* Judge Francois abstained.

Planning meetings will be scheduled soon, and members are encouraged to send any local data to be considered for inclusion in the upcoming plan. It was noted MDT has been meeting regularly and thanked Laura for stepping in until a convener is found. She also announced that planning is beginning for this year's conference, which may be organized as a Northern Region conference in coordination with counties such as Passaic, Essex, and Somerset. A committee will be discussed at the next northern region YSC meeting. If any BCYSC members would like to join the committee, please let her know.

Program Updates:

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 4 evaluations in March. Group participation: 9 youth (6 male, 3 female), 4 new referrals for BIPAS with 1 completing the program. One new referral in PAVE.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 5 new referrals in March, 1 relocated youth.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 1 new referral in March.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 13 new referrals in March from 8 municipalities. 63 municipalities participating in total. The first from Saddle Brook.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 3 new referrals in March.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 12 youth in March. 5 on BEM (4 male, 1 female), 1 make on PEM, 6 youth on non electric monitoring (5 male, 1 female)

Visions – 10 residents in March (5 female, 4 male, 1 transgender).

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 19 youth in March (all male). 14 youth from Bergen County and 5 youth from out of county.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 6 residents in March, (4 female, 2 male). 3 from Bergen County and 3 out of county youth. She reported that the shelter currently has six youth, which is lower than usual. They are seeing similar issues to others in the county, including youths being removed from the New Hope program after only a few days and returned to the shelter. She noted an increase in conflicts among the girls, who tend to hold grudges and engage in group-based disputes, and emphasized that the shelter is seeing more female residents overall, staying longer and involved in more fights. On a positive note, the youths will participate in a park-cleanup volunteer event this weekend that provides program funding and incentives for participants.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – Nick Campestre reported that the program is now operating smoothly, with 18 students enrolled across the middle and high school groups. Early delays were caused by staffing shortages, but new personnel have since been hired, an intern has joined the team, and he continues to provide counseling support as needed. The middle school component launched earlier and is performing well, and several additional intakes are expected to bring the high school program to full capacity shortly.

He also noted an increase in youth conflicts within the community, reflecting a resurgence of clearly defined group tensions reminiscent of patterns observed a decade ago. These issues appear to involve students in Teaneck, Englewood, and Hackensack and are of significant concern. He emphasized the importance of expanding mental-health and mentoring resources within schools to ensure students have trusted adults available for support. Finally, he acknowledged Teaneck's recent rise in offense rankings and expressed hope that future data will reflect improvement.

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) – Lisa Cieplechowicz reported strong progress in the community-based mentoring program, with seven new matches made this year—four male youth and three female—bringing the year-to-date total to 39 matches. An additional 19 youth have begun the enrollment process, and the program is currently serving children ages 6 through 18. She also noted 53 active matches in group-based programs in Bergenfield, including at Lincoln Elementary School (BMW) and Roy Brown Middle School.

Recent activities in the middle school program included a family-feud-style game focusing on positive peer qualities and stress-management strategies. At Lincoln Elementary, recent sessions centered on recognizing emotions, identifying stressors, and practicing healthy coping skills; students created stress balls with positive affirmations and engaged in breathing exercises. She reported consistently strong attendance across both programs and expressed optimism about maintaining that momentum throughout the remainder of the school year.

YWCA – Johana Cruz reported that there is limited activity to share at this time since the program operates only for two weeks during the summer. The marketing and communications team is preparing to launch registration within the next two to three weeks. In addition, Parent Matters is in the process of securing speakers and confirming arrangements with the SAT preparation provider. Overall, preparations are progressing as planned and the program is moving in a positive direction.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation — Ilir Miftari reported that efforts are underway to develop several youth programs for the coming months. One initiative includes securing an influential speaker affiliated with the Hudson County Sheriff's Department and active in the hip-hop community, with the goal of engaging students before the end of the school year. Additional recreational activities, such as a gaming truck and other summer events, are also being planned. He noted ongoing staffing changes within the juvenile team, which have placed additional pressure on current officers, but emphasized that they are working to manage the workload as effectively as possible. He concluded that these are the primary updates at this time.

TMR Mental Health Care – Tasia Milicevic suggested that vicarious trauma would be an important topic for the upcoming conference, noting that recent incidents in Hackensack have emotionally affected several youths even without direct involvement. Given broader conditions in the community and the world, she emphasized the value of providing guidance on coping with stress and secondary trauma. Regarding program operations, she reported that 12 youths are currently enrolled, with 18 served so far this year. The program is running a co-ed group for ages 10 to 15 on Tuesday evenings, now in its fourth week, with six participants attending consistently. She noted that overall, the program continues to run smoothly.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS)

CAFS - EPIC/Seeds of Change – EPIC was proud to support students at Thomas Jefferson Middle School by supplying personal hygiene items to teens through their trusted health teacher and community service club advisor. This partnership demonstrates how thoughtful collaboration can meet real needs, and it's an initiative EPIC would be excited to build on again.

The Seeds of Change Conference has been booked for Friday, October 23 at Ramapo College of NJ. Based on student survey feedback and the youth steering committee the conference will revolve around the impact of trying to fit in on mental health with a focus on body image. Save the dates and interest forms will be going out to schools by the end of April.

CAFS - Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits – So far this year, we have completed Botvin LifeSkills Training at Thomas Jefferson MS, Teaneck (3 cycles/30 sessions), Benjamin Franklin MS, Teaneck (3 cycles/30 sessions), Hackensack MS (4 cycles/40 sessions), and at Lewis F. Cole Intermediate School, Fort Lee (6 cycles/60 sessions). Currently in progress are: Lewis F. Cole Intermediate School (12 of 60 sessions completed) and Midland School, Rochelle Park (15 of 20 sessions completed).

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan explained that the 2027–2029 plan has been released and appears simpler than the last version, thanks to a joint committee that worked to streamline the process. This should make planning easier for the team, though adjustments may still be made as needed. He also encouraged members to participate in program monitoring, emphasizing that it's a valuable way to see the strong work being done across funded programs. He closed by thanking everyone for their support.

Old Business – Adiyah Washington reiterated the importance of signing up for program monitorings, emphasizing that these visits allow members to observe operations firsthand, share insights, and strengthen collaboration across organizations. Monitoring dates are scheduled through the end of May, with additional sessions likely in June. She then asked whether a voting member's designee is permitted to attend monitoring visits in their place. Kyle Sheehan said he will verify, but believes it is permitted.

New Business – NJ4S updated - Julia Zabludovsky explained that NJ4S is not included in the Governor's proposed budget for mental health and youth services, and the proposal instead calls for the sunseting of the program. She emphasized that this would be a significant loss for the statewide team and the students they serve, as NJ4S has become deeply integrated into Bergen County schools and communities. The program currently provides access to licensed professionals and a wide range of prevention and intervention services across 83 schools, including bullying prevention, vaping education, mental-health programming, cyber-safety workshops, and prom-season safety sessions. All services are free and designed to meet students where they are, particularly in high-need communities.

She highlighted recent and upcoming programming, such as senior safety workshops, vaping-prevention sessions, and collaborative events with local partners. She also noted NJ4S's ongoing work with community organizations, including libraries, where free programming is especially valuable for youth who cannot afford extracurricular activities or camps. The program's leadership is actively advocating with state legislators, gathering data, and requesting letters of support from community members to help sustain NJ4S. Contact information was provided for anyone wishing to submit testimonials or support materials. The program director added his appreciation for the group's support and reiterated their commitment to partnership and advocacy efforts.

Announcements – Shelby Klein announced that the Bergen County Stigma-Free Symposium will be held on Wednesday, May 13. The event is open to the public at no cost, though registration is required. She will provide the flyer to Jamie for distribution to the group. The symposium will feature a keynote speaker and a panel highlighting various stigma-free initiatives taking place throughout Bergen County.

Officer Matthew Stanislao noted that, effective July 1, New Jersey will require e-bikes and other micromobility devices to be registered and insured, similar to mopeds. While a driver's license is not required to operate these devices, failure to register/insure may lead to enforcement actions that could affect future driving privileges, which may prompt some juveniles to panic and flee during police encounters. To mitigate this risk, he plans to work with the Juvenile Officers Association on enhanced warning and education protocols and expects clearer insight into impacts by September when school resumes.

He explained the policy change is driven by increased crashes, including incidents where youths modify (“crank” or “mod”) e-bikes to exceed intended speeds, leading to severe and sometimes fatal outcomes. Adiyah Washington requested that any parent information sessions be shared with Jamie for wider distribution.

He also highlighted implications for youth and young adults with autism, many of whom use micromobility devices for transportation. He is preparing a short PSA for Autism Awareness Month and recommends riders carry a “blue envelope” or similar identifier to help law enforcement recognize autism and facilitate calm, constructive interactions during stops.

Bergen's Promise – Shekinah Williams reported that Bergen's Promise is currently serving approximately 1,700 youth through CMO services, with two youth in the shelter and five in the detention center. She expressed concern about the increasing number of youths being accepted into the New Hope program only to be discharged shortly afterward, which disrupts care and creates placement challenges. She plans to schedule a meeting with New Hope to clarify admission expectations, better understand the reasons for rapid discharges, and determine whether alternative programs may be more appropriate. She invited probation to participate in that discussion. She also noted ongoing difficulties statewide in securing appropriate out-of-home treatment placements, resulting in youth remaining in shelters or detention centers longer than necessary for housing reasons rather than treatment needs. She requested information about any suitable in-state or out-of-state programs—particularly mental-health or substance-use treatment options—that may be able to serve these youth.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto seconded by Matt Stanislao *to adjourn the BCYSC Membership Meeting was carried.*

Membership Meeting (Virtual)

Attendance report below

Dr. Adiyah Washington called the Membership Meeting to order.

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto seconded by Liana Dinallo *to approve BCYSC April 7, 2026, Membership Meeting Minutes was carried.* Judge Magali Francois and Martha Grant abstained.

Superior Court of NJ – Judge Magali Francois reported on a recent collaborative meeting with representatives from Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS), the Sheriff’s Department, Juvenile Probation, Seth Victor from the Prosecutor’s office, and Alexis Dowling and Crystal Bailey from the Public Defender office. The group is working to establish a closer partnership between the Court and BBBS to provide mentors for juveniles on the docket who are facing repeat offenses. The Sheriff’s Department expressed support based on successful past program experiences. Additionally, the group is in the early stages of exploring a Credible Messenger program—modeled after successful initiatives in Hudson and Middlesex Counties which pairs youth with adult mentors who have "lived experience" in the justice system.

Superior Court of NJ–Family (Juvenile) – Liana Dinallo provided an update on the current juvenile case statistics, noting that there are 73 cases currently pending. While the Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) sets a goal to dispose of cases within 90 days (theoretically by June 30th for current filings), she noted that reaching zero pending cases is rare across the state. Currently, 20 cases are over the 90-day goal, though these involve only nine juveniles with multiple charges, each charge is a different case. On a positive note, Ms. Dinallo reported that there are no backlog cases with waivers pending.

Bergen County Prosecutor’s Office/Juvenile – No report

NJ Office of the Public Defender (OPD) - Juvenile/Bergen – No report

BCYSC Administrator Report/ BCYSC Committee / Subcommittee Reports/Updates – The attached site visit summaries were discussed, TPS PASS Partnership, CAFS LST, CAFS EPIC, BBBS One to one mentoring, and BCDFG ASAP

A motion by Rosemarie Lobretto, seconded by Shelby Klein *to the site visit summaries (TPS, CAFS LST, CAFS EPIC, BBBS, and BCDFG ASAP) was approved.* Judge Magali Francois abstained. Melissa DeBartolo, Kristen Ambrosio and Tara Smith abstained from the BCDFG ASAP site visit summary. Norah Peck abstained from the school programs TPS, CAFS LST, CAFS EPIC, BBBS.

Robert announced the upcoming site visits and encouraged members to attend. Kyle Sheehan encouraged qualified members to attend the virtual formal program reviews. The group was also reminded that at least two members are needed for each review. The dates for the monitoring are included in the agenda. Adiyah Washington also encouraged members and reminded them it is a good way to learn about the programs.

Program Updates:

BCDFG Adolescent Substance Abuse Program (ASAP) – 4 court-ordered evaluations in April. 9 youth (5 male, 4 female) in graduation groups. 3 new referrals for BYPASS with 3 completing the program. 1 new referral in PAVE with 1 completing the program.

BCDFG Psychological Evaluations (PE) – 5 new referrals in April.

BCDFG Using Technology Responsibly (UTR) – 5 new referrals in April.

BCDFG Regional Stationhouse Adjustment Program (RSAP) – 20 new referrals in April.

BCDFG Positive Strides (PS) – 3 new referrals in April.

BCDFG Anger Management/Character Development – 3 new referrals in April.

BCDFG Alternatives to Detention (ATD) – 16 youth in April. 4 on BEM, 1 on PEM, and 11 youth on non-electronic monitoring.

Visions – 10 residents in April (4 female, 6 male).

Juvenile Detention Center (JDC) – 13 youth in April (13 male). 11 youth from Bergen County and 2 youth from out of county.

Bergen's Place Youth Shelter – 7 residents in April (4 female, 3 male). 3 from Bergen County and 4 out of county youth. Residents recently participated in the "Slam Dunk the Junk" cleanup event in Bergen County with high engagement. Tara Smith Continue overseeing shelter programs and support integration of the new clinician working full-time with shelter and juvenile detention center youth.

Teaneck Public Schools (TPS) – No report

Big Brothers Big Sisters (BBBS) – one new community-based match was made in April for a 10-year-old male from Saddle Brook, bringing the total to 36 active community-based matches in Bergen County. An additional 53 youth are currently being served through site-based programs at Lincoln Elementary and Roy Brown Middle School, both of which will conclude for the school year at the end of May with final celebrations. The community-based waiting list remains at 10 youth, consisting of seven males and three females between the ages of 6 and 16. In exciting news, two matched youth from Bergen County were awarded \$5,000 scholarships for their post-secondary education through a partnership between Big Brothers Big Sisters of America and the Deloitte Foundation, following an application process where they shared the meaningful impact of their mentors.

YWCA – the YWCA's Junior Jumpstart program has announced a new youth engagement initiative, the Junior Jumpstart Boot Camp, scheduled for July. Planning is currently underway for the camp, which aims to help participating youth build essential skills and community connections. This program expands the existing network of services that support youth development outside of traditional settings. Preparations and final planning for the July session are ongoing.

Superior Court SCBV / Probation — No report

TMR Mental Health Care – in honor of Mental Health Month, several events are planned along with marketing outreach for the youth program at Hackensack High School, Thomas Jefferson Middle School, and Teaneck. The program currently has 15 active participants.

Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS)

CAFS - EPIC/Seeds of Change: EPIC partnered with the Girl Scouts of Northern New Jersey to host a babysitter's CPR certification course during spring break, which saw over 30 students attend. A pre-lifeguard CPR training was also held for 10 students. As part of this partnership, female participants (or sisters of male participants) received a free one-year Girl Scout membership. The events served as a recruitment tool, resulting in one new EPIC member and several pending applications.

Seeds of Change Conference: The conference is confirmed for Friday, October 23rd, at Ramapo College, coinciding with Red Ribbon Week. The youth-selected theme is the impact of body image on mental health, specifically addressing the rise in youth seeking GLP-1s and peptides for weight loss and sports. Save-the-date notices and interest forms have been distributed to local schools.

CAFS - Botvin's Life Skills Training (LST) and Seven Habits is concluding, with final classes wrapping up in Fort Lee. For the summer, the "Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens" program is in development, with potential partnerships being finalized to train summer camp counselors in Bogota and middle school students in Bergenfield.

NJ Youth Justice Commission (YJC) – Kyle Sheehan encouraged members to participate in program monitoring, emphasizing that it's a valuable way to see the strong work being done across funded programs. He closed by thanking everyone for their support.

Old Business

Stephanie Drag (CAFS) updated the group on NJ4S Advocacy & Program, which provides free prevention and mental health services to 83 Bergen County schools. Following successful advocacy, the Governor's office plans to maintain the program for the 2026-27 school year. While new initiatives like SPARK are being discussed, advocacy continues to ensure program stability.

Shelby Klein promoted Mental Health Awareness Month, specifically the Stigma-Free Symposium on May 13. The no-cost event features a keynote speaker and panels on local mental health initiatives; registration closes tomorrow.

New Business –

Tiana Crowley introduced herself as the new Supervisor for the Juvenile Family Crisis Unit.

Sandra Cruz-Medrano (DCF) announced new leadership appointments: Joe Ribsam has been named the new Commissioner of DCF, and Clinton Page has been appointed Assistant Commissioner. Sylvia Bernard introduced herself from Children's Aid and Family Services (CAFS), representing the Treatment Home Foster Care program.
